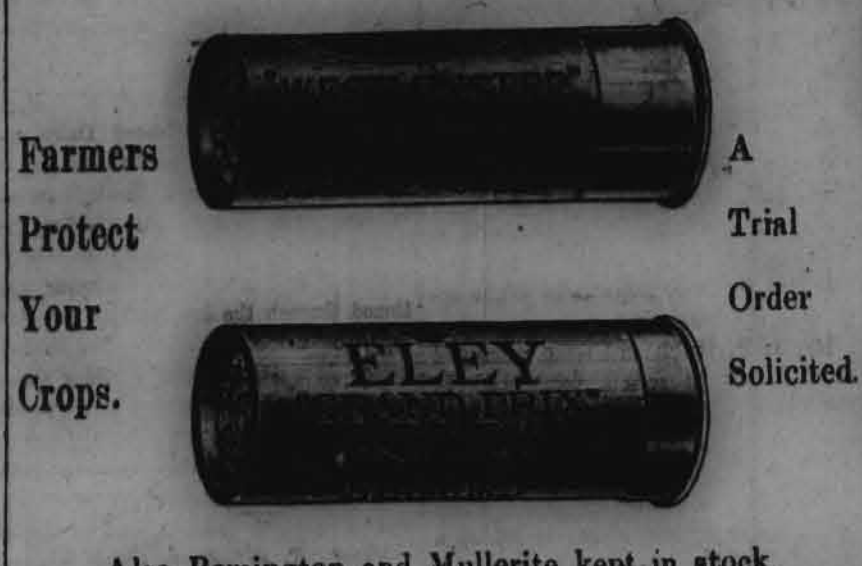

"TO HEARTS OF THE PEOPLE."

MR. DE VALERA'S APPEAL. ARMS DISCARDED "FOR THE MOMENT."

They had turned from the appeal to arms to the appeal to the hearts of the people, said Mr. de Valera, at a gathering at Fermoy, on Sunday in memory of Liam Lynch and his comrades. About 5,000 people were present at Fermoy. A procession, which included representatives of public bodies and a number of bands, marched to Kilmurphy Cemetery, where prayers were recited and the "Last Post" was sounded. Many floral tributes were placed in and around the Republican plot. Many relatives of the deceased attended, including Mrs. Lynch, mother; Mrs. Mullins, sister; John and James Lynch, brothers; J. P. and Eugene Lynch, cousins. Mr. de Valera was accompanied by Miss Annie McFweeney, Cork; Lord Mayor Sean French, do.; Prof. Stockley, Messrs. D. Ceant, T.D.; D. Corkery, T.D.; and W. J. Pave, chairman, Fermoy U.D.C. Mr. de Valera, who was cordially received, said that they had been set aside as a day of general commemoration for all the men who since 1916 had laid down their lives for the Republic. Such pilgrimages were being held all over the country. Having read a list of about 800 names of men and women in Cork City and County, Mr. de Valera asked was it any wonder that the Republic, which had cost so much to the people of Cork, should be enthroned in the hearts of the people? When they were fighting the English directly, the hope of Ireland for the great part lay in Cork, and in Liam Lynch and his soldiers. If Cork rallied again to the standard as it rallied at that time, the Republic was safe. He asked them to wait for a little bit of the unending and unbreakable will of such men as Liam Lynch, Michael Fitzgerald and Terence McSwiney. With the spirit of those men they could not be beaten; they could defy, not merely the powers of the British Empire, but the powers of the world. He remembered meeting Liam Lynch in those sad days in April, 1923, shortly before he met his death, when they began to fear that it could not be any longer possible in arms to maintain the Republic. He knew what his spirit was then—how he would have preferred to die to the last man rather than surrender. Shortly after his death they had to take a different course, and they did it because they believed that, even though they could not for the moment maintain the Republic in arms, it was established in the hearts of the Irish people.

If the people, by pilgrimages such as that, could get even a particle of the spirit of Liam Lynch and Cathal Brugha, then the Republic could be established. No Treason Bill could compel them not to bring into contempt a foreign usurper and all who sided and abetted him. They had turned from the appeal to arms to the appeal to the hearts of the people, the only way for the moment in which they could protect the interests for which Liam Lynch and his comrades died. They asked the people not to let any miserable material advantage that might be gained from compromise lead them to accept the foreigner. Nobody could make informers or renegades of them unless they wanted to be informers and renegades. Mr. Ceant, T.D., also delivered a short address.

News—This is the old or close season with the Press, and there is practically nothing going on which a "fear-mind-beats" could string a couple of lines, not to mention a column or even a half or quarter column. It is one of those periods when one is compelled to draw on the imagination and "pad" out contributions in the shape of anonymous letters dealing with such questions as "Sea Serpents" and the like. Take the past week, for instance. There was not a single word on local function of any kind to fill up a stray column or two. In the columns of the Cork Press poor old Eochail is still coming in for hard knocks. One writer dubbed it "the washed out remnant of a bathing place." Isn't that a pretty expensive phrase, calculated, if not intended, to do as far as possible in the eyes of the travelling and holiday-making public? The writer evidently wants all kinds of (what he deems) good things to be supplied for the benefit of people who, perhaps, would condescend to run down of an evening to have a high time of it—on a boat, a bus, in a word, up-to-date appliances for all kinds. It seems a genuine instance of "the best hurler is the man on the ditch." Viewing the play from a safe vantage point, he can tell quite easily how the game should be fought or he can sail in his hand, shove him into the net, and the time is changed in a twinkling. The recent Press controversy about the backwardness of the Youghal "City Fathers" in coming forward to cater for all and sundry visitors brings to mind the fact that for some 30 years a gentleman holding an important official position in Glasgow came to Youghal regularly to spend his summer vacation. On one occasion he was asked how it was he left all the swell watering places behind him to bury himself in this unchallenged seaside resort down at the other end of Ireland—the Free State rather. "Well, you see, it's this way," he said. "Across Channel, the watering places consist largely of mud and concrete. Here, I got a bit of nature still around. For some ten months of the year I can have all kinds of amusements and recreation, every day and night in the week. The result is that I want to get away from it once for a while. Otherwise it would be no change and no holiday." This is a long way to explain the continued popularity of this "washed-out remnant of a bathing place," don't they?

It would, I am sure, surprise the 'Fathers' how well those people cater for the visitors, but we shall be content with a little attraction, and perhaps for suggestions what local bodies have done to bring visitors to their seaside. It should be an easy matter to get in touch with some such troupe.

1. Arrange to run a special train at 7 p.m. from the city every Wednesday evening, returning at 10.30 p.m.

"TO HEARTS OF THE PEOPLE"

MR. DE VALERA'S APPEAL.

ARMS DISCARDED "FOR THE MOMENT."

These had turned from the appeal to arms to the appeal to the hearts of the people, and Mr. de Valera, at his gathering at Fermoy, on Sunday in memory of Liam Lynch and his comrades.

About 8,000 people were present at Fermoy. A procession, which included representatives of public bodies and a number of bands, marched to Kilmurray Cemetery, where prayers were recited and the "Last Post" was sounded. Many floral tributes were placed in and around the Republican plot.

Many relatives of the deceased attended, including Mrs. Lynch, mother; Mrs. Mullins, sister; John and James Lynch, brothers; J. F. and Eugene Lynch, cousins.

Mr. de Valera was accompanied by Miss Annie McIlwain, Cork; Lord Mayor Sean French, Dublin; Prof. Stockley, Moscow, D. Coast, T.D.; D. Corkey, T.D.; and W. J. Ryan, chairman, Fermoy U.D.C.

Mr. de Valera, who was cordially received, said that day had been set aside as a day of general commoration for all the men who since 1916 had laid down their lives for the Republic. Such pilgrimages were being held all over the country.

Having read a list of about 200 names of men and women in Cork City and County, Mr. de Valera asked was it any wonder that the Republic, which had cost so much to the people of Cork, should be forgotten in the hearts of the people?

When they were fighting the English directly, the hope of Ireland for the great part lay in Cork, said in Liam Lynch and his soldiers. If Cork rallied again to the standard as it rallied at that time, the Republic was safe. He asked them to wish for a little bit of the unending and unshakable will of such men as Liam Lynch, Michael Fitzgerald and Terence McSwiney.

With the spirit of those men they could not be beaten; they could defy, not merely the powers of the British Empire, but the powers of the world.

He remembered meeting Liam Lynch in those sad days in April, 1923, shortly before he met his death, when they began to fear that it could not be any longer possible in arms to maintain the Republic. He knew that his spirit was then—how he would have preferred to die to the last man rather than surrender. Shortly after his death they had to take a different counsel, and they did it because they believed that, even though they could not for the moment maintain the Republic in arms, it was established in the hearts of the Irish people.

If the people, by pilgrimages such as that, could get even a particle of the spirit of Liam Lynch and Michael Fitzgerald, then the Republic could be established. No Treason Bill could compel them not to bring into contempt a foreign usurper and all who aided and abetted him.

They had turned from the appeal to arms to the appeal to the hearts of the people, the only way for the moment in which they could protect the interests for which Liam Lynch and his comrades died. They asked the people not to let any miserable material advantage that might be gained from compromise lead them to forget the longer.

Nobody could make informers or renegades of them unless they wanted to be informers and renegades.

Mr. Conant, T.D., also delivered a short address.

KILMATHOMAS WATER SUPPLY.

SWORN INQUIRY.

On Tuesday, 7th inst., at the Office of the Rural District Council, Mr. Michael Ryan, Engineering Inspector of the L.G. Department, held a Sworn Inquiry into the application of the said Council for sections to a loan of £1,250 for the provision of a supplemental water supply to Kilmathomas.

The Council was represented by Mr. J. P. Williams, solicitor, Dungarvan, and Mr. E. O'Connor, solicitor, Waterford, opposed the scheme on three counts on behalf of Messrs. Nicholas Wall, T.D., John Kiersey, Nicholas Fitzgerald, Pat. Nugent and Patrick Buckley and others whose names were not mentioned, and all Messrs. John Kiersey, Nicholas Fitzgerald, Pat. Nugent and Patrick Buckley and others who were present on Mr. O'Connor's side.

Mr. Williams was the first witness called, and, in reply to Mr. Williams, stated that the amount of the loan applied for was £1,250, at the rate of 5 per cent interest, to be borrowed from the Provincial Bank, Ltd., Kilmathomas, and repayable within a period of 10 years by half-yearly instalments of principal and interest. The valuation of the district is £28,600 lvs., and it was proposed to make the rural district the area of charge. The amount of loan outstanding in respect of the existing water supply was £42 15s. The original amount borrowed in 1895 for that scheme was £200. The present rate on loans in the district was 8 1/2 in the £, exclusive of grants, and a 1/2 in the £ inclusive of grants. The population of the rural district area at 1st April, 1924, was 660. Continuing, witness read extracts from minutes since 1912, when the present supply was found defective, and gave the number of reports made by the late M.O.H. (Dr. O'Brien), and the present M.O.H. (Dr. Foley), complaining of the present inadequate water supply, as well as the number of diphtheria cases admitted to hospital from time to time up to the amalgamation of the union. His annual estimate and demand for the financial year ending March, 1925, was £484 less than the previous demand. The late M.O.H., Dr. O'Brien, wrote under date 30th April, 1912: "The water supply for Kilmathomas is altogether inadequate, and at present most uncertain. Unless a proper and very ample supply is provided, an epidemic may at any time take place, and, as a medical officer of health, I cannot be responsible. I have frequently drawn your attention to this very grave danger to the health of the district."

On the 26th August, 1912, the late M.O.H. wrote as follows: "I hereby request you that I have to again call your attention to the inadequate water supply in Kilmathomas. Its continuance will surely lead to an outbreak of some virulent epidemic." He (doctor) recommended that, "pending the procuring of a larger supply, no bath and urgently needed, immediate steps be taken to remedy the leakage from the present supply."

Copy of letter received from Mr. Jephson, engineer, dated 26th April, 1912: "As directed by the District Council, I have made an examination of the water supply to Kilmathomas to ascertain extent of failure of the present supply. I find on taking levels that the service reservoir is only sufficiently high to command four or five houses in the village, and contains only 1,800 gallons, and the principal houses have no supply for flushing purposes except by the rise of force pumps. In my opinion a proper supply of high level to command the village, and the Council have full power to take any steps for this purpose by getting the Provisional Order and need not pay for any extra surface drainage where the water is not used for other purposes. There are different schemes that might be considered. First I would recommend the Council to approach the Railway Company for permission to get a supply from the same source as the station is supplied from. This could be done by constructing a concrete reservoir on the line of pipes supplying the

station tank, and to have the supply to the station taken off this reservoir at a lower level than the supply to the village. I think there would be an ample supply from this source for the village. There are 6 public pumps erected in the rural district by the Council, as well as the Kilmathomas and Stradhally waterworks. Within the past five years expenses have been incurred for their upkeep and repair as follows:—Stradhally waterworks, £112 10s. 8d.; Kilmathomas waterworks, £25 18s. 8d.; Newtown pump, £20 0s. 9d.; Bonmahon and Knockmahon pumps, £24 12s.; Briskay pump, £40 4s. 6d.; Kill pump, £5 5s.; Kealfoss pump, £5 9s.; Dunhill pump, £4 1s. 11d. There are eight cesspools, whose combined value total £28 10s. annually. As long as I remember, the above charges are, and have been, levied off the Rural District of Kilmathomas. By a Sealed Order dated the 18th May, 1899, No. 33/M/99, the old Local Government Board fixed the Kilmathomas waterworks as a permanent charge on the rural district.

Examined by Mr. O'Connor, Mr. Morrissey stated that Mr. Drohan's lease with the Railway Company expired last October. He (witness) did not know if Mr. Drohan was getting paid by the company since then. He had a sample of the water taken from the source more than a week ago and forwarded to the public analyst, Miss Ryan, Dublin; but her report has not yet been received. He wired her on Saturday and will wire her again today.

Mr. O'Connor—Are not the rates higher this year than last year? Witness—I believe they are, but I am only giving you the figures I got at the County Council Office. I have nothing to do with the striking of the rate.

Mr. Williams—You would want Mr. O'Sullivan here for that. Mr. O'Connor—And, Mr. Morrissey, you told us a moment ago that your rates were reduced by £641. Witness—I said no such thing, but that my estimate for the ensuing year was £641 less than the previous year. As between the county and district charges I have nothing to do.

Mr. O'Connor—Are you aware that Kilmathomas is the highest rated district in the county? Witness—I don't know.

Mr. O'Connor—Can you deny it? Witness—I cannot, but I would not be surprised, owing to the malicious claims.

Here Mr. O'Connor quoted the rates levied on Carrick-on-Suir, Clonmel, Dungarvan and Lismore.

Mr. O'Connor—Are you aware that the decrees given in the several malicious injury cases were county-at-large charges? Witness—No.

Mr. O'Connor—Did you not get a return of these from the County Council or from your solicitor? Witness—No, the only document I got was from Mr. Williams recently showing the amount claimed in each case and the amount allowed by the Judge.

Mr. Williams—The number of cases I was engaged in were county charges.

Questioned as to the several witnesses said that that was a matter for the engineer.

Further cross-examination, witness produced the minutes of the 23rd December last, when a petition was received by the Council signed by 57 residents and rate-payers in Kilmathomas praying for the proposed water supply.

Mr. O'Connor—Did you go round to get that petition signed? Witness—I did not.

Mr. O'Connor—Who did? Witness—Mr. E. Hill—I did.

To Mr. Morrissey—Where is the original? Witness—With the Local Government Department.

Mr. O'Connor—You got directions to send it on? Witness—Yes.

Since she lost the priceless jewel of her sanctity, not all the sanctity of her children, not all the Christianity and holy zeal displayed by the inmates of her religious houses, not all the martyrs' blood shed since the Reformation ever procured the honour of canonization for one of her subject race. MAN WHO STOLE £400,000. MOST POPULAR U.S. BANDIT TO BE SENT TO THE GALLOWS.

Gerald Chapman, described in New York as "America's most popular super bandit," was, after a remarkable trial, sentenced to die on the gallows at Hartford, Connecticut on Saturday last.

Partly because of his ruthless bravery and partly because of his spectacular escapes and hairbreadth escapes, Chapman has for years excited the sentimental sympathy of kith and kin.

After his historic coup—the robbery in New York of a post office van containing \$400,000 worth of securities—Chapman, a true "amateur crackman," lived in one of the most fashionable sections of New York. He was known as the "Count of Granary-square." With a beautiful girl from the middle West who was ignorant of his crimes, he lived in a fine house, kept an expensive motor car which was driven by one of his accomplices and spent at the rate of \$200 a day.

At intervals he journeyed to different parts of the country and committed robberies. Among other acts of daring he held up an express train near Niagara Falls, rifling the mail coach of £15,000. A detective, who is an excellent actor, finally unmasked him. Posing as a safe-blower, the detective gained the complete confidence of Chapman's confidential man, a large force of police officers aided the man's aristocratic residence, where they found securities worth £100,000, and an elaborate wardrobe, consisting of more than 20 suits of clothes.

Chapman's thrilling escape subsequently from Tlanta Gasol, his receptacle when wounded in Florida, and his escape from a prison hospital have raised him to the front rank in the criminal world of the United States.

Finally he robbed a safe in New Britain, Connecticut, shot dead one of the policemen who surprised him, and again escaped, to be arrested six months later in Illinois. It was his vanity that finally led to his conviction. He had kept the pistol with which he shot the policeman.

THE NEW ULSTER PARLIAMENT. REDUCED GOVERNMENT PARTY.

The Northern Ireland Parliamentary Election returns are completed, and the composition of the new House of Commons is as follows:—

In Belfast the Government lost three seats to Labour and three to the Independent Unionists, and in County Antrim the Nationalists gained four seats from the Anti-Treaty Party. All Cabinet Ministers were returned.

Prominent among the candidates defeated were Mr. D. McGaw, K.C., Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Home Affairs, who lost his seat in County Antrim to the Farmers' nominee, Mr. E. Y. Burn, Junior Whip, who was beaten by Labour in West Belfast. The Government will also have to appoint a new Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Education and Commerce in place of Mr. J. McKewen, who did not seek re-election.

The biggest individual vote obtained was that of Mr. Joe Devlin, who received 17,000 first preference votes in West Belfast. He was 9,000 over the quota. In Derry and Tyrone-Fermanagh the Nationalists and Unionist decided the seats.

Lismore District Court

Before Mr. G. P. Farrell, B.L., D.J. CIVIL BILLS. The civil bills were first taken up by Michael O'Mahony and Andrew Glancy for £12 15s. 5d for work done—carpentry, etc.

Mr. Carroll, solicitor, for plaintiff. STRANGE CASE. John Prendergast and Pat. Prendergast, minors, of Brideane Lower v. John Dunne, same locality, charged that on 14th March and on divers other dates within four months prior to said 14th day of March, 1925, they did unlawfully and through express malice by looks, gestures and conduct, did put each of the complainants in fear and terror and thereby prevent them from performing their ordinary duties in life.

Mr. A. Carroll, solicitor, appeared for the two little boys, Prendergast's, and Mr. E. A. Ryan, solicitor, said Dunne, with alleged trespass of cattle on his land on the 25th March. Mr. Carroll, solicitor, for plaintiff, and Mr. Ryan, solicitor, defended. Evidence was given by plaintiff of the fact that he had received instructions in a civil action against defendant, which would not act in this case. The Justice addressed the defendant, who is a farmer in Brideane, and said during the adjournment of a month that whatever had been going on there should cease, and that the defendant agreed to a month.

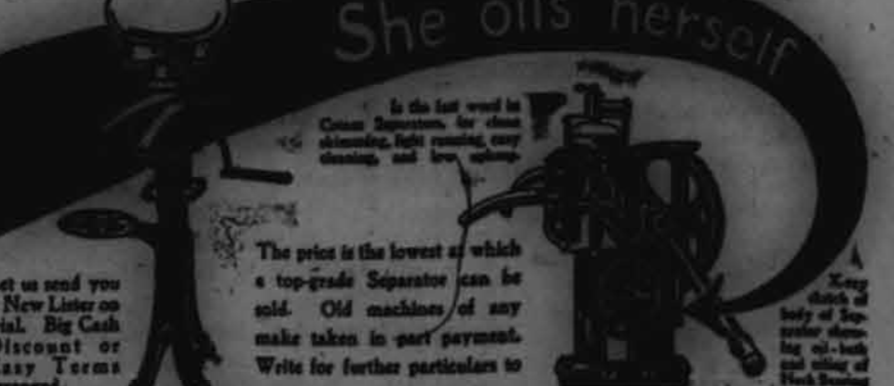
