

### Dungarvan Urban Council

A meeting of the above was held on Friday night. Mr. Wm. O'Donnell, vice-chairman, presided. Also present—Messrs. M. J. Keane, M. Clancy, J. Curran, J. McCarthy, J. Moore, P. J. McGrath, T. J. Power, J. Butler, T.D., and Jas. Hackett.

Application for House.  
Thos. Donnell, Mitchell street, applied for one of the council's houses at Loughmore which is about to become vacant. There being no house vacant no action was taken.

Meals to School Children.  
The Secretary Ministry for Local Government and Public Health wrote stating that he had received the auditor's statement of the expenditure incurred by the council out of the rates for provision of meals. He had authorised the issue to the council of a paying order for £5 5s. 5d. as recoupment from the school meal grant in respect of above.

Water.  
Mr. Williams, solicitor to the council, wrote stating that he had seen Mr. McGrath, B.S., in connection with the interference by Mr. J. Daniel with the overflow of water from the road at Boreen-aroon to his lands. He found he could not proceed under the Petty Sessions Act, and must take action in the Circuit Court. He had issued the necessary civil bill.

Dairy and Cowsheeds.  
Mr. M. F. Lynch, V.S., reported that for the past month he had inspected all premises and cows registered under the above. All cows were healthy and premises well kept.

The Local Government Board wrote in connection with the £750 grant for waterworks. They said they had forwarded a resolution for a first instalment to be sent.

Clerk—We have here the roads which are declared main roads from the 1st April, 1926, and I find that they have not included two roads we suggested—the Shandon and Hospital roads.

Mr. Butler—We should press the Shandon road; it is very important and connects up the main road to Waterford and the railway station.

It was decided to press that the Shandon road be included in the main roads.

Main Roads.  
The following letter was read: With reference to previous correspondence on the subject, I am directed by the Minister for L.G. and Public Health to enclose a copy of an Order made under Section 1 of the L.G. Act, 1925, declaring certain roads in the Co. Waterford to be main roads. It will be noted the Order takes effect as from 1st April, 1926, viz.:

From Waterford City boundary at Kingsmeadow via The Sweep, Ballyduff House, Kildermody, Scrahan, McGrath's Crossroads, Annacourt, The Pike and Old Pike bridge to Dungarvan Urban District boundary at Burgessy.

From Dungarvan Urban District boundary at Ringrehy via Killengriff Bridge, Windgap, Grange and Kinsaleher to county boundary at Youghal Bridge.

From Clonmel Urban District boundary at Greenan via Kilmahanan Bridge, Suirmount, Ballymacarby, Knockaraha, Woodhouse, Millstreet, Modeligo, Whitechurch Bridge, Geesh Bridge and Clashmore to Piltown House four roads.

From Old Pike Bridge three roads via Ballyneely, Killadangan, Cappagh, Killogeher Bridge, Cappoquin, Ballybin House, Ballyduff and Raspberry Hill to county boundary at Kilmurry House.

From Carrick-on-Suir Urban District boundary at Carrickbeg via Ballygarret and Furrallough to Annacourt three roads.

From Waterford City boundary at John's River via Grace-dieu, Tramore, Fenor, Annes-town, Knockmahon, Williams-town Crossroads, Carrickahilla Crossroads, Knockpoolin and Kilmington to Dungarvan Urban District boundary at Duckspool.

From Knockaraha three roads via Bockavonlea, Knocken-power Bridge, Garryoleyne, Gelligan Wood and Ballynamuck West to Dungarvan Urban District boundary at Luskannard.

From Boreen-aroon via Ballyva-

ough Crossroads to Bawnfane. From Ballyduff House three roads via Kilmeadan, Darrigal Bridge, Clodiagh Bridge and Portnavoe to Carrick-on-Suir Urban District boundary at Tinnahalla.

From Carrick-on-Suir Urban District boundary near Coolnamuck Wood via Churchlawn House, Landscape House, Dor-rinlar and Tikincor to Clonmel Urban District boundary at Croan Lower.

From Greenan Castle three roads via Mountneil Wood to county boundary at Knocklofty Bridge.

From county boundary near Mount Prospect via Tallow, Tal-low Hill, Lismore, Drumher Bridge, Glenknockan to county boundary at The Gap.

From county boundary at Rhincrew Bridge via Lombard's crossroads to county boundary at Red Forge crossroads.

From county boundary near Breda via The Pike, Kilmore Cottage and Tallow to county boundary at Kilmacow.

From Lisnagrah three roads via Rossiniff, Kilmacomb Crossroads and Dunmore East to Black Knob.

From Waterford City boundary at Pastimeknock to Bleak Bridge four roads.

From Ballyharran three roads via Robert's Crossroads and Ringville to Hellick Head.

From Dungarvan Urban District boundary at Luskannard via O'Connell st. to junction with Grattan Square.

From urban district boundary at Dicksfoot to junction with Sexton street.

From urban district boundary at Curraheen via Mitchell street to junction with Rice's street.

Rate Collection.  
A discussion took place on the state of the rate collection, which was considered very unsatisfactory. The collector was ordered to use more energy and have a substantial amount lodged to the credit of the council without delay in order to permit some pressing liabilities to be discharged, and that a public notice be issued to defaulting ratepayers.

Tourists.  
A discussion took place on the above, and the following resolution was proposed by Mr. Clancy, seconded by Mr. Keane and passed—"That the council instruct the Town Clerk to convene a special meeting for the purpose of forming a local committee in connection with tourist traffic and invite prominent people in the town representing different interests in connection with the tourist traffic to the meeting."

Destruction of Council's Property.  
The attention of the Civic Guards was called to the destruction of the council's property at the Look-Out and bathing boxes.

Hire of Steamroller.  
The Secretary County Council wrote enclosing an account for £19 for hire of steamroller by the council in May and August last.

### CAPPOQUIN NOTES.

Xmas.—The general verdict is that the Xmas of 1925 was the quietest on record, and the days before Xmas with the roads ice-bound made traveling a very dangerous matter. Many accidents occurred on Xmas Eve, and as "the just man falls 7 times a day," there must be a big proportion of just men around judging by the number of times they fell. ### Kilmacothomas News

New Year's Day was ushered into our midst with a drenching downpour of rain and high velocity winds, which reigned until the noon hour. Nearing night-time the weather conditions became drier and calmer and a record attendance of whist-lovers participated at the grand "drives" brought off in Mr. Hill's Hall that evening. The energetic promoters had all arrangements—seating, lighting, etc.—in the proverbial apple-pie order, and the enjoyable event passed off a brilliantly interesting social, and easily eclipsed any of the grand "drives" previously held here. ### LISMORE NOTES.

Special Courts.—During the holidays the local P.C., Mr. A. Hickey, T.C., held two special courts in which Sergt. Daly was complainant. In one instance a domestic servant named Galvin, employed by Mr. James G. Duke, Co.C., Deerpark, was charged with the larceny of £4 from another employe named Jas. O'Neill. The defendant was remanded on bail to the Lismore District Court. On Monday night a special court was also held at Lismore when Thos. Beausang, Main street, Youghal, was charged in connection with the purchase of two sheep from Mr. Martin Kelleher, of Bishopstown, Lismore, at the last Lismore Fair. It appears from the information sworn by Mr. Kelleher that the defendant purchased two sheep and paid for same £8 10s. by cheque drawn on Munster and Leinster Bank, Youghal, which cheque was subsequently dishonoured. The defendant was arrested at Youghal on Monday night and conveyed to Lismore by motor, where after formal evidence was taken and he was remanded on bail to the January District Court.

Bank Official Promoted.—Mr. Jas. P. Walsh, cashier of the Munster and Leinster Bank, Ltd., Lismore Branch, has been appointed Manager of the Ballymoale, Sligo, Branch of that bank. Unassuming and genial, he had the same cheery smile for all classes, and his legion of friends while congratulating him on his promotion, regret his impending departure, and wish himself and Mrs. Walsh many years of health and happiness in his new sphere of duties.
