A Dead Weight Bill

At the last meeting of the Urban Council on Friday the Secretary of the County Council forwarded the demand of his body on the urban area for the coming financial year, which amounts to the amount of £4,378, equal to a rate of 19s. 2d. in the £, or an increase over last year's demand of £2,214. The question is: can the citizens pay that in addition to all the other demands made on them? We say they cannot pay it, unless the amount of which they are to pay is reduced. In addition to this huge demand made by the County Council, which does nothing whatever for the urban area except that the latter have the rather doubtful honour of being associated with them in the ratio of £1 to 1, the Urban Council have in addition to be paying for the ordinary purposes of carrying on the administration of the town, to provide for the repayment of loans under the water and housing schemes, harbour improvements, electric lighting, etc., while at the present moment they have to face a huge expenditure to see the Gleane water-works in working order or the public will die of thirst. The County Council demand alone would mean a rate of 12s. in the £, while the town itself could not possibly be run under a rate of 8s., so that unless some relief is granted the citizens must carefully consider the advisability of having a body and starting operations out of the new scheme in consequence of the fact that they will be free from debt and at liberty to develop their resources along the soundest lines. The largest congregation ever seen in St. Nicholas's Church, Carrick-on-Suir, attended on Sunday night for the closing of the three weeks' mission that was opened on the 1st inst. and was kindly presided over by the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, who delivered a most impressive and timely sermon from the text: "He That Preserves unto the End shall be Saved." The means of perseverance were to be found in prayer and the frequentation of the Sacraments and the avoidance of the occasions of sin. Father Kelly said the priests of the parish had told him that never in their memory had there been so large an attendance at any previous mission. He paid a warm tribute to Canon Sheehy, P.P., and to the other priests of the parish for their help and kindness. After Father Kelly had given the Royal Benediction Most Rev. Dr. Hackett, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, delivered a brief and touching address and gave Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

Archbishop Hayes pronounced the Blessing from the steps of the cathedral while the Governor of New York followed the procession in a motor car.

PUBLICHOUSES IN THE FREE STATE. HUGE TOTAL. EVIDENCE AT COMMISSION.

The first sitting of the Liquor Commission was held in Dublin on Monday last, Mr. J. J. Horgan, solicitor, presided.

In the course of the evidence given it was stated that there was one public-house for every 18 inhabitants in the town of Ballaghadereen.

The terms of reference were—To inquire into and report to the Executive Council on the question of whether the existing number of licences for the sale of intoxicating liquor is in excess of reasonable requirements, and in the event of such excess being found to exist to make recommendations by which an adequate reduction may be effected on an equitable basis.

The Secretary read a letter from the Minister for Justice (Mr. Kevin O'Higgins), who outlined the circumstances leading to the setting-up of the Commission.

The Minister gave the following figures showing the proportion of licensed premises to other premises in the places named—Charlestown—143 total premises; 47 licensed premises. Ballaghadereen—219 total premises; 75 licensed premises.

During the preparation of the report on the existing licensing law (General) Act, 1924, other problems arising out of the existing licensing law were considered.

On the other hand, it was pointed out to him that the licence-holders in many of these towns and villages depended for their profits on the "bona-fide traffic," and that the suppression of this traffic would be the suppression of their livelihood.

Other questions of general importance which in course of the debates on the Licensing Act, 1924, were mentioned as worthy of consideration by a Commission when set up were—(a) The inequality of facilities for Sunday drinking in different areas.

Mr. O'Flynn said he had gone through the testimonials of the applicants for the clerk of works to the waterworks improvement and he considered Messrs. O'Connell, O'Donovan and Spredborough qualified to do the work.

BUILDING UP.

"IRELAND IS GETTING STOUTLY ON ITS FEET."

"The captain and the king have left to the less spectacular statement the task of building up where so much has been pulled down. With a speed sufficient, but not too hasty for solid masonry, the work is proceeding."

Land Commission Defaulter.—In view of the enormous number of defaulters in paying their Land Commission monies with the consequent loss to the finance of the county, the County Council at their meeting on Tuesday passed the following resolution—"The council having had before them the list of defaulting land-owners in the county, view with alarm the serious burden imposed on the rate payers by these defaulters, and that our solicitor be requested to inquire into certain cases. The council also intend publishing the names of the defaulters in the Press." The amount owing to the Land Commission runs into thousands of pounds. In a recent return made the committee was stated to be £11,988, and because of that the Estate Duty Grant of £13,581 4s. 2d., which would have been paid to the council, is withheld as a set-off by the Government, and the county loses that sum. That means that the man who pays his assessments and his rates punctually is heavily penalized by those who do not pay up, and the county as a whole suffers a big financial loss, which it cannot afford to do. In consequence of such conduct the rates go up yearly.

Supt. Ferny—He deserves a little sympathy, as he was in receipt of 2s. a week from the British Government, but lost it when he got the three months. Mr. Troy sentenced defendant to three months' imprisonment with hard labour and advised him not to come there any more.

YOUGHAL COW-TESTING ASSOCIATION. At a meeting of the above Association Mr. W. Farrell, chairman, presided. Mr. J. T. Murphy, Supervisor, read his annual report in which he stated that 184 cows were on test during the year 1924, which gave an average 551 gallons of milk and 28.38 lbs. of butter fat per cow. At the end of the year he compiled a few returns, viz.—(1) The ten best cows gave a yield of 325 gallons of milk and 52.8 lbs. butter fat, and earned £25 7s. 9d. per cow. The ten worst cows gave an average of 341 gallons of milk and 130.59 lbs. butter fat, and earned the sum of £7 19s. 8d. per cow, a difference of £17 19s. 8d. per cow. If all the cows in the Association were equal to the ten best it would mean an extra sum of £1,996 13s. 7d. for the members who adopted cow testing in Youghal. (2) The milk yield of cows on complete lactation was as follows—9 cows under 3,000 lbs.; 15 cows under 4,000 lbs.; 29 cows under 5,000 lbs.; 49 cows under 6,000 lbs.; 35 cows under 7,000 lbs.; 25 cows under 8,000 lbs.; 7 cows under 9,000 lbs.; and 1 cow under 1,000 lbs.

Mr. E. L. Keating, of the Department of Agriculture, gave a very interesting lecture on the treatment and feeding of cattle, after which a vote of thanks was passed to him, on the proposition of the Chairman, seconded by Mr. W. J. Verlin, solicitor.

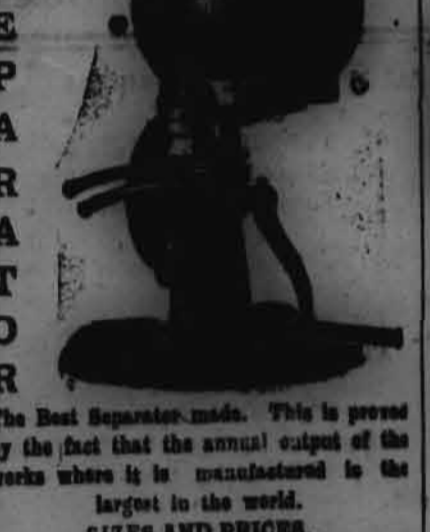

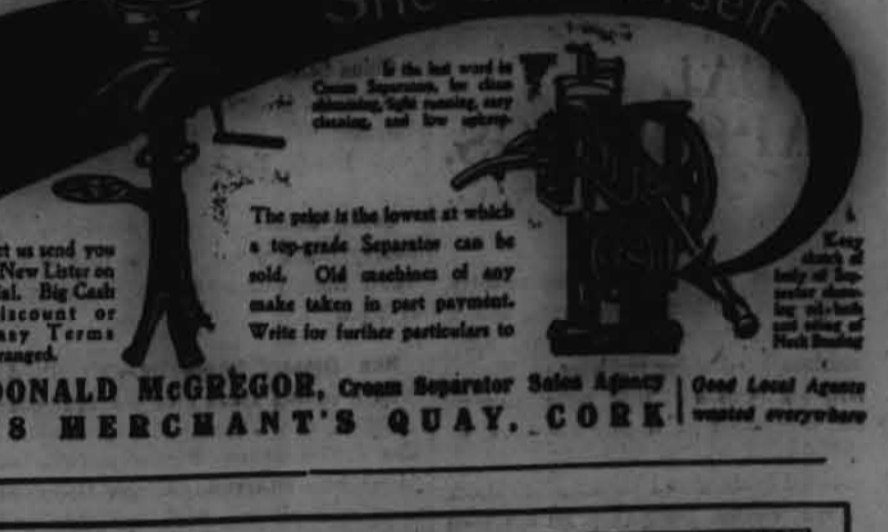
