**Live Stock Breeding Act.**

**THE CLAUSES EXPLAINED.**  
ADDRESSES BY MR. DUFFY,  
INSPECTOR OF LIVE STOCK, AND  
MR. O'KEEFE, A.I.

On Friday last at the Schoolhouse,  
Ballybief, Kilmacross, a largely attended  
meeting was held for the purpose of  
explaining the procedure to be followed  
under the Live Stock Breeding Act.  
Mr. Denis Fialding presided and ad-  
dressed on the subject were delivered by  
Messrs. P. Duffy, Live Stock Inspector,  
County Agricultural Inspector, and Mr. O'Keefe,  
County Agricultural Inspector.  
Mr. P. Duffy, Inspector of Live Stock  
under the Department of Agriculture, in  
the course of an interesting address, said:  
This Act has been passed through the  
Oireachtas lately and gives legislative ex-  
pression to the desire of all interested in  
Irish Live Stock to bring our cattle up  
to a standard of quality that will not  
fall far behind those of any other country.  
During the last few years we have paid comparatively  
little attention to fattening for beef, apart  
from the grass-fattening in Meath and a  
few other favoured grazing areas. In-  
stead we have concentrated in the raising  
of store cattle for export to be finished  
by Scottish and English feeders. Up till  
a few years ago we had a virtual mono-  
poly of the slow trade across Channel,  
but the advent of Canadian stores intro-  
duces a competition that we cannot afford  
to ignore. In numbers the stores landed  
from Canada are small compared with the  
volume of Irish exports, but the number  
is steadily increasing, while the quality  
of the Canadian stores is very high, much  
higher than we in this country were in-  
clined to expect. For years past Canadian  
breeders have been buying the best bulls  
available at British sales, and the effect  
of this policy is being demonstrated by  
the quality of the cattle now being ex-  
ported to Great Britain.  
The value of the cattle industry in the  
Free State is about £22,000,000 per an-  
num. This includes the home consump-  
tion of beef and the export trade in calves,  
steers, heifers and dairy cattle. Our dairy  
trade—milk, butter, cream and cheese—  
is worth £20,000,000 more. While our  
dairy industry is smaller in value than  
the cattle trade, yet it is the basis of the  
latter, as well as being largely the basis  
of our pig-breeding industry. Owing to  
the importance of our dairy industry our  
cattle-breeding problem is much more  
difficult one than that confronting the  
Canadian and Argentinian who can con-  
centrate on beef qualities alone in the  
breeding of their cattle. We have to aim  
both at milk and beef, and to combine  
both in the same animal. We want dual-  
purpose cattle. It used to be said that it  
was impossible, but we have proved it is  
possible. Hundreds of farmers up and  
down the country have already achieved  
the end that we recommend to all. By  
selection and breeding they have graded  
up herds that average 600 gallons and  
that have the quality and substance as-  
sociated with early maturing and early  
calf animals. The process required quick  
breeding, industry and patience. Quick  
breeding should not be expected and initial  
failures need not discourage one.  
We are satisfied that the ordinary cross-  
bred Shorthorn cows, the cows that make  
up the great bulk of our dairy cattle, do  
not give the best foundation for the dual-  
purpose animals at which we are aiming.  
We have sufficient good specimens of  
these as a foundation on which to build,  
but we want to ensure as far as possible  
that only the good animals and their pro-  
geny are kept for stock purposes, and that  
the inferior ones are culled.  
Through Co-Operating Associations we  
can ascertain which animals it will pay  
to keep for milk and butter production,  
and the eye can tell which of these are  
likely to produce good beef progeny as  
well. Our aim is heavy milking cows  
giving 700 to 800 gallons of milk, that are  
short on the leg or, as it is more graphi-  
cally expressed, not having too much  
daylight under them—deep in the body,  
wide and deep in the quarters, wide and  
level along the back, particularly in the  
loins or over the kidneys, with the well  
springing behind the shoulders so as to give  
plenty of room for heart and lungs, and  
finally with soft romy udders extending  
well forward under the belly and upwards  
towards the tail, and having the quarters  
uniform and the teats spaced well apart.  
As I have stated, we have already plenty  
of cows possessing all the charac-  
teristics here outlined. In too many  
cases, however, their owners seem blind  
to their own interests and sell these in-  
valuable animals instead of selling their  
poorer sisters, or if they keep them in  
their herds, they too frequently mate them  
with worthless bulls.  
Now it is not possible by legislation to  
compel farmers to retain and breed from  
their best cows. It should not be neces-  
sary, and I am glad to say that as far  
as the great majority of farmers are con-  
cerned it is not necessary. There is still  
too large a number, however, who are  
not alone blind to their own interests, but  
who in breeding rough, inferior cattle are  
preventing Irish cattle generally from  
attaining the position of prominence in

world repute which it is within our power  
to achieve. The result is that the intelli-  
gent progressive farmers suffer for the  
sins of a careless minority.  
I need not tell you how potent for good  
or evil the bull can be. It is an accepted  
axiom amongst breeders that the bull is  
half the herd. While we cannot directly  
by legislative compulsion force farmers to keep  
and breed from their good cows, we can  
go some distance in the direction we desire  
by cutting off from them the scrub bull.

STATUTORY MEETING.

The statutory meeting of the newly elected body of Lismore Town Commissioners was held in the Lismore Library on Tuesday at 12 noon. The nine members, whose names will be found below, were present.

After the members had signed the usual form of acceptance of office, Mr. Ormond, Town Clerk, said this was the statutory meeting and they could propose and second any member they like to take the chair at that meeting.

Mr. O'Shea proposed, and Mr. Healy seconded, that Mr. Ormond, clerk, take the chair. This was unanimously agreed upon.

Mr. Hickey proposed, and Mr. Noonan seconded, Mr. Thos. Crotty as chairman of that body.

Mr. Duggan proposed, and Mr. Koves seconded, the re-election of Mr. O'Shea (outgoing) for the chair.

Mr. Goulding at this moment mentioned that the Farmers' Party had decided regarding politics at council meetings, and asked what the Commissioners intended to do, as to his mind a question of politics which may be vital was likely to arise before any public body.

Mr. Healy said the question did not arise; it was an election of chairman they were engaged in.

Mr. Crotty—That would be a matter for a future chairman and meeting.

Mr. Hickey was understood to say they had been always a free lance and would remain so.

The matter then dropped.

The Chairman said he would take a poll between the candidates, which resulted as under.

For Mr. Crotty—Messrs. Noonan, Murphy, Healy, Hickey and Crotty—4.

For Mr. O'Shea—Messrs. Goulding, O'Shea, Duggan and Koves—4.

The Town Clerk then declared Mr. Crotty chairman.

Mr. Crotty said he thanked them very much for the honour conferred on him, and hoped the business of the Commissioners would be carried on in future the same as it had been in the past.

Mr. Crotty had been 23 years a member of that body, and during that time never had any difference with any member on it.

Mr. Murphy proposed, and Mr. Healy seconded, that Mr. Hickey, P.C., be appointed to the vice-chair.

There was no other candidate proposed, and Mr. Hickey was unanimously appointed to the vice-chair.

Mr. Hickey, in returning thanks, said the duties of a vice-chairman were not very important.

STATUTORY MEETING.

Mr. M. H. Walsh, Town Clerk, took the chair, and the names of those present will be found below.

Mr. McMahon said he had much pleasure in proposing Mr. M. Whelan as chairman for the evening 12 months.

Mr. Smyth said he was very pleased to second the proposition. No vote of his were needed to recommend Mr. Whelan as chairman for the evening 12 months.

Mr. Farrell proposed Mr. O'Gorman for the position as an acknowledgment of the competent manner in which he filled the position as vice-chairman for the past few years.

Some of the biggest and most difficult questions in the history of the town were put through successfully during his term of office, and any problems that arose between meetings were adequately attended to by him.

Mr. O'Gorman had stuck to his guns in face of many enemies, and as acting chairman had brought several important projects to a successful issue.

On a poll there voted:— For O'Gorman—Messrs. J. Bennett, R. C. Farrell, J. Farrell, M. Mahony, Mr. J. Kennedy, M. J. Fleming, P. Kennedy and P. J. O'Gorman, P.C.—8.

For Whelan—Messrs. A. J. Forbes, W. J. Broderick, S. A. L. Merrick, M. Whelan, A. Murphy, P. J. McMahon, P.C.; J. Troy, M. D. Broderick, J. R. Smyth, P.C.; T. Harrington, T. Curran and W. Conolly—12.

The Town Clerk having declared Mr. Whelan duly elected, vacated the chair, which was taken by the newly-elected chairman, Mr. T. Desmond arrived later.

The Chairman said he would now take propositions for the vice-chair.

Mr. McMahon proposed Mr. Smyth for the position.

Mr. Smyth—I don't want the position, and if there is any other proposition I will retire.

Chairman—I didn't want the chair either.

Mr. Harrington said he had pleasure in proposing Mr. Bennett as an Independent. Mr. Forbes seconded.

Mr. Conolly seconded Mr. McMahon's proposition.

Mr. Smyth said he would withdraw. He desired neither the chair nor the vice-chair.

Mr. McMahon therefore withdrew his proposition, and the Chairman declared Mr. Bennett unanimously elected.

The Chairman, opening his remarks in Irish, returned his most sincere thanks for the honour they had conferred on him.

In the future as in the past he would do his little best in the interest of the old town they all loved so well. Everybody would get a fair hearing and he expected the co-operation of the members with a view to administering the business successfully.

The rates for the year had been struck and were in the hands of the collector. They must keep within that. Their rates were rather high enough, but at the end of the year they might be in a position to reduce them. He would recommend them to appoint Gas and Water, Improvement and Financial Committees, and also to adopt the usual Standing Orders to govern the conduct of their meetings.

Mr. O'Gorman congratulated Mr. Whelan on his elevation to the chair, and assured him that he would have no more loyal supporter than him (the speaker).

During the years that he (Mr. O'Gorman) had the pleasure of presiding as that body's chairman, he had been one of the most diligent members of the council and loyal supporter of the chair, and he was confident that the confidence shown in him that day would not be misplaced.

He felt no regret at the result of the election. If there was a man present he would be pleased to see in the chair it was Mr. Whelan, at whose service he would always be pleased to be (applause).

He heartily and unreservedly congratulated those who didn't vote for him at any time. They were all in the proud position of having been elected by the people of the town, which they would at all times do their utmost to forward, and he said Youghal had every reason to be proud of its representatives, who included men of every class and interest in the community.

When their term of office came to an end Youghal would have no reason to regret having elected them.

Mr. Bennett thanked the council sincerely for having elected him to the vice-chair on that his first appearance in public life. He would do his utmost to assist the chairman in the discharge of his duties, and he hoped that when their term of office expired they would have nothing to say of one another but the very best (hear, hear).

DUNGARVAN ELECTRIC LIGHT CO. ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Electric Light and Power Co. was held in the Power House. Mr. Thos. Power, chairman, presided, and there was a big attendance.

Mr. Power in moving the report and statement of accounts for the year ending September last, said as the figures were in their hands for some days they may take them as read.
