COUNTY COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

Mr. D. Dempsey chairman. Also present—Messrs. Thomas Flynn, John Curran and Patrick Sheridan. All the officials were in attendance.

LOANS FOR FARMERS. The Department wrote stating that the Commissioners of Public Works were now authorized to make loans to farmers for the erection and improvement of buildings, out-offices, hay sheds, etc., also for reclaiming and draining lands, etc.

The loans are to be given for all purposes for 35 years, and the repayment of principal and interest will be 45 to 6d. per cent. In the case of loans for the erection of hay sheds, the terms of repayment of interest and principal is 30 years and the rate 45 1/2d. per cent.

The letter was marked 'noted,' the members stating that hay sheds were very important now.

SHOWS OF BULLS. The Department selected the list of sales for the election of premium bulls as follows—Kilboony, Kanturk, Trillick, Waterford, April 9th; Tipperary, Limerick and Royal Dublin Society's Show.

SUBSIDIES TO SHOWS. The Department wrote approving of the subsidy passed to Lismore Show last year and enclosed copies of the conditions prescribed in clauses for registered dairy animals, which they asked should be forwarded to the secretaries of shows in the county, as they would insist on these conditions being observed in future.

TRIBUTE TO MR. O'KEEFE, AGRICULTURAL INSTRUCTOR. The Secretary of the Department wrote enclosing a summary of a report by one of their Inspectors on a lecture given by Mr. O'Keefe, Instructor in Agriculture for the county. The report stated—'I attended at Coolsman National School on the 25th February in connection with a lecture to be delivered at that centre by Mr. P. O'Keefe, Agricultural Instructor. The lecture was arranged for 7 p.m. and about 40 farmers attended. The instructor in the course of his remarks made reference to the subject of phosphatic manure, and pointed out the value of such manure in the soil, and the value of supplies of high-grade manure not being available in future years. The breeding, feeding and general management of cows, store stock and pig management was dealt with in detail. In this connection the types of each were in demand and the material for the lecture was well selected and practical and evoked some useful discussion, especially in regard to dairy stock.'

Mr. Flynn—It is a great tribute to our Agricultural Instructor. Mr. Curran—A great compliment, Mr. O'Keefe.

SEQUEL TO BANKRUPTCY SALE.

AUCTIONEER HELD UP AND 850 TAKEN. ROBBERY AT CLONEA.

In the public auction of a bankrupt farmer's stock and effects had an unusual sequel last Friday evening when Mr. John Walsh, auctioneer, Waterford, was held up on the road.

The public had the removal of the final proceeds of the sale. By order of Mr. Holmhead, the official assignee, the stock and implements of Mr. Thomas Walsh was sold off his lands at Mooneamane, Clonea, and Mr. John Walsh and Thomas Walsh and Sons, Waterford, was the auctioneer. The sale commenced at 12 o'clock, and there was no evidence of hostility locally, for the implements and stock put up were bought, and the auction was held to have been successful. Between fifty and sixty persons, mostly from the district, attended and bid.

In the afternoon, when his business was completed, Mr. Walsh, together with his assistant, prepared to return to Waterford, when only a few hundred yards out, three masked and armed men stepped on to the road and ordered the chauffeur to pull up the car.

The auctioneer and assistant were ordered to get on to the road by a man with a pointed rifle, and ordered to put their hands up. The other two ruffians were armed with revolvers. They immediately searched Mr. Walsh, from whom they took £500, and were most unscrupulous in the search of the auction, and from the assistant and chauffeur small sums were taken. The ruffians had their faces covered with a white mask, and were men of good stature.

Before leaving one of them fired a shot into the radiator, rendering the car useless. The party were thus left stranded on the road, and it was a considerable time before they got into communication with Waterford, from whence a second car was sent to convey them home.

Military men from Waterford were despatched to Trillick on Saturday, and in conjunction with the Civil Guard, made several searches of houses and persons in the neighbourhood.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS. MINISTER'S DEFINITE DECISION—POLLEN ON 2ND JUNE. A NEW REGISTER.

The Minister for Local Government and Public Health intimates that by Order dated the 28th inst. he has fixed the date for County Council, Borough and Urban District Council and Town Commissioners' elections for the 2nd June next. This is Elections for the 2nd June next. This is a final date and will not be varied. Except in Dublin County no further elections to Rural Councils will take place, and those councils cease to function on the 2nd June. The election of Rural Councils in Dublin County will also take place on the 2nd June. The election of Guardians of the Haldon Union in the urban districts of Blackrock, Dalkey, Dun Laoghaire, Killybeg and Ballybrack is fixed for the 18th June.

These elections will be held on the new register for the preparation of which Revision Sessions will be held immediately. Under the recent Local Government Act, 1925, no person is qualified to be elected a member of a County Council for a county electoral area unless he is either registered as a Local Government elector for that county electoral area or is the owner of property held by freehold leasehold in other tenures within that area. Only persons against whose names the letters 'O' or 'HO' appear in the register are Local Government electors. The register comes into force on the 1st June, and will be published on or before that date in Post Office, Civic Guard Barracks, Courthouse and other similar public places. Copies can then be obtained from the Clerk of the Peace, who is the Registration Officer.

No election will take place for the following councils, which have been dissolved and their functions transferred—Kerry, Leitrim and Offaly County Councils, Cork and Dublin Corporations, Dublin and Tipperary Urban Councils, Cahill Guardians and Roscommon Town Commissioners. The Orders creating county electoral areas in each county will be made immediately. These areas generally the same as at the last election, but the number of members have been altered in conformity with the provisions of the Act, which increased the number of County Councils.
