Mir. Justice Madderr amounced that it had been decided by the Judges that in future in probate actions the date for trial should not be fixed by the Probate Judge, but that notice af trial should be served in the ordinary way, and that the action should take its place in the fists, as in other actions. He directed the trial to be heard by a judge and a common jury of the City of Dublin, the plaintiff to serve notice of trial.


