All pigs in Denmark are fed three times a day. At 6 a.m. a dry feed of wheat, barley, rye, maise and palm meal is given the pigs. At 10.30 o'clock they get a wet feed of stuffs mixed with whey or milk, and at 4.30 p.m. they get another wet feed. When questioned this Danish farmer said he estimated that 3½ to hold from 6 to 10 pigs each. Everywhere we went we were struck with the great order that prevailed, and yet there was no sign of a policeman to be seen. Everybody looked well fed, and the Danes do things well that way. As for dress, when the day's work is done the Danes turn out to their amusements in great style. 


