New B.L.—Mr. J. J. Heane, B.A., LL.B., son of Alister H. Heane, J.P., Waterford, and brother of Rev. M. Heane, C.C., Dungarvan, was called to the Bar on Monday last at the Four Courts, Dublin. He was proposed by the Right Hon. Mr. Justice O'Connor.

Fair Prohibited.—The old-established November Fair at Clonmel on Wednesday last was prohibited by the Annuity Act, and a number of sheep were entered who were held on Wednesday at Kilmacshannon, outside the municipal district of Clonmel and in the County Waterford, but prior to the date of the sale the well-known auctioneers, Messrs. Stokes and Quirk, were notified by "those in power" that though the sale was all right, and they would not allow any cattle to be "banned" at Clonmel Station, that ultimately knocked the sale on the head except for local transactions. This wholesale interference with fairs and markets as part of the government of the country has become very common of late, and how such action can be reconciled with any form of government good or bad is beyond comprehension. Why poor little Clonmel in the days when all the noise was made about her could hardly have been so curiously governed as we are, inasmuch as the Carrs was modestly compared with Ireland under French and Marston.

We wonder if the Army of Occupation desired out of Ireland next week would there be a large fleet of more behind it? We are accustomed to blame the bad policy of those foreigners in charge of us that if they were to clear home and burn their boats it would take some time before we could sail the right parties again with the cause of all misgivings. One thing evident anyhow is that so long as this large foreign army is with us, Ireland cannot prosper nor develop her interior resources. Given a free hand and native control of every item, we would advance by leaps and bounds and make the name of Erin resound throughout the world. We are a great race to be here at all after all our sufferings.

Out of Jail.—On Wednesday last A.D. Sullivan, Kilmoney, President G.A.A., period through Dungarvan on his way home after doing penance in Cork Jail for some old shooting sin, found in his possession. The Alderman looked hale and hearty and none the worse for his incarceration. Local friends here gave him the glad eye as he passed.

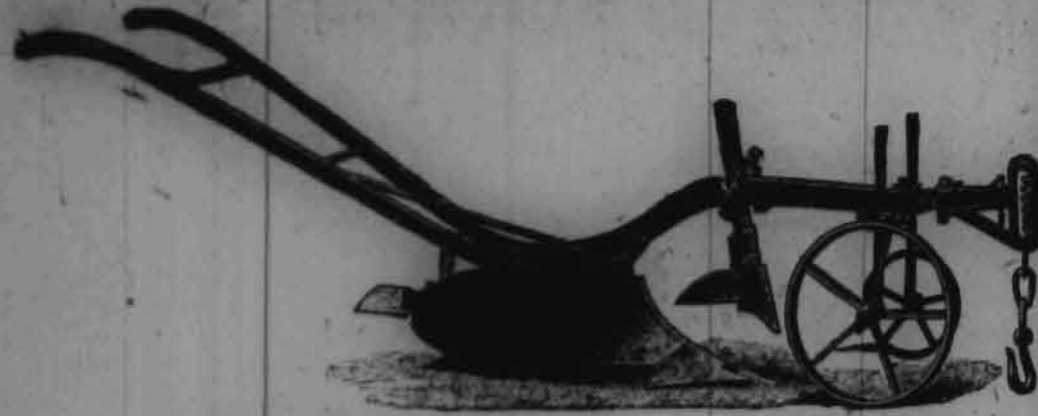

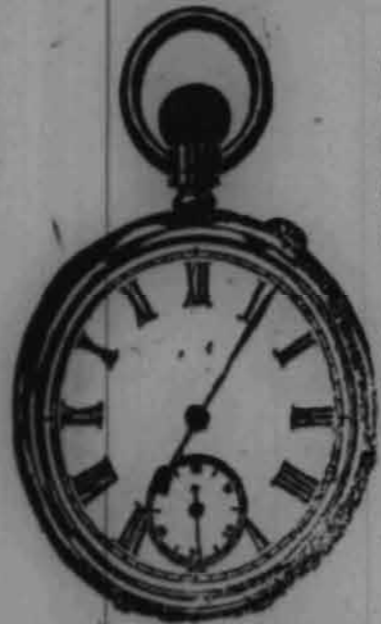

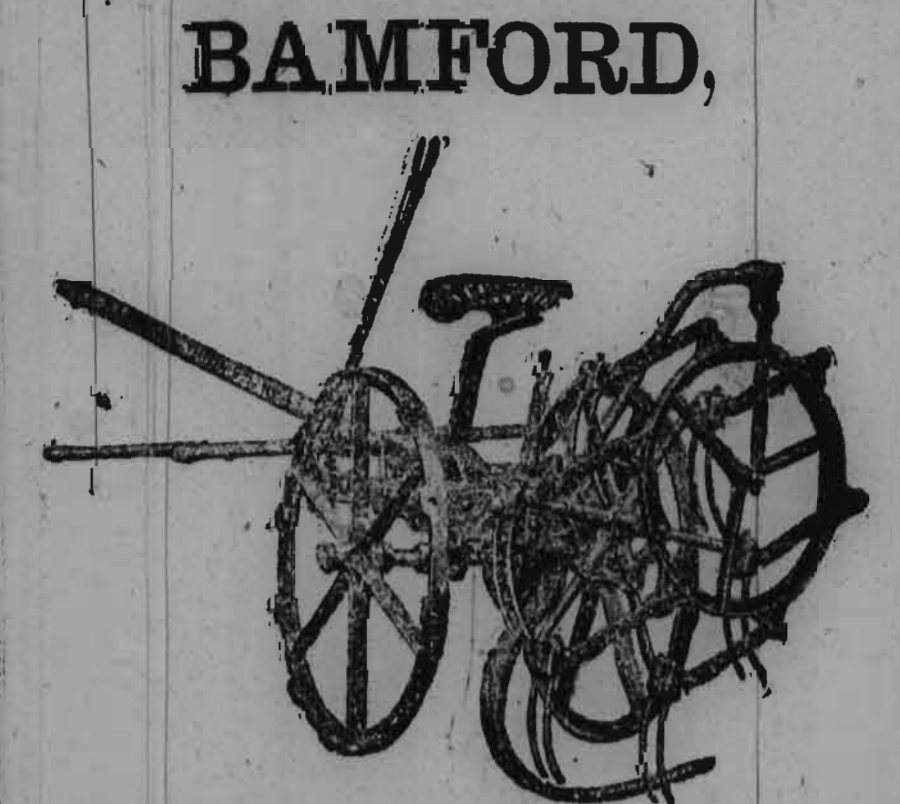
