THE NEW ENGLISH LAW ABOUT WILLS.

By a King's Counsel.

Experienced lawyers have made mistakes in drawing wills. The law, therefore, should be especially careful to know to whom his estate will pass should intestacy occur.

The alterations made by the Administration of Estates Act, 1925, are very considerable, and any, in the main, improvements. The implied trust for the wife and the blending of the proceeds of the real and personal estate, the equalization of the wife's rights with those of the husband, and of the mother's rights with those of the father, are all to the good. But some of the other alterations made are fairly open to criticism.

Two of those may here be mentioned. First, under the new Act, the husband (or wife) of an intestate is entitled to the deceased's furniture and other "personal chattels"—an expression of which a very wide definition is given—absolutely, and to a first charge on the rest of the estate for the sum of £1,000 free of death duty, as well as to a life interest in the residue of the estate, if any.

This may work fairly in the case of substantial estates, but where an estate is small injustice may be caused. Take the case of a man who dies intestate, leaving a second wife and children by a first wife and leaving an estate of £2,000 in value, of which sum £500 is the value of the personal chattels. The widow would take absolutely the "personal chattels," plus £1,000 free of death duty, and the funeral and testamentary expenses and costs and all death duties would be thrown upon residue. The result in such a case would be that the estate would be exhausted and the deceased's children would take nothing.

Secondly, under the law hitherto prevailing, where a man dies intestate leaving a wife and issue, but leaving no other issue, the personal estate (subject to the interests of the deceased's widow, if any) has passed to the mother, brothers and sisters in equal shares. Under the new Act, however, the brothers and sisters in such a case are ignored, the mother taking the whole, and this right of the parent, to the exclusion of the brothers and sisters, is extended also to the real estate or its proceeds.

RAILWAY WORKERS.

In connection with the circular issued by the Chairman of the Great Southern Railway asking each employee on the line to agree to a 5 per cent. reduction in his wages in order to help the Company to meet its financial difficulties, the several Unions to which the workers of the railway belong declined to accede to the request.

The Directors say they cannot make the railway pay, while the employees claim that some effort should be made to regulate the traffic by motor, which is doing so much harm to the railways. A big percentage of the trade of the country is now borne by lorries, and if that trade develops, the railway receipts will fall more and more. It seems strange that nothing can be done to help the railway, which is the backbone of the country's industry, and that a public inquiry into the railway is required to end the remedy. Our prescription for our national ills is that which has ever held good, and it is to go to work and work well and earnestly. If that were done in every department of public utility we need fear no competition from Denmark, the Argentine or China, and we need not worry over how other people get along. But so long as we sit on the ditch and do nothing, so long will we go down the hill.

MUNSTER COUNCIL MEETING. CORE COUNTY BOARD APPEAL. FIXTURES AND VENUES.

A meeting of the Munster Council held on Saturday last in the Hill Hotel, Mallow. Mr. J. O'Brien (man) presided. Also present—Messrs. Quinlan (treasurer); P. O'Brien (secretary); J. W. McLaughlin (clerk); J. M. and T. Long (Cork); J. Hogan and Fraher (Waterford); D. Lattigan and Gleson (Limerick); B. Fitzgerald, J. McCarthy (Bantry), and P. McKeown (Cork).

Matters of a financial nature of a considerable portion of the annual meeting. These matters relate to claims received on behalf of the players, players' travelling expenses, of funds, etc.

The Ballyhehale Club appealed against the ruling of the Waterford County Board's decision was refused.

Cork people forward to getting the match to take place there, as Cork had had any of the previous fixtures. If this and Limerick match were played in Cork he could assure the Council that he would receive all the support needed.

Mr. T. Long and Mr. P. O'Brien (Cork) supported Mr. Murphy's proposal.

Some of the delegates were of the opinion that large "gales" could be taken at Waterford.

A poll was taken on the two venues, Cork and Waterford. The voting was Waterford—Messrs. Gleson, P. Fitzgerald, Quinlan—4. Cork—Messrs. Murphy and Long—1. Mr. P. O'Brien was not present.

DEATH OF MRS. MARY BROWN, KILCOLOHER, CAPPOQUIN.

The death of the above lady, which took place at her residence, Killoher, on Sunday week, has caused sincere regret amongst a wide circle of sorrowing relatives and friends in West Waterford, and has at the same time added the district in which she had resided, for so many years of one of its most popular and esteemed inhabitants. A member of one of the oldest and most respected families in the western end of the county, she was the wife of the late Mr. John Brown, her health having broken down some months ago, she had since been regularly attended by the Very Rev. J. Gleeson, P.P., Aglish, and the Rev. Fr. McElroy, C.C., Ballinacorney, and her death was most peaceful and happy, as befitting one who had been such an exemplary and God-fearing Catholic all her life.

On Monday evening the remains were conveyed from her late residence to the Parish Church at Modeligo, and were followed by one of the largest and most representative funeral corteges seen in the district for a long time. On Tuesday morning Requiem High Mass for the repose of her soul was celebrated before another great assemblage of relatives and friends, the celebrant being the Rev. Fr. McElroy, C.C., while the other clergy members assisting included the Very Rev. J. Gleeson, P.P., Aglish; Very Rev. T. Mackey, P.P., Clashmore; Rev. P. Meekill, A.M., Cappoquin; Rev. M. Morrissey, C.C., St. Mary's, Clonmel; Rev. J. Walsh, C.C., Modeligo; and Rev. E. Drab, Sydney.

DEATH OF MR. JOHN O'BRIEN, BEWLEY, CAPPOQUIN.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. John O'Brien formerly of Sallerbridge, which occurred after a lingering illness at the residence of his nephew, Mr. Michael O'Brien, Bewley, Cappoquin, on Thursday, 27th ult. The deceased was a member of a most respectable family, who held an extensive farm at Ballymullins for many years, but being evicted during the Land War in the early '80s, he went to reside in another farm at Sallerbridge, where he lived with his brother for many years. He was brother of Mr. James O'Brien, who for over 20 years was the faithful and trusted representative of Cappoquin Electoral Division on the Lismore and Ballinacorney, and who, in conjunction with his able colleague, the late Mr. H. W. Colender, Cappoquin, did much practical and useful work for the ratepayers during his long connection with those bodies as the fearless and conscientious representative of Cappoquin and district. After the death of Mr. James O'Brien about 24 years ago, Mr. John O'Brien went to reside with the former's son (his nephew) at Bewley, and he had continued to live there until his death. Deceased had reached the fine age of 79 years, and during his long life he was always noted for his strict honesty and his honourable and upright character, which won him the highest respect and esteem of his kind and people. Of a quiet and retiring disposition he never meddled in anybody's affairs, but devoted all his time to tending the interests with which he was concerned. He was a staunch and uncompromising Irish Nationalist all his life, and during the stormy days of the Land War and later under the auspices of the United Irish League, he did more than a man's part in always being ready to stand up for freedom which was then being waged. He was a devout and God-fearing Catholic all his life, and was a model to all around him in this respect, and during the later stages of his illness he was regularly attended by the Very Rev. J. Gleeson, P.P., Aglish, who administered the last Sacraments, so that his death was a perfectly peaceful and happy one, fortified by the last rites of the Catholic Church which he had loved so well.

COUNTY COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

At a meeting of the above held in the Courtroom, Dungarvan, on Saturday last, Mr. Kiersey presided. Also present were—Messrs. P. Molealy, J. Butler, T.D.; J. Curran, M. McGrath, C. J. Curran, P. Power, J. Kavanagh, Mr. J. O'Dwyer, Secretary, and Mr. O'Shea, horticultural instructor, were also present.

POULTRY STATIONS SCHEME

The following letter was read—The Department of Agriculture, Upper Merrion street, Dublin, 22nd August, 1925. Sir—I have to inform you that as a result of the enactment of the Agricultural Produce (Eggs) Act, 1925, the Department have had under consideration the question of the quality of eggs produced at and distributed from poultry stations operating in the various counties under the above scheme. In view of the requirements of the Act as to the size of first-grade eggs, the Department have decided that no eggs under 2 ozs. in weight shall be sold for hatching purposes at any egg distribution station under the scheme for 1926, as any failure to maintain this standard would, by constituting a bad example for private poultry-keepers, reflect unfavourably upon the utility of the Poultry Stations Scheme, and tend to nullify the efforts being made under the Act to improve the quality of eggs being produced throughout the country.

(1) Calling from the station stock birds that lay eggs weighing less than 2 ozs. each, and replacing such birds by certified, well-grown pullets.

(2) Providing male birds of strains having good records in regard to winter laying and size of egg of dam and sire's dam.

The Department are informed that, at some poultry stations established under the scheme it has been the practice for the stationholders to retain the larger eggs for table use and to sell the remainder for premium purposes as hatching eggs. In the interests of the scheme and of the poultry industry in general, this practice should be prohibited, and to this end the Department would suggest that, in the issue of instructions as to setting eggs for hatching, issued by County Committees to each stationholder for distribution to purchasers of eggs, it should be definitely specified that each egg sold will be not less than 2 ozs. in weight. In this way purchasers will be made aware of the standard which they are entitled to expect in station eggs, and an obligation will be imposed upon the stationholder to sell eggs of approved quality only.

Mr. Curran—It really means that any number of the committee cannot derive any benefit under the Department? Secretary—Yes.

Mr. Molealy thought it would be well to make all members aware of that letter to the effect that the stationholder should be aware of that. He suggested appointing the business until all the members were notified.

Mr. P. Power—Then that will affect the nomination of names? Secretary—Yes, for 1926.

The Chairman said Mr. Molealy's name for premium bull and could not get it as his father-in-law was a County Councillor.

Mr. Curran—Then does it affect members of the County Council, say, under the University Scholarship? Chairman—No.

Secretary—That is a gift from the County Council.

Mr. C. J. Curran—It seems very inconvenient that a County Councillor can have, say, a University Scholarship and could not keep a premium bull.

Mr. Butler—If it is wrong in one it must be wrong in the other.

Chairman—If we adjourn the matter in order to hear Mr. Butler's story?

Mr. Curran—Will you submit quietly to that?

Mr. P. Power—Was that rule taken last year?

Secretary—Yes. There will be a Department Inspector here at next meeting and if the matter is adjourned we can go fully into it then.

Chairman—We will approve of that and it should be a matter for the Education Board.

The resolution was approved. The following letter from the Department was read—

Sir—With reference to the recent elections of members of County Councils and the appointment of Committees of Agriculture under Section 14 of the Agricultural and Technical Instruction (Ireland) Act, 1899, I have to state that the Department have had under consideration the question of the eligibility of newly-appointed members of County Committees to receive payment of any premiums, etc., which may have been provisionally awarded to them in their private capacity prior to their appointment as members of the County Committee.

The general position as to the eligibility of members of County Committees to derive, directly or indirectly, financial benefit from any of the schemes administered by such committees has already been set forth in circulars Nos. A 13400-13 and A 21162-13 sent you on 1st and 22nd October, 1913, respectively, but the Department have thought it advisable to obtain legal advice as to how new members might be affected by Article 12 of the Scheme to the Application of Enactments Order, 1926.

The Department are now advised—(1) That, in the case of a new member appointed prior to his appointment on the County Committee, had been awarded, in his private capacity, a premium, etc., under any of the County Committee's schemes, payment of such premium may be made provided that the same had been paid before his appointment, fulfilled all the conditions required to earn the full premium, etc.

(2) Where the contract between the County Committee and a premium holder had not been fulfilled by the completion of all the necessary conditions prior to the date of the appointment of such premium holder as a member of the committee, payment of the premium would entail the payee's disqualification as a member of the County Committee, and if, after the receipt of such payment, he should act as a member of the committee, he would become liable to the penalties under Article 12 of the Application of Enactments Order.

Please bring this matter to the notice of your committee as soon as possible.—I am, sir, your obedient servant—F. J. Meyrick, Secretary.

SITE FOR SUGAR BEET FACTORY

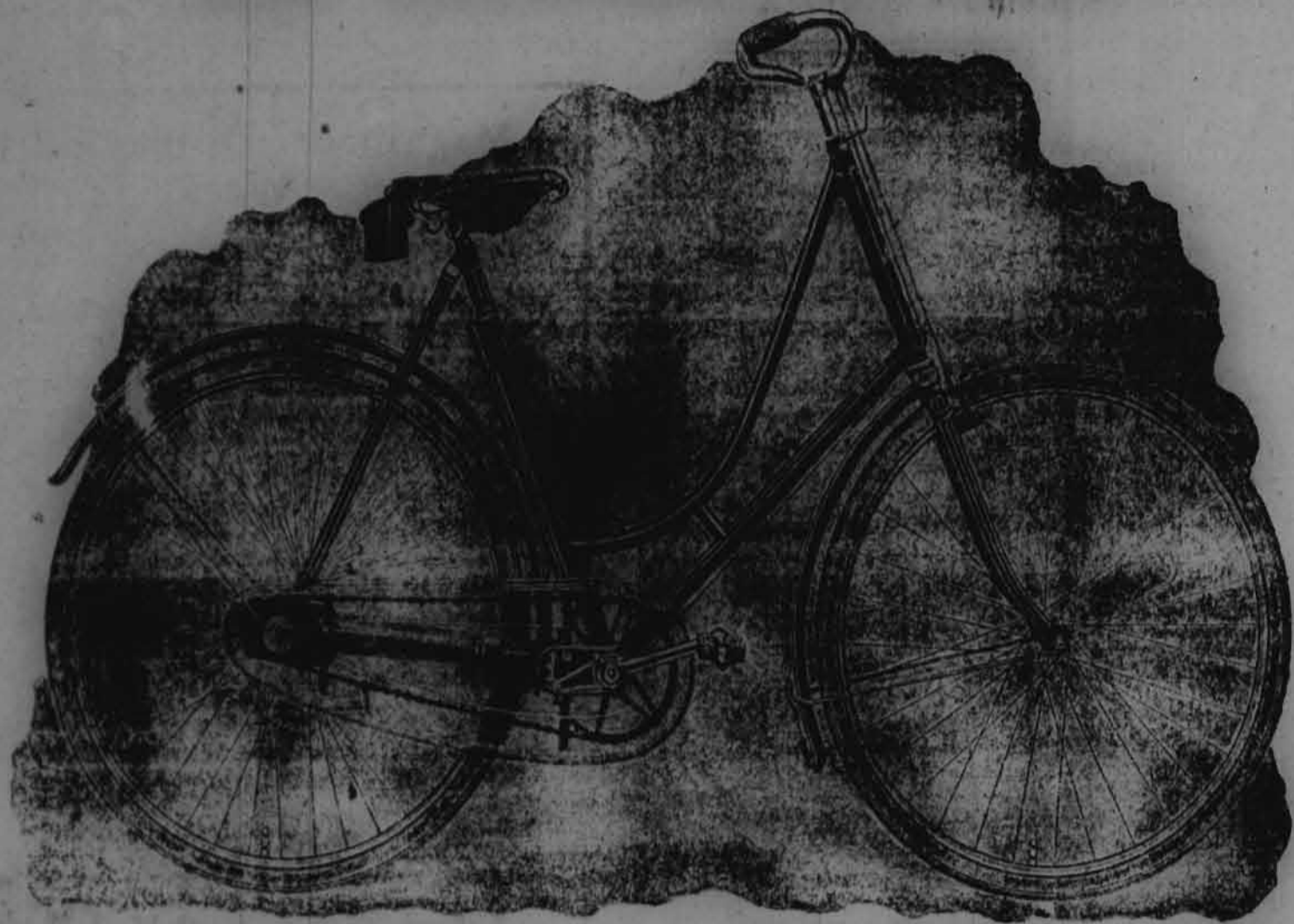

Held on Wednesday, before Mr. McCabe, D.J. Mr. P. Kersey applied for and granted a petroleum license. Sergt. O'Donnell, at the suit of the Attorney-General, prosecuted W. McGrath, Cappoquin, for using a bicycle without the necessary license. Defendant did not appear. A fine and 10s. special costs was imposed. Guard Sheehan summoned Peter Kelly for being drunk and disorderly in public street at Kilmacthomas. Adjudged for 3 months to see how Kelly would conduct himself in the time. Same complainant summoned James Kelly for cruelty to an animal. Complainant deposed he found Kelly using a fennel while the animal was being from scum. Adjudged for a month in the case of defendant. Sergt. O'Donnell v. Mary Dea. The grant swore he found defendant and Kelly using a dog at Kilmacthomas at 11 p.m. on the 19th June last. Fine and costs. Same v. John Gleeson for a like offence. Adjudged to next court in the absence of defendant. Same v. Paul Heaney, pony and cart, Kilmacthomas on the night of the August last without a light. Fine and costs.

NO LIGHT. Same v. David Duggan, owner of motor car. Defendant was charged exceeding the speed limit in the case of Carroll's Cross on the 16th ult. He was travelling at 34 miles an hour by the where five miles over the limit. Duggan stated he drove a Dodge on the occasion. He was conveying a to Ring College. The car was missing one plug and he put on extra speed on the hill at Carroll's Cross. Replying to his Worship, he said that at this side of Carroll's Cross, there is a rise like a hill. District Justice—I hope you are going to take a rise out of me (laughter). Fined him £1 and costs, the J. told him that when he found that driving fast he should not have done the safety of the public by running a Dodge on top speed, but should have changed her (the) speed gear. Same v. — O'Connell for exceeding speed limit within the Kilmacthomas police area. The respondent stated the defendant's car covered 400 yards in 10 seconds. Fined £1 and costs. A similar fine was imposed on a four named John O'Brien for a like offence on the same occasion.

Sergt. Rochford v. Stephen Moore in charge of a motor car on the 10th August at Ballydoole. Major stated that he was out one day and was returning from a match at Dungarvan when the car met him. He did not feel very well the early part of the day and he had a few drinks of whiskey. These he served him as he was not used to it. He takes a bottle of stout occasionally. His Worship said it was a second thing to find a motor driver in a drink while using his car, and in this he inflicted the highest penalty he could impose, viz.—£5, and costs. Same v. Defendant wrote stating that she did not appear that day. She answered D. J. she would be more careful in the future. Justice—She evidently admits the fact. I will fine her £1 and £1 costs.
