TEMAINING LICENSE-HOLDERS TO PAY COMPENSATION.

The following is a summary of the essential points of the report which the Liquor Commission has presented to the Free State Government. The Commission was appointed by the Minister for Justice last February, with the following

terms of reference:-To inquire into and report to the Executive Council on the question of whether the existing number of licences for the sale of intoxicating liquor is in excess of reasonable requirements; and, in the event of such excess being proved to exist, to make recommendations by which an adequate reduction may be effected on an equitable basis; and generally to review the state of the law regulating the sale and con-sumption of intoxicating liquors, and to make such suggestions thereon as may appear to the Commission to be sound and reasonable.

THE FINDINGS. The Commission's findings are:-(1) That the number of licences is ex-


