Death of Mr. John Redmond, M.P.

Nor only in Ireland, to whose cause his whole life had been devoted, but throughout the world wherever the Irish race are scattered, the death of Mr. John Redmond will cause a terrible shock. He was a great patriot and a great man. From the moment he left school over 40 years ago to the eva of his death he was Ireland's soldier, always in the thick of the fight. Every fibre of his manly frame vibrated with love of his native land, and were his worth properly appreciated there would not be a dry eye in our country to-day. Entering Parliament in 1881, he was instantly at the back of Parnell in trying to win land reforms, and these were the days when men of strength were required. It was through the efforts of Parnell and his Party that the furmers of the country obtained security of tenure and the labourers were able to get decent houses and plots. After Parnell's death Mr. Redmond kept up the pressure, and in 1900 became kept up the pressure, and in 1900 became Chairman of the Party. What the Irish Party achieved under his brilliant leadership need not be recounted here, suffice to say that by his influence and zeal in Parliathat by bis influence and zeal in Parliament and out of it the face of the country has been changed, and prosperity and security have taken the place of ruin and chaos. Landlordism was ever the bane of Ireland. Mr. Redmand set out to smash it, and succeeded so well that to-day over two-thirds of the land is owned by the occupiers. Everything he touched he adorned. As an orator he was unequalled in any assembly, while his powers of debate and knowledge of Parliamentary procedure were so keen that he stood alone as a leader of unbounded ability in the House of Commens. His sole aim was the achievement of National Independence for Ireland, and if we do not possess our native Parliament to-day the fault is not his. He did heroic work in getting the Home Rule Bill on the Statute Book, but the Government refused to put it into operation until the war was over. For that Mr. Redmond could scargely be held accountable. He is gone at the very time his wise counsel was most required. In the Convention his very presence was of enormous worth in bringing all parties to a more conciliatory mood, and there in the concluding stages his sagacity and political foresight will be sorely missed. On platform and in Press he laboured for the freedom of his country, while he performed almost miracles in the manner in which he won the masses of the English people to the Irish cause. And when the clouds roll by it will be seen that John Redmond was a stateman greater than whom Ireland has never had, and that a more pure-souled patriot never, pleaded Erin's cause. He was loved where er an Irishman was to be found 'neath the sun, and his early and unexpected death just as the cause to which he had devoted his life was about to be crowned with sucment and out of it the face of the country

Death of Mr. John Redmond, M.P.

Nor only in Ireland, to whose cause his whole life had been devoted, but throughous the world wherever the Irish race are scuttered, the death of Mr. John Redmond will cause a terrible shock. He was a great patriot and a great man. From the moment he left school over 40 years ago to the eve of 18th death he was Ireland's soldier, always in the thick of the fight. Every fibre of his manly frame vibrated with love of his mative land, and were his worth properly appreciated there would not be a dry eye in our country to-day. Entering Parliament in 18el, he was instantly at the back of Parnell in trying to win band reforms, and these were the days when men of strength were required. It was through the efforts of Parnell and his Party that the firmers of the country obtained security of tenure and the labourers were able to get decent houses and plots. After Parnell's death Mr. Redmond kept up the pressure, and in 1900 became Chairman of the Party. What the Irish Party achieved under his brilliant leadership need not be recounted here, suffice to say that by bits influence and zeal in Parliament and out if it the face of the country has been changed, and prosperity and security have taken the place of ruin and chaos. Landlordism was ever the bane of Ireland. Mr. Redmond set out to smash it, and succeeded so well that to-day over two-thirds of the land is owned by the occupiers. Everything he touched he adorned. As an orator he was unaqualled in any assembly, while his powers of debate and knowledge of Parliamentary pracedure were so keen that he steed alone as a leader of unbounded ability in the House of Commons. His sole aim was the achievement of National Independence for Ireland, and if we do not possess our native Parliament to-day the fault is not his. He did berole work in getting the House Rule Bill on the Statute Book, but the Government refused to put it into operation until the war was over. For that Mr. Redmond could scarcely be held accountable. He is gone at the very time his wise counsel was most requ cluding stages his saged ty and political fore-sight will be sorely missed. On platform and in Press he laboured for the freedom of and in Press he laboured for the freedom of his country, while he performed almost miracles in the manner in which he won the manner of the English people to the Irish cause. And when the clouds roll by it will be seen that John Redmond was a state-sman greater than whom Iroland has never had, and that a more pure-souled patriot never pleaded Erin's cause. Future generations will duly appraise him—Clarum ac venerabile nomen. May the green sod of the land he loved le lightly on his breast.


