

THE HOUSING (IRELAND) ACT, 1919.

This Act consists of two parts and three Schedules. Part I and the Schedules amend and extend the Housing of the Working Classes (Ireland) Act, 1909; and Part II amends the Small Dwellings Acquisition Act, 1909.

Section 9 prohibits a Local Authority from including in a petition for compulsory powers to acquire lands any portion of a home-farm, park, garden, pleasure ground or other land required for the amenity or convenience of a dwelling-house, if suitable sites can be obtained on other land.

Section 11 greatly enlarges the powers of a Local Authority with respect to the disposal of land of land acquired or appropriated under Part III. of the Act last-mentioned. It authorises the laying out of open spaces, and, with the consent of the Board, the lease or sale of land to persons prepared to develop it on the modern lines, and to build working-class houses thereon, as well as to lease or sell any land acquired or created by the Local Authority.

Section 13 empowers a Local Authority to make rules for carrying the Housing Acts into effect, and in particular for prescribing the duties, conditions of employment, and qualifications of officers and other persons employed by Local Authorities in the execution of those Acts, provided that any such rules shall not be inconsistent with the provisions of any Act relating to the employment of labour.

Section 19 authorises in pursuance of a housing scheme the relaxation of building by-laws in the case of new buildings, public streets and roads, which are constructed in accordance with plans and specifications approved by the Local Government Board, and provides that this relaxation may be extended to similar works for a like purpose, though not forming part of a scheme.

Section 21 empowers a Local Authority at any time after publication of the notice of the appointment of an arbitrator, to take possession of authorized lands, on the condition that 14 days' notice is given to the owner and occupier and that the compensation is paid.

Section 23 empowers a Local Authority to acquire land for the purpose of Part III. of the Act of 1909. It empowers an Authority (a) to acquire houses as proposed sites; (b) to acquire houses capable of being made suitable for accommodation of members of the working classes; and (c) to repair and improve such houses. The Section also provides that land may be acquired for the purposes of (1) its lease or sale for the erection of houses for the working classes by persons other than the Local Authority, and (2) the lease or sale of any part of it for a use pertaining to its development as a building estate, including the provision of houses, gardens and buildings for, or for the convenience of, members of the working classes and other persons. A Local Authority is forbidden from doing any of the things mentioned in this section if it is doing so in contravention of any order made by the Local Government Board under the provisions of Section 6 of the Labourers (Ireland) Act, 1909, as adapted for the purposes of Section 6 of the Housing of the Working Classes (Ireland) Act, 1909, all the Board's powers relating to the making of Provisional Orders confirming schemes may be conferred upon the Inspector appointed to hold the inquiry into a scheme.

STRANGE INCIDENT IN DUNGARVAN.

A very strange and unusual incident took place in Dungarvan last Thursday evening on the occasion of the removal of the remains of the late Thomas Dea, R.O., to the Parish Church. VALUE OF BARLEY IN PIG BREEDING.

Experiments carried out by the Department have shown that for pig fattening maize and barley are approximately equal in value. In these experiments a slightly greater increase in weight was obtained from a given quantity of maize, but barley produced pork of better quality. Hence, however, no higher price is obtainable for barley for pigs, and as the demand for barley for pigging usually keeps the price of this cereal at a higher level than that of maize, there is no inducement to feed barley to pigs when cheaper food can be substituted.

"FREEMAN'S" GRAVE POSITION.

RECEIVER TAKES OVER THE BUSINESS.

In the Chancery Division last week in the matter of Ald. Stephen O'Mara, Mr. Michael Hearn, and Dr. Edward Magennis, plaintiffs, and the "Freeman's Journal," defendants, Mr. Justice Samuel made an order appointing Mr. David P. O'Connell, of Messrs. Craig, Gardner and Co., chartered accountants, provisional receiver and manager of the defendant company, with power to enter into compromise and carry on the business with a view to its sale as a going concern.

The application, an interlocutory one, was made on behalf of holders of debentures amounting to £26,000, the action on which it was being stated as brought to compel the defendant company to carry out the trusts of two indentures, dated, respectively, December 19th, 1910, and March 28th, 1912.

This action, it appeared, resulted from the Hibernian Bank having dishonoured the wages cheque of the defendant company on Thursday of last week, thus stopping the financial supplies, with the result that the company, it was stated, could not carry on the business of their undertaking beyond last Saturday unless the application were granted.

The shares of the company are—£15,000 Ord. (£5-£3 paid); £10,000 6 p.c. Ord. (£5-£3 paid) and £1,000 6 p.c. Ord. (£5-£3 paid).

Mr. J. A. Swaine, K.C., with whom was Mr. T. A. Finlay (instructed by Messrs. T. G. Quirk and Co.), in making the application, said a writ had been issued by the plaintiffs as the existing trustees of an indenture dated 19th December, 1910, entered into by the defendant company for the purpose of securing an issue of £36,000 debenture stock, claiming (1) to have an account taken of what was due from the defendant company to the plaintiffs as such trustees under the indenture (2) to have the trusts of the indenture carried into execution under the order of the court; (3) to have a receiver and manager of the property comprised in the said indenture and in the indenture dated 28th March, 1912, made between the company of the one part and the plaintiffs of the other part; (4) a sale of the property; (5) costs; and (6) further and other relief.

Mr. Justice Samuel expressed the opinion that the court took was absolutely the proper one in everyone's interest.
