The Department have decided, in view of the extreme need for further food production, to issue an Order requiring an extra quantity of tillage on holdings of 200 arable acres and upwards.

"Reasonable Effort" this year will not be enough. The full percentage will be strictly required from everybody.

Moreover so urgent has become the need for more food that the Department appeal both to the occupiers of the larger holdings and to all others, down to the smallest cultivators to till as much as possible, even the amount actually required by the Tillage Order.

To accomplish this great task not a day should be lost. The plough should be kept going every fine hour. Bad weather may be ahead.

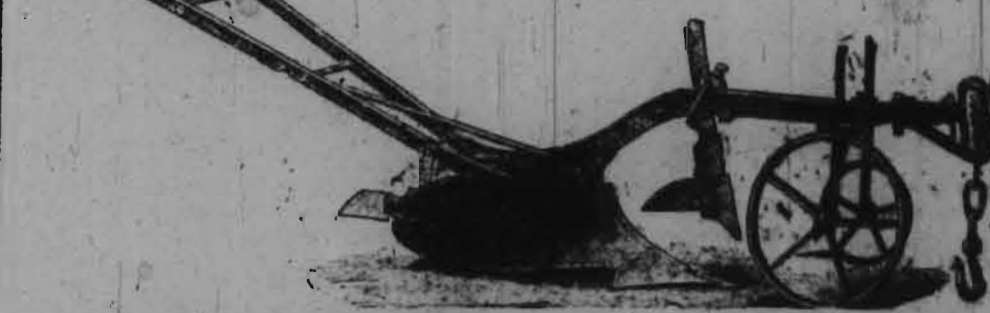

THE SELLAR B.M.P. New Improved Light Model.

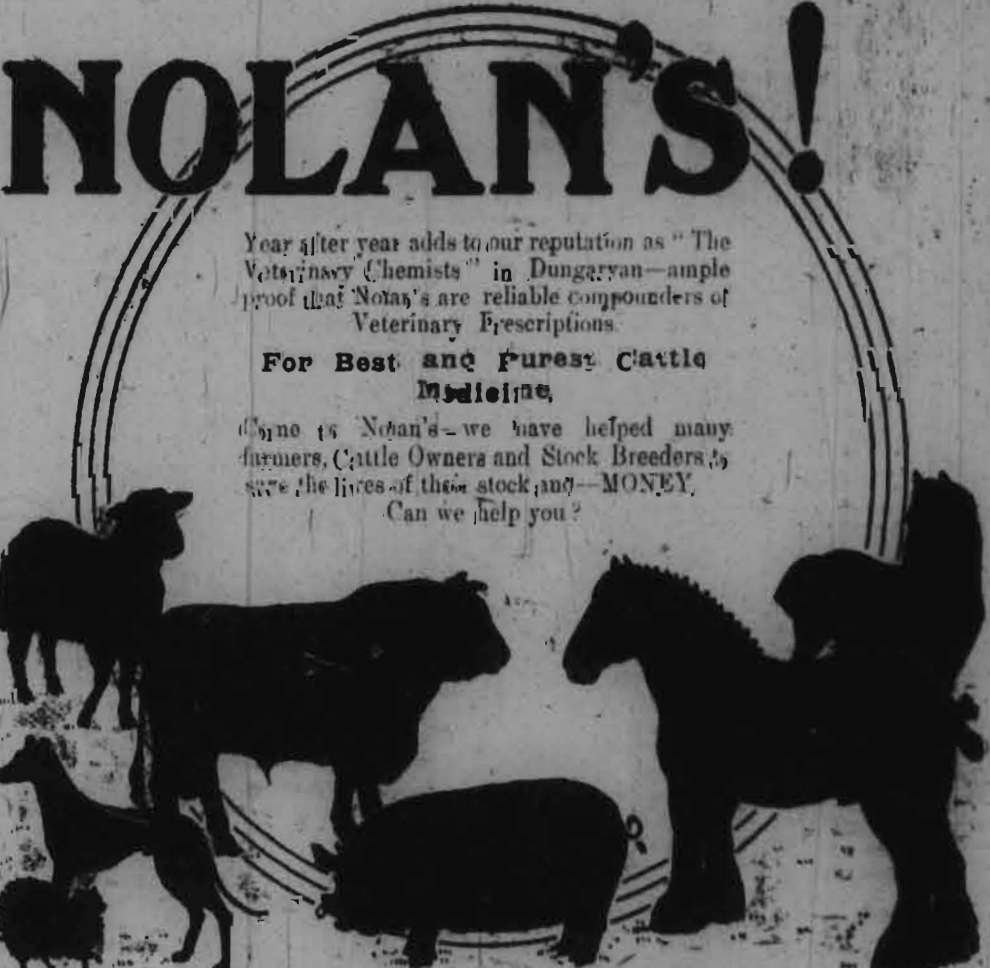

Lismore Board of Guardians

Mr. E. W. Becher presided. Also present Messrs. John Ormond, Co. C., John E. O'Donnell, Jas. J. Brackett, John J. Murphy, and Thomas Scanlan.

The Local Government Board, writing with reference to the contract for bread to 31st March, 1918, stated with reference thereto to the Board desire to point out that the fixed price of bread is 9d. per 4lb. loaf, and no lid, as stated, and requested to be informed what the Guardians had been paying the contractor heretofore.

The Clerk said they were paying 10d. per 4lb. loaf.

Mr. Ryan, solicitor, thought it a reasonable charge for delivery.

Mr. Ormond asked about the recent decision in the King's Bench, where a van was held to be a shop.

Mr. Ryan said that applies only where bread is sold out of a van.

Replying to a query of Mr. Brackett, Mr. Ryan said a contractor to a van for bread is to be charged nothing for delivery.

Mr. Ormond—Why should we do that? I see by the Press where other unions get their bread for 8d. We might advertise to get it as cheap as we could.

Clerk—You have no contract like this it means a lot at the end of the year.

Mr. Murphy—I would advise the price open.

Mr. E. A. Ryan, solicitor, reported the result of the proceedings taken at Fermanagh Quarter Sessions against Walsh and Daly for the maintenance of illegitimate children born in the workhouse.

The Clerk mentioned that he ascertained that the bond of the plumber (Mr. Walsh) had only been signed by one surety and the second (Mr. A. Hinkley) had refused to sign same.

The National Health Insurance Commissioners charged Richard Stanton, horse-trainer, with failing to produce his card to Michael O'Donnell, St. James's, by whom he was employed.

Mr. Murphy, solicitor, Waterford, and Mr. R. J. Thompson, Inspector, had charge of the case. Defendant was fined 10s. and 10s. costs.

ADJOURNED QUARTERLY MEETING.

The adjourned quarterly meeting of the above was held in the Courthouse on Saturday, Mr. D. Conway, V.C. in the chair.

The Agricultural Wages Board. The Agricultural Wages Board allow only 1s. 3d. per day to local agricultural labourers, the Dungarvan Rural District Council request the Wages Board to specify the nature and the quantity of food to give the labourer under Group 2.

Mr. Ormond—This is a very important matter, because if a farmer were to feed his labourers for 1s. 3d. per day they would actually starve.

Mr. O'Donnell—it would be impossible for him to do so.

Although a good number of contracts had been invited for the purpose of keeping in repair various roads throughout the district, only five tenders were received, four of which were accepted.

The tender of Michael O'Mahony at £10 4s. to keep in repair 180 perches of the road from Dungarvan to Arklow, between Malony's contract at Knocknappan and Lenane's contract at Ballinacross, the estimate being £25 15s.

The tender of John O'Mahony at £11 16s. to keep in repair for three years, 280 perches of the road from Dungarvan to Arklow, between Malony's contract at Slanskillill and Foley's contract at Ballinacross, the estimate being £26 15s.

The tender of James Doherty at £10 to keep in repair for three years, 350 perches of the road from Dungarvan to Arklow, between Murphy's contract at W. White's Cross and John's contract at Ballinacross, the estimate being £19.

There was also another tender received from J. Coffey and J. Killy to keep in repair for three years 1,465 perches of the road from Dungarvan to Arklow, between Murphy's contract at W. White's Cross and John's contract at Ballinacross, the estimate being £11 15s. 3d.

Mr. Hassett, assistant county surveyor, asked that this tender be not accepted, as there was another road which was a continuation of the road from Dungarvan, and the two roads were included in the one tender, the tender should not be accepted.

Mr. O'Donnell—Perhaps the contractor who is here will be satisfied to take the two roads. If the two men took the roads they might be able to do the work required.

Mr. Hassett—That would be one way of getting out of it.

Chairman—There is no use in discussing the matter. Are you satisfied that the two men can do the roads?

Mr. O'Donnell—Ask the men if they are prepared to take the two roads.

J. Coffey, one of the contractors, here said that he would be prepared to take the two roads if he got them here today.

Mr. Hassett—Respectfully tender the road to-day and let him come forward at the County Council meeting and tender for the two roads.

Mr. O'Donnell—If I don't get the roads here today I won't take them at all.

In the event of the contractors failing to come forward at the County Council meeting the roads will be done by direct labour.

Mr. O'Donnell—If there are any other roads which have not been tendered for here to-day it is optional for the contractors to tender for them at the meeting of the County Council.

The Clerk informed him that it was agreed.
