LISMORE TOWN COMMISSIONERS. BALLYDUFF (UPPER) NOTES.

FIVE PROGRESSIVE CANDIDATES SECURE SEATS OUT OF 9.

Falling for the above took place at the Lismore Library on Tuesday. Mr. John O'Connell, Town Clerk, acted as Presiding Officer, and on Wednesday acted in the capacity of Returning Officer. Everything passed off remarkably quiet and little or no excitement prevailed. Eleven candidates sought election for the nine seats on the Town Commissioners' Board. The various candidates' agents were busy in the vicinity of the booths. One feature of the polling was that fifty per cent. had polled about noon, and the officials had a busy time until well into the afternoon. The day was remarkably fine, the sun giving of its very best, making the Library building a proverbial glass-house. When it is a possible 42), one must honestly admit that the citizens of Lismore Urban exercised their franchise.

At the close of the poll and when seats had been fixed, the ballot box was locked in the Library until 10 a.m. on Wednesday morning when the count started. Mr. John O'Connell was returning Officer, assisted by Mr. James Healy, acting clerk, and everything passed off with remarkable smoothness, and by noon the result of the first count was made known.

The names of the candidates were—Messrs. Thomas Crotty (P.), T. E. O'Shea, John C. Healy (P.), D. L. Noonan (P.), John Goulding, E. A. Murphy (P.), Tim Duggan, John Bennett, John Keyes, Moe. McCarthy (P.), and Andrew Hickey, P.C. (P.).

The first count resulted as follows—Bennett, 11; Crotty, 64; Duggan, 16; Goulding, 33; Healy, 36; Hickey, 54; Keyes, 15; McCarthy, 14; Murphy, 13; Noonan, 31; O'Shea, 63.

The quota being 36, Mr. O'Connell, Returning Officer, declared the following elected on the first count in the following order—Mr. Crotty first, Mr. O'Shea second, Mr. Hickey third, and Mr. Healy fourth.

The surplus of Mr. Crotty's 28 was distributed as follows—Bennett, 2; Goulding, 5; McCarthy, 3; Murphy, 13; Duggan, 2; Noonan, 6. Keyes did not benefit by Crotty's surplus, and the result was declared—Bennett, 13; Duggan, 19; Goulding, 38; Keyes, 15; McCarthy, 17; Murphy, 26; Noonan, 40.

There were 7 non-transferable votes. Mr. O'Connell now declared Mr. Noonan elected fifth and Mr. Goulding sixth.

The distribution of Mr. O'Shea's surplus papers were now taken up with the following result—Bennett, 5; Duggan, 9; Keyes, 10; McCarthy, 1; Murphy, 4. There were 11 non-transferable votes, and as no one reached the quota, no candidate secured election.

The candidates now stood as follows—Bennett, 16; Duggan, 27; Keyes, 25; McCarthy, 18; and Murphy, 29.

The surplus of Mr. Hickey's votes were now dealt with. There were 7 non-transferable votes in this count, which resulted in Bennett, 1; Duggan, 2; Keyes, 3; McCarthy, 4; Murphy, 9, which left the candidates as follows—Bennett, 17; Duggan, 29; Keyes, 27; McCarthy, 22; and Murphy, 38.

The Returning Officer now declared Mr. Murphy elected, and said the next was the consideration of the transfer of Mr. Crotty's surplus to Noonan.

Mr. Murphy questioned and asked should the procedure be the re-distribution of all Mr. Noonan's papers.

The Returning Officer read the Act dealing with the subject and ruled as stated above. The distribution of Mr. Crotty's papers to Noonan and this resulted in Bennett getting 1, Keyes, 1; McCarthy, 2; Mr. Duggan did not receive any support from this count.

The candidates now stood—Bennett, 18; Duggan, 29; Keyes, 28; McCarthy, 24. The quota was not reached in this count and no one was elected, and the Returning Officer said all he had to do was deal with Mr. Murphy's surplus of 2, and as the 2 would not bring the lowest man equal to the next, he had nothing to do but leave it to the dead and eliminate Mr. Bennett.

Mr. Murphy asked why all his papers were not dealt with. Returning Officer—Simply because his surplus of 2 would only bring 18 to 20 and the next candidate has 24. If you dispute that, said Mr. O'Connell, you can take action.

The Act having been read, Mr. Murphy acquiesced, and Mr. Bennett was eliminated, and the result of this was Mr. Duggan got 7, bringing him to 36 (the quota). Mr. Keyes got 5, making 31, and Mr. McCarthy got 3, making 27.

The Returning Officer declared Mr. Duggan (36) elected and eliminated Mr. McCarthy being 27, and declared Mr. Keyes also elected with 31 votes, the latter candidate not having reached the quota.

Mr. Bennett, who had represented the candidates in the booth, said—On behalf of Mr. Crotty, who had headed the poll, and the other candidates he had great pleasure in proposing a vote of thanks to the Returning Officer for the able, courteous and dignified manner he conducted the polling and perfected the arrangements. It was due to Mr. O'Connell and his staff that the results were issued so promptly and that the final count was declared at 4.15 p.m.

Mr. Murphy seconded the vote of thanks with which Mr. Healy desired to be associated.

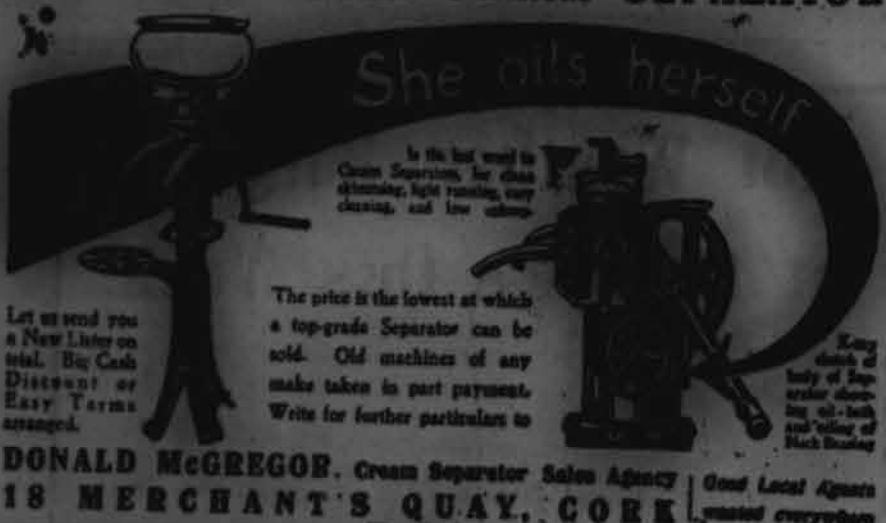
