

DIOCESE OF WATERFORD.

PARISH OF CLASHMORE AND KINSALEBEG.

Saint Mochus, otherwise Cronin, is the Patron Saint of the Parish of Clashmore His feast is kept locally on the 10th Feb reary by visits to and prayers at a holy ill situated near Clashmore and dediested to him. St. Mochus, who was a lisciple of St. Carthage of Lismore, founded here in the 7th century a religious set-tlement where the saint and his household were murdered by pirates about 681. The Apostle, St. Bartholomew, is tradiionally reputed to be the patron of the Parish of Kinsslebeg, and his feast is kept on the 24th August by visits to the lessed well dedicated to him. On the Sunday nearest to the feast a public pattern is held at the well and at the adjoining village of Piltown. The written parochia records go no farther back than the year 810 up to the year 1825 or thereabouts There appears to have been only a single church for the whole parish. This stood at a place still called "Old Chapel Crossroads," where a small piece of wall, said to be the remains of it, is still pointed out. In 1825 the Rev. Michael O'Don-

Long, and the latter was similarly treated in 1891 by the Rev. Jeremiah Long. The parish has six National Schools-Piltown (2), Clashmore (2), Ballycurrar and Tinnock. The present population of the parish is slightly above 2,000. From the baptismal registers it is clear that this is only a fraction of the population 70 or 80 years ago. In 1830, for instance, five years later, they had risen to 217. At

At the date of he Registration of Parish Priests in the beginning of the 18th century Olsahmore Parish was united to Sheehy as parish priest, and Kinsalebe ford, and gave to the latter the first lesson in Latin. Pather Brown was succeeded in the postorate by his nephew, Rev. Wm. Flynn. An old silver chalice still in use

in the parish was provided by Fr. Brown Ed. Prendergast was parish priest in 1810 and was most probably appointed only that year. He was succeeded five years later by Rev. Michael O'Doanell, who built the present churches and died in 1832. Rev. Patrick Quirke, translated from Tours neens, succeeded and held office 12 years to be succeeded by Rev. Michael Purcell transferred from Ring. Rev. Gerald Long became parish priest on the death of Fr. Purcell, and was translated to Aglish in 1852 his brother, Rev. Jeremiah Long, and died at a ripe age in 1903.
