The L.G.B. wrote stating with reference to teachers' salaries that the Treasury had agreed to a scale of increase for both male and female teachers of workhouse schools as follows:-Salary from £20 to £26, 25 per cent; from £26 to £30, 15 per cent; £30 to £36, 20 per cent; and over £36, 5 per cent.

The L.G.B. forwarded copy of judgment of the High Court of King's Bench in connection with the sending of workhouse inmates to external hospitals for special treatment.

The Clerk stated the M.O. had recommended a man named Daly, suffering from eye disease, as a fit case for Cork Ophthalmic Hospital. He had been admitted on December 19th.

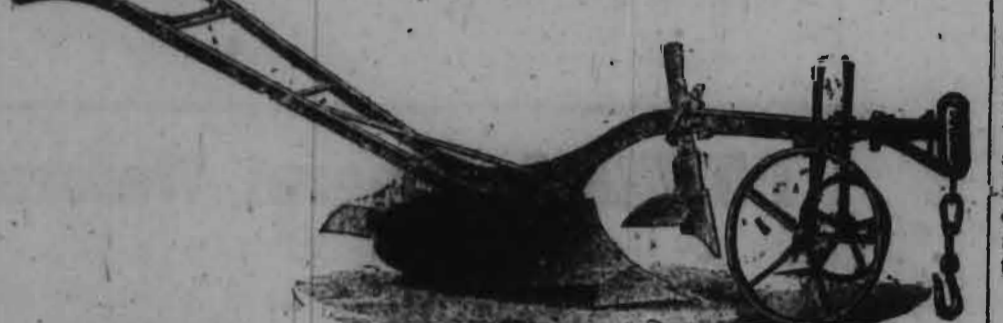

Co. Waterford War Pensions Committee.

The usual monthly meeting of the above committee was held in the Courthouse, Thursday week. Lady Waterford presided. Also present—Lady Eleanor Keane, Miss G. Four O'Shea, Mrs. Adams, Hon. C. A. Anson, Messrs. W. A. Richardson, Walsh Kelly and J. Greene. Capt. Cooper, Inspector for the Ministry War Pensions, also attended.

The Minutes. The Hon. Clerk read out before proceeding with the ordinary business of the meeting there was a resolution that he wished to propose with regard to reading to the minutes of the previous meeting. There was an amount of work to be done at each of the monthly meetings of the committee, and the reading of the minutes took quite a considerable time. He would now like to propose that the minutes in future be taken as read.

Resignation of Treasurer. A letter was read from Mr. Richardson, treasurer of the committee, saying that he regretted he was compelled to resign his health to resign the post of honorary treasurer to the committee. He had hoped to be able to continue to do the financial business of the committee up to the end of the quarter, but he now found it absolutely impossible to do so.

The Chairman said that there was no exception to her comment on the excellent manner in which Mr. Richardson had carried out the work of the committee, and he was sure they would all miss his valuable assistance. However, by continuing to carry out the work he would be endangering his health, and the appointment of our next honorary treasurer in accepting his resignation.

Lady Keane said she wished to propose a vote of thanks to Mr. Richardson for his services to the committee. Mrs. Adams seconded, and the proposition was unanimously carried.

Mr. Richardson—Thank you all for the kind vote of thanks you have passed, and I can assure you that were it not that it were absolutely impossible for me to do so, I would only be too glad to continue to act in the capacity of treasurer to the committee. However, for some time past my health has been failing, and I find it absolutely imperative for me to give up work, which has caused me no little amount of worry. I had hoped to be able to continue until the end of the quarter, but I am unable to do so.

Chairman—We are extremely grateful for the valuable amount of work you have done for us. Mr. Walsh Kelly—I think we ought make some arrangement before proceeding with the appointment of our next honorary treasurer. There is a great deal of work which at present falls on the treasurer, but which could be done by the secretary.

Capt. Cooper—In Cork the bank is the treasurer of the committee, and the rest of the work falls on the secretary. Miss O'Shea—This is the case in the present case. Chairman—I see no reason why we should not do as the bank does in the present case.

Mr. Kelly—Yes, I think the simplest way is that of the paying office. I don't see any reason why the secretary could not send the paying orders to those who are in receipt of money from us and let them get paid at the bank.

Chairman—I understand that in most counties the amount of work to be done by the secretary is much greater than has to be done for this committee, and in the majority of cases the two positions are one.

Mr. Greene—We will have to take into account the conditions under which Mr. Evans was appointed. By these conditions he was obliged to do a certain amount of work and if an extra burden is placed upon him now it is only fitting that he should have extra remuneration. When you appoint a paid official and increase his work his salary must be increased proportionately.

Capt. Cooper here gave various figures of the salaries paid in the other counties to the secretaries to War Pensions Committees, which showed an average of £80 per annum, with the exception of Waterford City, where the secretary was receiving £50, but had requested for £112, and Mr. Kelly, who was the secretary was receiving £50, but had requested for £100.

Chairman—On the whole the salary is between £50 and £60. Lady Keane—I think the whole work of the committee ought to be done by the secretary.

Secretary—I am willing to take it up on the conditions that there is a salary attached to it. I think it is a very important position, and the amount of work that will have to be done with the sending of paying orders, etc., will be a very big burden.

Chairman—You will not have to act as treasurer. The bank will do that. After some further discussion on the subject it was decided that Mr. Walsh Kelly assist Mr. Richardson in the work of treasurer until the end of the quarter. In the meantime the secretary was directed to issue the necessary paying orders printed, the committee considering the adoption of them to be the best way of getting the financial work done. Also that the secretary ascertain from the various secretaries of the War Pensions Committees of Munster the manner in which they were working and report same to the committee at their next meeting.

Sub-Committees. Owing to the resignation of some of the members of the various sub-committees appointed on the War Pensions Sub-Committees of the county—Mrs. Fitzgerald, Miss Adams, Mrs. Gray and Mr. P. L. Keane. For representation on the sub-committees in the county we discharged address and salaries of the various districts in which the sub-committees are in existence were appointed at the suggestions of different members of the committee.

Medical Examination for the Army. A resolution was read from the Board of War Pensions Committee calling on the Government to take steps that all those who submit their services for medical examination with a view to joining the army should be properly and carefully examined. Quite a number of men had joined the army as being fit for service, but had to be discharged after a short time owing to their untidiness for the army, thereby becoming a burden on the State.

Mr. Walsh Kelly seconded, and the resolution was unanimously adopted. The remaining business of the meeting was of a routine character.

Special Court in Dungarvan

FRAUDULENTLY PRESENTING A CHEQUE. A special court was held at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Friday by Mr. Orr, B.M., for the purpose of trying a man charged with the charge of fraudulently presenting a cheque. The accused, Patrick O'Brien, was brought up from Waterford Jail, where he had been in custody since Saturday last. District Inspector O'Keefe prosecuted.

The charge against the accused was that he did at Dungarvan on the 21st day of February feloniously steal, take and carry away a cheque issued by Mr. Thomas Power in favour of Messrs. E. Ryan and Co., Cork, and to the value of £13 5s. 4d. Evidence in this case had been taken a week ago, and the following further depositions were taken on Friday.

Mrs. Mary Terry deposed that she was the wife of Maurice Terry and kept a public-house in the Square, Dungarvan. She also kept lodgers occasionally. On the afternoon of the 21st of February she was in the kitchen when the barmaid, Ellen McGrath, came into her and gave her a cheque. (The cheque was here produced in court and was identified by witness as being the same), she took the cheque and went out to the bar. She saw two men there, one of them taller than the other. The accused here testified that he was the man who had given the cheque to her. She told him she could not as she had not the amount of money necessary in the shop. He asked her to give him £2 or £3, as he was taken short, and would have to stay in town for the night, being unable to get money as the bank was closed. She said she would give him any more than £1, and although at last she consented to take it, saying it was about 9 o'clock in the evening. The two men left the shop after that and returned about 8 o'clock when they had supper. They then went out and she said they would return about 10 o'clock. They came back before 10 o'clock and went into the kitchen and had some drinks there. She heard the accused say that he represented Ryan and Co. She then went to bed and left the two men speaking to her husband. She said she did not see them until the following day she gave the cheque to Sergeant Collins.

Cross-examined by Accused—Are you sure that I am the man? Yes, I am. Ellen McGrath, who was next sworn, deposed that she was a barmaid in the employment of Maurice Terry, Square, Dungarvan. On the 21st of February two men, unknown to her, entered the shop, and she then was the accused here in court, and the taller of the two men. One of them handed her a cheque and asked her if she would cash it. She said she did not think so, but would ask Mrs. Terry. She was not positive which of the two men gave her the cheque, as she was busy at the time. She took the cheque to Mrs. Terry and was present when the latter was speaking to the two men about it. However, she did not pay much attention to the conversation. About 5 o'clock the men left the house, came back about 8 o'clock and had supper. They went out again after that and returned about 10 o'clock. She went to bed, leaving the men in the kitchen, but saw them come down next morning about 9 1/2 a.m. They had a drink in the bar and told her they were going out to get shaved. They would have breakfast in about half an hour. They did not come back and she did not see them again. They paid for the drink in the morning.

Cross-examined by defendant—Are you sure I am the party who gave you the cheque? I am not positive. District Inspector O'Keefe—That's all the evidence I propose to give to-day, but I will be able to produce more, and I ask you for a remand for eight days. We have some other local witnesses and indeed I am not in any hurry to get this case over as we want to try and find the other man.

The court adjourned until Thursday next.

Youghal Petty Sessions THE LATE SIR H. A. BLAKE.

The preceding magistrates were—Messrs. R. Carey, T. Farrell and B. R. Purdon, B.M. The Chairman said it was with very sincere regret that he had to ask them to adjourn the court till that day week, as they all had learned that on the previous Saturday an old and valued member of the bench had died in the person of Sir Henry A. Blake. He thought that mark of respect was at least due to his memory. He also proposed that the clerk of the court convey to Lady Blake and Major Arbutnot and family an expression of the deep esteem in which they held him, and of their sincere sympathy with them in their great bereavement.

Mr. Purdon seconded the proposition made by Mr. Carey. It was with very deep regret that he had heard of Sir Henry's death. He might call him an old friend of his. It was 22 years ago since he had first met him, and since then they had been more or less connected with him. During the whole period that he knew him he always found Sir Henry to be the most upright, conscientious man he had ever met, and he was sure that he was one of the noblest works of God—a straight, honest, conscientious man, and when they might not have agreed with him on other points they all agreed that he was one of the noblest works of God—a straight, honest man. Talbot said he wished to join in that expression of respect on behalf of the R.I.C. He had known Sir Henry since the first day he came amongst them, and ever since he had proved himself a sincere and thorough friend of the police. They would miss him very much.

Mr. Walsman, clerk of the court, said he wished to be associated with the resolution. In his dealings with Sir Henry as clerk of petty sessions he had always found Sir Henry to be most kind and courteous.
