DUNGARVAN AGRICULTURAL SHOW.

The annual meeting of the Dungarvan Agricultural Show was held in the Courthouse on Good Friday, Mr. J. A. Lynch presiding. Also present—Messrs. T. F. Kely, T. Flynn, T. Casey, D. Dempsey, J. O'Dwyer, P. Sexton, D. Fraher, P. A. Walsh, M. Brennock, N. Draper, T. A. Moloney, N. Fitzgerald, John Knych (secretary).

The Secretary submitted statement of accounts and balance sheet for the year 1924, as also for the year 1925, when owing to the strike no show was held. The statement of accounts showed the total receipts as £224 1s., and the balance to credit after clearing of all liabilities as £21 8s. 7d.

Prior to the publication of the accounts, the Secretary asked that an auditor be appointed to audit the accounts. In the past he had the services of the hon. sec. (Mr. Joe Moloney) in connection with the matter, and no man did more to make the show the success it was in the past year.

Mr. Casey proposed that the accounts be audited by Mr. J. O'Donovan, who was well qualified to do the work. Mr. O'Dwyer proposed that a chartered accountant be appointed to audit the accounts and have them done in a business-like manner.

Mr. Brennock—Our secretary had very able assistance in the past, for which we are well qualified to do the work. Mr. Casey said a local man would do quite well, and they need not go to the expense of an auditor from Dublin or Cork.

Mr. Stack—Bob Tutty has great experience in auditing accounts, and a better man you could not get. I will propose him.

Mr. O'Dwyer—If we are to have an auditor let us have an outside man. Two or three guineas will cover his fee. I propose that a chartered accountant be employed. Mr. Flynn seconded.

Mr. Casey—What will the audit cost? Mr. Moloney—I would not cost £5 5s. The accounts can be sent on to him.

Mr. O'Dwyer—If you have not a chartered accountant his audit will carry no weight. Mr. Casey—Will Mr. O'Dwyer guarantee that the audit will be done for £2 2s. 7d. Mr. O'Dwyer—I will guarantee nothing.

After much discussion a vote was taken as to the appointment of a chartered accountant to audit the accounts of the committee as follows:— For—Messrs. Flynn, O'Dwyer, Kely, Fitzgerald, Draper, Moloney and Chairman—7. Against—Messrs. Casey, Brennock, Sexton, Walsh, Dempsey, Stack—6.

Mr. Fraher did not vote. It was decided to employ a chartered accountant, and on the motion of Mr. O'Dwyer, seconded by Mr. Flynn, the Secretary was directed to write to the auditors, who are accustomed to come to town and have their figures for doing the work.

Sympathy. On the motion of the Chairman, seconded by Mr. Walsh, the following resolution of sympathy was passed in silence:—"That we beg to tender to our esteemed colleague, Mr. Michael Power, O'Connell street, the expression of our deepest sympathy on the great loss he has sustained by the death of his daughter."

Re-organisation Scheme. The next business was the re-organisation of the committee in accordance with the resolution of the Conference held in January last when it was held that in view of the fact that the committee had been 10 years in existence and that many members were not attending meetings, etc., as they should, the time had come when all should resign and a beginning from the foundation made.

The Chairman explained at length the results of the Conference of the 6th January, when the above decision was arrived at, and said that the committee was first started in 1915. Since then successful shows were held each year with the exception of 1923, when the strike intervened, and through good days and bad days they had travelled on, winding up with a credit balance of £21 8s. 7d. at the end of the time. In troublesome times that was something to be proud of, and when other shows of far greater pretensions got into financial difficulties and fell by the wayside, in Dungarvan they far more than held their own, and while extending the ramifications of the show and winning golden opinions from all exhibitors as well as the general public—which money could not buy—they still had a credit to their account. The new committee to be formed that day would have the advantage of taking over a fully going concern, and by the infusion of a new spirit and new energy, make it of still greater advantage to the community as a whole.

Election of Committee and Officers. The old committee and officers having resigned, Mr. John Lynch proposed that all present form a new committee with power to add to their numbers. Mr. Dempsey seconded. Passed.

Mr. Flynn proposed that Mr. J. A. Lynch, outgoing president, be re-elected, and after some delay the latter accepted the position for the present year, but maintaining that the office should go round amongst the members.

On the motion of Mr. Dempsey, seconded by Mr. Kely, Mr. P. J. Moloney was re-elected hon. sec. and on the motion of Mr. Flynn, seconded by Mr. O'Dwyer, Mr. John Lynch was re-elected secretary.

It was ordered that no hon. sec. be appointed to the Industrial Section this year.

RECENT YOUGHAL DROWNING.

INQUEST.

Coroner Dr. Moloney, Dungarvan, opened an inquest at Monroon, Co. Waterford, on Friday evening into the circumstances attending the death of Wm. Quirk, of Port St. Mary, Isle of Man, who was drowned at Youghal on Tuesday evening, 14th inst.

Supt. Murray, Dungarvan, represented a jury from the neighbourhood (Mr. Patrick Stanton, foreman) having been sworn.

Thomas-Roddy, Ferryport, deposed that on Thursday afternoon he was gathering seaweed on the beach when he saw an object in the water. He went over and saw it was the body of a man. He then called three men, who assisted him in bringing the body up the beach. The man was dead. Witness remained in charge of the body till the Garda's arrived.

Mr. Thomas Murray, builder, Youghal, deposed that he knew deceased. He saw him last alive on Tuesday at about 10.30 a.m. before the steamer landed off from the quay. He took him to be about 21 years of age. He was second engineer of the steamer "Ben Zee" of Ramsey.

He saw the remains and identified them as being the remains of Wm. Quirk, Port St. Mary, Isle of Man. He was unmarried. His father and mother were living in Port St. Mary.

Bergan, Youghal, Civic Guard, Ardmore, deposed that acting on a message received from Youghal he proceeded to Monroon on Thursday evening. He was accompanied by Supt. Murray and a Civic Guard. They saw the dead body of a man who had been washed ashore. Sergeant O'Shughnessy and O'Sullivan were in charge when he arrived. He searched the clothes of the dead man and found a sum of 6s. 6d. in a pocket. In a later search he found a money order for the sum of 22 issued at Youghal on the 14th and payable at Port St. Mary, Isle of Man. There were marks on face and hand, but they could be accounted for by being dashed against the rocks. He wired to the captain of the "Ben Zee."

Dr. James F. Rosnyne, Ardshagh, deposed that he had made a superficial examination of the body. In his opinion the injuries to the face and head were only superficial and were caused post mortem. Death was due to drowning.

The Superintendent said he was not at that stage in a position to give any direct proof as to how the accident occurred. The "Ben Zee" was at sea at present with the captain and the deceased's companion, who was with him in the boat on the occasion. A telegram had been received from the owners asking to have the body handed over to the harbour-master of Youghal for transport to Liverpool and asking to have the inquest adjourned for the captain's attendance.

The Coroner said he could see no advantage to be gained by an adjournment beyond the fact that it could have the evidence of an eye-witness as to how the thing actually happened. They were not concerned with the matter, they only wanted to know the cause of death. They had it from the medical witness that the cause of death was drowning, and he thought it would be unfair to ask the jury to attend another day.

Foreman—There is no question of foul play. Superintendent—No, but I have produced no evidence as to how he got into the water. The only danger from the point of view of the authorities was that the question might arise as to how the man got into the water. He could not be seen to have fallen overboard. The Coroner said he had no objection to facilitate everybody and adjourn for the attendance of the captain or the man who was with the deceased in the boat, but it was not a matter for a Coroner's inquiry. The jury could if they so wished bring in a verdict to the effect that the cause of death was drowning, and that there was no evidence to show how deceased got into the water.

The Superintendent said he was inspired by the best of motives in asking for an adjournment so as to clear up any doubt as to the cause of death. He could produce evidence to show that the deceased fell accidentally into the water.

Ultimately the jury found a verdict of death by drowning in accordance with the medical testimony, there being no evidence to show how deceased got into the water.

The foreman of the jury asked to have their sympathy conveyed to the relatives of the deceased, and Supt. Murray, the Coroner, and Mr. T. Murray associated themselves with the expression.

SELLING DRINK IN A LANEWAY. INTERESTING POINT RAISED.

In a case at Carrick-on-Suir District Court on Monday in which Nora Nolan, publican, Bridge street, was charged with selling two bottles of stout on Sunday night, March 1st, to a man named Walsh, who was given the stout in a laneway near the public-house by the publican after he (Walsh) had knocked and shined through the door, "two stouts for Walsh of Carrickbeg."

Mr. Verrington, solicitor, for the defendant, said his client was charged with the sale of drink at an unlicensed place. That raised the point as to whether drink delivered to order at private houses and elsewhere and paid for on delivery was not an illegal sale.

Mr. McCabe, D.J., said he would adjourn the case to next court to look into the point raised by Mr. Verrington.

Sergt. Thomson said the Garda's had great difficulty in effecting the sale of drink in these public-houses that have lanes adjoining them.

YOUGHAL NOTES.

Read this!

Summer Time was ushered in on Sunday morning, supposed to be in the middle of spring, on a wintry day as possibly could be. The wind blew steadily from the East, but the temperature was on the rise, but a pitiless cold rain fell steadily all through the day till well into the afternoon. From the meteorological point of view it was as contradictory a set of conditions as well could be imagined. Outing of any kind was utterly out of the question, apart from the casual compliance with the requirements of the Sabbath. If there is any truth in the old saying: "Well begun is half done," then we are in for a nice time of it. However, there is a chance of the universal law of compensation coming to our rescue.

The New Regime under which we live in our own country is, it goes without saying, a great improvement in very many ways on that which obtained in the very recent past. It is acknowledged by all authorities that the study of history is a most important branch of education, but we are of any practical utility, we must endeavour to appreciate at their proper value, and also to put into the practice, the lessons it inculcates. It is not every one amongst us who has the leisure to dip deeply into ancient history, but we can all take a general survey of the history of our own times in the recent past and apply the lessons to be learned therefrom to our present every-day life. In former times there were two societies active in our midst—the N.S.P.C. and the N.R.P.C.—which did a lot of good by presenting a lot of harm. Although the Irish as a race are not inclined to inflict cruelty either on children or animals, still there are some amongst us who inflict cruelty on both. It is for the purpose of having a watchful eye on those evildoers that those societies were founded. Judging by reports which appear in the Press from time to time poor dumb beasts come in for a hard lot rather too frequently. The N.S.P.C. has ceased to exist amongst us, and all the odds is thrown on the Civic Guards. It is something to be grateful for that they seem determined to prosecute all persons found cruelly ill-treating animals, and District Justices have expressed their determination to punish any person guilty of these offences. As regards the N.R.P.C., it is announced that a meeting will be held in the Town Hall at 12 o'clock on Wednesday next on behalf of the Society, and that Mr. J. W. Stony, B.A., M.B.E., Organising Secretary for Ireland, will be present. It is a flourishing branch of this laudable Society existed in the town, a large number of the prominent ladies of the place being active members. It is to be hoped that they will once again take up this very praiseworthy work and make a good beginning by being in large numbers at next Wednesday's meeting.

Are We Drowsy-headed? No, emphatically no—if you are to judge by the number of amusements going, the crowds enjoying them, and the whole-hearted manner in which the people throw themselves into them—dancing, picture shows, and entertainments of all kinds. This question formed the subject of a leading article in a certain daily paper of late. It went on to say that amusement seemed to be one of the most "serious" concerns of the Irish people of late, and listed that far from being a waste of time being spent on it, it does seem rather inconsistent to be so concerned with the badness of the times and the scarcity of employment, and at the same time to see all kinds of recreation and amusement patronised as extensively as, if not more so than, they were ever in the most prosperous days of the past. Some go the length of saying that some of those extremists in the matter of amusements—or at least their families—look at times for assistance to charitable associations. No sane person can object to a reasonable amount of enjoyment and recreation, but there ought to be a limit. On Sunday last we had quite a variety of amusements to pick and choose from. After their week's work the people deserved some recreation and they certainly had it. A most enjoyable entertainment was given in the Town Hall under the auspices of the Y.C.M.S. by the Rev. J. C. O'Flynn, etc., Cork, assisted by a choir from the Presentation Convent Schools. Father O'Flynn made a name for himself long since locally. A large audience attended, and judging by their frequent applause, relished every item given. The filmed version of Hall Caine's "Eternal City" was shown to a crowded house in Messrs. Harst's Picture Palace, where the entertainment was varied by a new song, "Paradise Alley," sung to perfection by Miss Maggie Harrington. A fine picture, "Sarging Waves," was exhibited in Messrs. Hogan's Picture Theatre. In both houses a splendid orchestra enlivened the proceedings.

ST. NICHOLAS'S CHURCH, CARRICK-ON-SUIR. A debt of nearly £1,000 on St. Nicholas Catholic Church, Carrick-on-Suir, has been cleared off by a bazaar, concerts and drawing of prizes, in the organisation of which the people of the town showed much interest and zeal. A performance of Gilbert and Sullivan's "Patience" by the pupils and ex-pupils of the Presentation Convent, and concerts organised by the Mercy Convent Sisters and pupils realised a large sum. A concert at St. Nicholas' Church attracted a large congregation. Very Rev. Canon Sheehy, P.P., D.D., V.F., and the other priests of the parish were very active in assisting all the functions held to clear off the debt. The £1,000 was made up in about five weeks, and much attention was felt that the church debt had been cleared off.

A sugar beet factory is to be established by a Belgian firm. The agricultural grant will be doubled.
