





Tragedy at Ring.

Policeman Shoots Young Man.

Perhaps in the long annals of Ireland's tragic history under British rule there has not been a sadder tragedy than that enacted in the peaceful village of Ring last Friday night when an innocent, harmless, honest and good young man of 25 years of age, Michael Walsh, was fired at and dangerously wounded by Constable McCarthy, R.I.C., Ring. The story of the shooting is a tragic one. A patrol boat or minnow-boat had anchored at Seaview at the rear of Heilwick Head, and some five or six of the boatmen's land crew ashore. They had been at Bergin's public-house during the afternoon, and towards evening they adjourned to the licensed premises of Martin Draper, King. Here, it is stated, they kicked up a shindy, and in the row that followed among themselves a lamp was overturned. The master of the boat told them to come out on the bridge and fight it out there, and the men agreed. The fight was carried on with much vigour on the bridge near the licensed premises, and the barmaid at Draper's—Miss Walsh—starting to interfere, might again return to her room and do more harm, asked a neighbour—Miss Walsh—to run down to the barroom and call the police. The young man ran as fast as he could to the barroom and knocked and said: "Come out. There is a murder on the bridge." Receiving no reply Walsh had a look in the glass and saw Constable McCarthy sitting in the room. No sooner had he seen the constable than the latter took up his revolver and fired at the young man. Walsh was hit in the chest and fell. He was taken to the hospital and died there on Saturday evening.
