COUNTY WATERFORD TECHNICAL May. The need for securing premises over which you will have complete control was impressed upon me at each of those centres. The equipment consists of an old motor car, benches, vice, drilling machine, taps and dies, spanners, hammers, chisels, files, lathe, etc. In the county class a meter tractor is used inchair. Also present were-Messrs. J. Cur. stead of a motor car. A class-room or workshop at Dungarvan would be equipped at a cost of about £100, including cost of old motor car, a tractor for county classes. would cost £120, and with a trailer to carry equipment it would ren into 2250. 
