DONOGHUE v. KEANE.

In this case John Donoghue, Lyre East, Cappoquin, appealed against the decision of the Cappoquin magistrates fining him 23s, and costs at the cuit of Sir John Keane for alleged trespass in pursuit of game on Sunday, 12th January.

Mr. E. A. Ryan, solr., Dungaryan, appeared for Donoghue, and Mr. Jas. Murray, solr., Lismore, for Sir John Keane.

Mr. Murray, solr., in stating the case, said that the gamekeeper, John Hughes, found defendant in a ray or mountain belonging to Sir John Kenne. His son Jeremiah was with him. They had two dogs, a ferret, nets and a dead rabbit with them when found.

John Hughes, gamekeeper, gave evidence for the prosecution, and stated in cross-examination that he found defendant in search of ground game

Jeremiah Donoghue, son of defendant, was exammed for the defence.

His Honor said that after hearing the evidence for the prosecution, the magistrates and himself had decided to dismiss the case. They accordingly reversed the conviction and awarded Donoghue 20s. and costs.
