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British Office's Table of Mortality with interest at 4 1/2 per cent.

The total surplus of the branch shown is £16,250, including the sum of £14,550 brought forward from last year. Out of this surplus the Directors have added £1,700 to the Investments Reserve Fund, which, after deducting £3,625, representing the total surplus of the branch, stands as at 31st December, 1917, at £17,000, and £2,470 has been carried forward.

The total surplus of the branch, as shown by the valuation, is £2,200,850, and £1,000,000 will be transferred from the Ordinary Branch Contingency Fund, the amount being £1,200,850. Of this amount £500,000 has been added to the Investments Reserve Fund of the Industrial Branch, £1,700,000 will be allocated to participating policies in the Ordinary Branch and £500,000 to the shareholders in accordance with the Articles of Association of the Company, leaving £2,000,850 to be carried forward, namely £7,812 in the Ordinary Branch and £2,000,000 in the Industrial Branch.

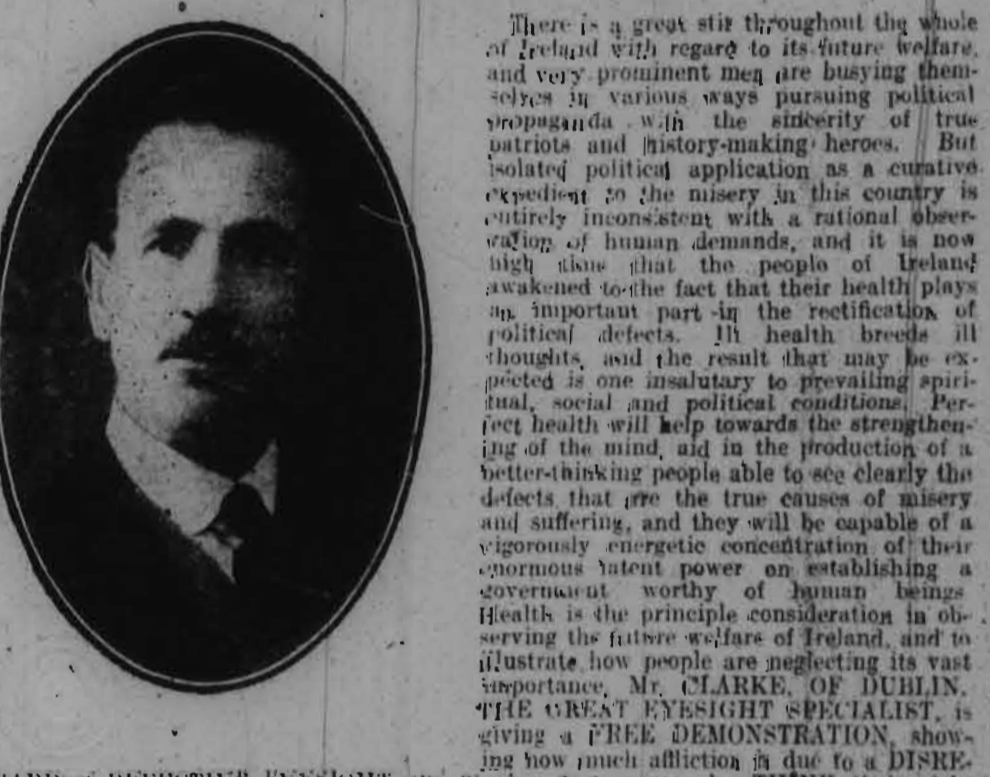

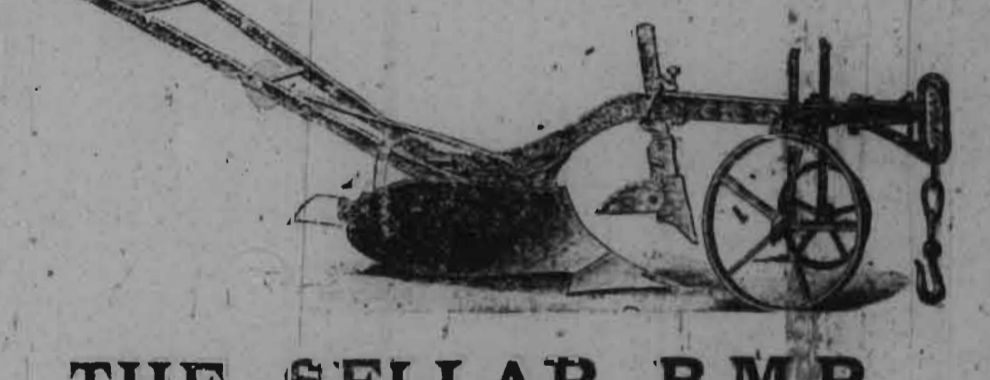

Method of Calf Rearing.

The Board of Agriculture has issued a leaflet giving a summary of methods of calf-rearing which have proved successful in different parts of the country.

The particular method adopted depends largely upon the system of farming practised. In upland districts, where plenty of cheap grass is available, or in mountain districts generally where the grass is of good quality and winter keep can be given cheaply, or in the rearing of the highest class pedigree dairy stock, milk is fed liberally to the calf.

The calf-house. The essential requirements of the calf-house should be that it should afford reasonable protection for exercise. An antiseptic state of buildings is required. If the existing building is unfit, a suitable little adaptation will usually suffice.

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The Redmond Funeral.

The remains of the late Mr. John E. Redmond, M.P., were laid to rest on Saturday in Wexford, a great concourse of the people of all parts of the country, attending to pay a last tribute of respect to the dead.

The coffin, which for the sea passage had been placed in a canvas casket, was borne from the steamer to the train on the shoulders of National Volunteers.

About 30 men of the Royal Irish Regiment were lined up under Sergeant-Major Burtley, and prominent among the members of the Irish Party present were Messrs. Dillon and Deavin, who travelled in the compartment allotted to the relatives.

Outside the gates were gathered a large crowd, who reverently bared their heads and raised their hats as the train departed. The majority wore portrait buttons of the deceased.

The engine of the special train, which started for Wexford at 7.45, was draped in black and the houses in Kington and along the railway line had their blinds drawn and their church bells rung.

At several stations people assembled in reverent attendance to bid a last farewell to their hero. At the station at Kington, where the train stopped there were many people of all classes, and a large number of flags and bays flew at half-mast.

All the business houses, without exception, were closed at the carriage passed along. The streets were lined with people, and many windows displayed large photographs of the deceased.

The coffin was carried on a stretcher by four men, and the bearers were dressed in black. The coffin was placed in the train and the train started for Wexford.

The funeral cortege was led by the Mayor and Mayoress, followed by the members of the Corporation and the members of the various societies.

The cortege was accompanied by a band of music, and the streets were lined with people who followed the funeral to the cemetery.

The funeral was a great occasion, and the people showed their deep respect for the deceased by their attendance and the display of flags and bays.

The remains were laid to rest in the cemetery, and the funeral was a fitting tribute to a man who had done so much for his country.
