IONA. ST. COLUMBA AND HIS HOLY SEE. By M. F. SHEEHAN. During the months of summer and early autumn crowds of tourists, of which some years ago the writer was one, visit the islands of Staffa and Iona, attracted to the former by the aspects of nature, to the latter by human memories.

SITUATION OF IONA. With Iona it is different. Situated at the southern apex of that long triangular tract of mountain-land which lies to the north-west of the great Caledonian valley, and which stretching from Inverness on the one side and from Cape Wrath on the other, terminating in the lofty summits of the Cairngorms and the Ben Nevis, and upon the still more enduring sea.

ST. COLUMBA'S LOVE FOR IRELAND. The causes which determined Columba in his selection of Iona are not mysterious or far to seek. In the first place it was an island, and islands have always been popular with Monastic Orders. They give seclusion, and, with seclusion, they afford facilities for the enforcement of discipline.

CHAPEL OF ST. ORAN. The ancient ecclesiastical buildings which are now crumbling to decay, and which are all grouped within a short distance of each other, mark beyond all question the very sites of ground on some part of which Columba's cell and church were built. Each one of these ruins has its own interest and its own history; but the most interesting of all is the chapel of St. Oran, which has this great and peculiar interest: it marks the site of the little church of wood and wattles where the saint worshipped. Closing by is the Reilig Oran—the ancient burial place of Iona. Here during more than a thousand years were carried kings and chiefs, and the far-off shores of Norway, with other lands of high and low degree, that their bodies might mingle with the dust of the Holy Isle.

WORSHIPPERS AND PENITENTS. The fame of Columba's supernatural powers attracted many and strange visitors to the shores of Iona. Hither came holy men from Erin to take counsel with the saint on the troubles of clan and monastery which were still dark and dreary in the hearts of the people. Hither, too, came chiefs, to be blessed and even kings to be ordained—for it is remarkable that on this lonely spot, so far distant from the ancient centres of Christendom took place the first recorded case of a temporal sovereign seeking consecration from a Minister of the Church.

THE SAINT'S VISION. The saint's death took place on the 9th June, A.D. 597. The Easter Sunday of that year fell on 10th April. On a certain day in the following month the old Abbot was carried in a waggon to see his brethren who were working in the fields. On reaching the monks he told them that what desire he had desired during the late Paschal commemoration to join Christ his Lord; but that the joy of their festival might not be converted into mourning he had been willing that the day of his departure should be a little longer deferred. He then addressed to his auditors a sermon of words of consolation, and while sitting in the vehicle, pronounced a benediction on the island and on all its inhabitants. On the following Sunday during the celebration of the Mass the Abbot's face was seen to be overcast with a joyful expression. An angel of the Lord, he explained to those about him, was evident to him—sent to seek something which was beloved of God, but which still remained on earth. What that something was he did not say.

PATHETIC LEAVE-TAKINGS. On Saturday, June 28th, St. Columba went with his special attendant, Diarmid, to bless the barn of the monastery. Having done so, he turned to Diarmid saying: "This Saturday will be a Sabbath indeed to me; for it is to be the last of my laborious life, on which I shall rest from all its troubles. During this coming night I shall be gathered to my fathers. Even now my Lord Jesus Christ desires to call me, to Him this very night, and at His call, I shall go. So it has been revealed to me by the Lord." The saint then walked back to the monastery. In the middle of the way he sat down to rest at a spot which up to today is marked by a cross. Whilst the Abbot was sitting here the old white horse which was wont to carry the milk pails to the monastery is recorded to have come up to his old master, and, putting his head into his lap, really seemed to weep.
