MR. BRENNOCK REFUSES TO SIGN THE PAY SHEET OWING TO INACQUAINTANCE.

There was a scene at the finance meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council on Friday night last when the accuracy of an item on the pay sheet was questioned and Mr. Brennan refused to sign it on that account. A heated debate followed between Mr. McGrath, acting borough surveyor, and Mr. Brennan, the latter leaving the Council Room.

Mr. Patrick Nelson, J.P., chairman, presided. Also present were—Messrs. John Walsh, Michael Brennan and Michael Byrne. The Clerk proceeded to read out the items on the pay sheet, and on coming to the item "John Costin, 6 days at lamp-keepers improvement, at 7s. 6d. per day, 42 sh." Mr. Walsh, S.R.O., said that this was not correct.

"Costin," said Mr. Walsh, "was not 6 days at the lamps. He was working at the allotment plots for two days, and was in the service of the council all week."

FIRE IN DUNGARVAN.

MIDNIGHT OUTBREAK AT SHANDOWN DAIRY CO.'S PREMISES.

At about one o'clock on Friday night last an outbreak of fire was discovered at the rear of the premises of the Shandown Dairy Co. The discovery was first made by Messrs. Thornton and McInerney, who perceived smoke rising from one of the back windows of Miss Meade's on the Square. Simultaneously other residents on that portion of the Square noticed the flames, and immediately the alarm was raised. Mr. Thomas Walsh, the caretaker of the fire engine and appliances, was knocked up, and the alarm was given at the police barracks. Mr. Patrick Dunne, the owner of the premises, was also roused and was quickly on the scene. No delay was made in having the fire engine brought there, where on inspection it was found that the boiler and dynamo houses were one mass of flames. The outbreak, although at first sight presenting a serious appearance, was confined to these two houses, which were beyond saving, no attention was directed to confining the fire to these portions of the buildings and keep it from spreading to adjoining premises.
