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### Dungarvan Urban Council

A meeting of the above was held on Friday last. Mr. M. Brennan, P.C., chairman, presided. Also present—Messrs. J. Butler, T.D.; Wm. O'Donnell, James Healey, Thos. McCarthy, R. Craig, P. J. McGrath, Thos. Power, M. Clancy, M. J. Keane and J. Curran.

**Expenditure.**  
The expenditure for the week was—General account, £3 9s.; waterworks account, £16 1s. Payments were passed.

**Sanitary.**  
A letter from Mr. Moloney and Mrs. formed the council that they had to shut down their mill owing to having no water. They had to draw in water from the Spring for their bakery, and unless an undertaking was given that the matter would be remedied at once they regret they should take action in the matter, and if any further loss or expense was incurred they would have to place the matter in their solicitor's hands.

**Sanitary.**  
Borough Surveyor—We had to disconnect to lay on the new pipes, and everyone in town will in their turn be inconvenienced a little.

**Mr. Clancy—**Could not some arrangement be made to give hikers water between 6 a.m. and 11? They start at 6 a.m. and people must get bread.

**Borough Surveyor—**A 5-inch pipe is all that is supplying the Main street at present.

**Mr. Butler—**It is an unreasonable letter.

**Mr. Clancy—**Have you got all the fittings? Borough Surveyor—Yes.

**Mr. Clancy—**Then you won't have the inconvenience for long.

**Borough Surveyor—**It will be there until we finish up to Brewery as we will not open Main street until it is laid down.

**The Department** was sanctioning the loss of £5,000 under the Public Health Housing of Working Classes and Local Authorities (Financial Provision) Acts for the purpose of erecting 20 artisans' dwellings in the district.

**Insurance.**  
The council decided to give their insurance work to the Irish National Assurance Co. Three applications were received and the policy was Irish National, 7 Irish Life, 11 Elbermar, 2.

**A letter** from Miss B. Mulcahy, Abbey-side, with reference to the wall of her house was referred to the Borough Surveyor.

**Messrs. George Stokes and Sons** wrote asking for a substantial reduction in special water rate for baths this year. The letter was marked "deferred."

**County Council Demand.**  
The following letter was read from the Secretary of the County Council—"I am to inform you that the amount to be demanded by the County Council of Waterford for the year ending 31st March, 1927, will be £3,575 1s. 9d."

**The Republican White** five Committee were granted the use of the Hall on the night of April 9th.

Heretofore we give a complete list of the sale of bulls at Waterford Show on Thursday last held under the auspices of the Irish Dairy Shorthorn Breeders' Society (County Waterford Branch). The Show was a perfect success as well as the sale, and good prices were realized all round. Mr. Palmer is auctioneer gave us usual perfect satisfaction to vendors and purchasers.

The bulls on show were a splendid lot, and showed great quality, being a perfect exhibition of the dual purpose breed so well known in this county. In many cases it was evident they were not so well brought out as they might be, with the result that in particular cases high prices were forfeited through want of more care and feeding in the previous months. In this connection we think special praise is due to Mr. Jas. Lynch, Ballylemon, who not only won first prize and the gold medal for the best bull of the show, but also realized the high price of 76 guineas with his half-bred bull by Ballyglavin Vanguard, beating several high-class purebreds. Mr. M. O'Brien, Bewley, also showed what care and attention plus feeding can do in the proper bringing out of a bull and the prices he realized for his exhibits were his compensation. Had many of our other breeders who showed such excellent specimens of the dairy shorthorn breed paid more attention to their early care, then surely such a display of high-class animals was never seen as would have greeted Ballylemon Hill. Our breeders we know will profit by the lessons learned in this regard in the future they will be able to meet breeders from the adjoining counties on equal terms. In every way the Show and Sale achieved the highest success, for which the major credit must be given to the officers of the Co. Waterford branch of the Dairy Shorthorn Society headed by Mr. Nicholas Fitzgerald, and ably assisted by Mr. M. J. Kennedy, hon. sec., and Mr. T. J. Hickey, Cow Testing Instructor, who devoted much time and attention to it.

#### FISHERMEN'S ASSOCIATION.

##### YOUGHAL BRANCH.

At the fortnightly meeting, Mr. Wm. J. Broderick, V.C. Co., who presided, said that was a time of great importance for their Association, as the estimates for the coming year would be under consideration, and the amount of work to be done by the Department would depend on the money voted by the Dail. He therefore proposed—"That a statement be sent to each of the T.D.'s representing the constituency, showing what the branch had already undertaken towards the revival of the fishing industry locally, and requesting their members to urge upon the Government the necessity of the re-establishment being more active in the re-establishing of what should be a great industry and a great source of employment."

This was seconded by Mr. James Bennett V.C. U.D.C., and passed unanimously.

Mr. M. Hennessy appeared before the meeting and complained that his fishing vessel was run down and sunk as she was proceeding to sea.

After some discussion the Secretary was directed to communicate with the owners. The meeting then proceeded to consider the question of providing boats and nets for the autumn fishing.

### Cappoquin District Court.

Before Mr. G. P. Farrell, B.L. Supt. O'Riordan, Cappoquin, summoned Mr. Wm. Walsh, Walsh's Hotel, Cappoquin, for a breach of the Licensing Act on Sunday night, February 28th.

Mr. J. L. Keane, solr., Youghal, defended.

In outlining the case, the Superintendent remarked that it was his duty to see that the law was impartially carried out in every instance, and he would make no exceptions whatever in performing his duty, but would give a 'fair hide' to every man.

Guard McNally was examined by the Superintendent and gave evidence of visiting Walsh's Hotel about 10.30 p.m. on the night in question and finding three men in the kitchen named J. McCarthy, J. McGrath and T. Whelan. He was accompanied by Guard Swenney and they were admitted to the premises by one of the maids, Mary Dalton, who, in reply to questions, said there was nobody inside except three travellers. Witness questioned the three men, who all stated they were travellers, but as he had some doubt about Whelan being a traveller, he made further investigation next day and found that Whelan lived only 2 1/2 miles from Cappoquin and was not entitled to be on the premises.

Replying to the Superintendent, witness said there was no bar in the hotel, and the drinks were usually served in the kitchen, which was reached by a long hall about 30 yards down from the entrance door.

The Superintendent was then proceeding to question witness about the internal arrangements of the premises and the place where the drinks were kept, when Mr. Keane said he was utterly oblivious of what point the Superintendent wished to make.

Mr. Farrell asked wasn't the entire hotel licensed, and Mr. Keane replied: "Of course it is, sir, and that is why I thoroughly supported the premises this morning and found everything correct there."

Replying to the Superintendent, witness said that the drinks were kept in a room or "cellar" off the kitchen, which was separated from the latter by a door, which was not locked on the night in question.

Mr. Keane again expressed surprise at the manner in which the case was being presented. They had been promised a hearing by the Superintendent, but instead of giving them that, he was simply trying to prejudice the case for the defence, but he (Mr. Keane) knew that such an attempt would not have any effect in this court at all events.

Superintendent—It is not fair to be placing difficulties in our way.

Mr. Keane (earnestly)—I object to that remark. I am placing no difficulties in the way, but I have come here to meet the case fairly, and I am sorry that on the occasion of my first meeting with the Superintendent in this court I cannot congratulate him on his sense of fair play.

A remark was later made by the Superintendent about the nature of the license held by the defendant for the hotel and Mr. Keane, after submitting the license to the court, held it up and said to the Superintendent: "Do you suggest that this license is a forgery, then?"

The Superintendent replied that the whole question would be gone into in October (meaning the next Licensing Sessions).

Mr. Keane warmly protested against these threats, and the Justice said this point was a matter for another court besides this, and he had only to decide today on the summons before him whether this man (Whelan) who was found on the premises on that night was a bona fide traveller or not.

In reply to Mr. Keane, Guard McNally said there was no suggestion that there was anybody else on the premises except the three men named on the night in question.

For the defence, Mrs. Mary Walsh, wife of the defendant, was examined by Mr. Keane and stated that Whelan and the other men first came and knocked at the hotel about 6 o'clock on that Sunday evening, and having questioned them very closely, they convinced her that they were all bona fide travellers and she admitted them after 10 o'clock on that night.

Mary Dalton, waitress, stated that it was she admitted them on the second occasion after they had represented themselves as bona fide travellers.

Some further evidence having been heard, Mr. Farrell said he was satisfied that Whelan was admitted in the belief that he was a bona fide traveller, and he therefore dismissed the case against the publican, but ordered Whelan to pay a fine of 15s. and costs and allowed him time to pay.

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#### CARRICK-ONSUIR COUNCIL'S FINANCES.

##### WORKMEN DISPENSED WITH.

At a meeting of Carrick-on-Suir Urban Council on Tuesday the Town Clerk said that owing to the council's financial position they would have to reject all the proposals of the Town Surveyor for work on the roads, etc., for the financial year 1926-27. Last year he (the clerk) asked the council for a rate of 18/6 in the £, but they fixed it at 14s. in the £, an inadequate rate. They were then coming up on getting £726 from the County Council, but that grant has been taken from them by the Local Government Act, 1925. If they wished to get on they should strike a rate of 21/ in the £.

The council decided to do no road work but scavenging and the work of the cemetery. They decided to dispense with five of their workmen.

Mr. Dalton, rate collector, said the irrecoverable rates for the half-year ended March, 1926, amounted to £400, and the same for the preceding half-year.

### County Waterford Technical Committee.

A meeting of the above was held in the Technical Schools, Mary street, on Monday last. Mr. Thos. Power occupied the chair. Also present were—Messrs. J. Curran, M. J. Keane, Mca. Griffin, L. O'Brien, T. Fraher and W. Stack.

#### Scholarships 1926-27.

The Department wrote approving of the payment of Scholarship fees for session 1925-26 in respect of girls' scholarships granted by the committee.

The Secretary remarked that he visited the schools where the pupils were being taught and all arrangements were excellent.

The Department wrote notifying the committee that they had forwarded £819 2s. 11d. as attendance grant for the year ending July last.

To Mr. Curran, the Secretary said the amount of attendance grants depended on the work done and the "attendances" at the classes. There was also a fixed contribution from the County Council and an endowment grant from the Department of £425. The figure £819 2s. 11d. was for work done by the classes.

To Mr. Keane, the Secretary said, the actual amount to credit now was over £1,000, and he thought the year should be finished with a substantial balance to credit.

The following lodgments were made—Mr. Cronin, Ballinacorney, Irish Class, 15s.; Mr. Halpin, Rathgormack, Woodwork Class £1 14s.; Mr. Lacey, Fenor Irish Class, 29 5s.; Miss O'Neill (Clones), Domestic Economy Class, 29 4s. 3d.

#### Female Irish Class.

Mr. Lacey, teacher at the above, wrote notifying the committee of his inability to attend the above class owing to illness.

Secretary—In connection with that, I visited the class on the 16th and the teacher was not in attendance.

Mr. Stack—They don't want a class there.

Secretary—There was a fine class of young men on the road there. The notification from the teacher was a bit late as he (the secretary) should have notified the Department that the class was not being held.

Mr. Keane—Often a man is taken short and he might not be able to notify in time.

The Secretary, in reply to a member, said in some counties when a teacher was found absent a fine of 10s. was put on him. That was done in County Wicklow.

Mr. Griffin said it was unfair to have school teachers teaching the classes at all, as they had enough already and others should get a turn.

Secretary—It would be difficult to get the required number.

The committee decided to adopt the County Wicklow scheme of 10s. fine on any teacher absent from class in future.

#### Inspection of Work.

Following an inspection of the schools and the work done by the students by some members of the committee, the following report was made and signed by Mr. Keane—"Having inspected the work done by the students of the woodwork classes at Dungarvan Technical School, we consider the work very creditable to the teacher, and show that the students are availing of the opportunities offered to them in a very painstaking and useful way. The whole business reflects great credit on our Principal and Secretary."

#### Resignations From Committee.

The following letter was read—"Dear Mr. Langan—I am sorry that I cannot accede to you and your committee's request to continue to sit on the Technical Committee. Our joint letter to the County Council, which has already appeared in the Press, explains our position in the matter. Wishing you every success and again thanking you for your kind assistance during my term of office—Yours sincerely—L. Egan, C.C."

Very Rev. Fr. Conlon and Rev. Fr. Walsh also wrote. Rev. Bro. Conlon also wrote resigning from the committee. The resignations were accepted with regret.

A letter was read from the County Council stating that owing to resignations the following new members were appointed to the committee—Laurence O'Brien, Clones; Thos. Fraher, Kilmartin; Daniel Dempsey, Shandon; and B. G. Usler, Cappagh.

#### Motor Engineering Classes.

The Secretary explained that at the last meeting of the committee he was asked to go to Wexford and make inquiries and report to this committee on the working of the above class there. He now read his report as follows—"Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen—I beg to report having visited the schools at New Ross and Enniscorthy, which are under the control of the local Technical Committee. They have a joint arrangement with the County Council for the services of a whole-time Inspector for engineering. He works in the town during the winter session and goes to the rural centres in the month of May. The need for securing premises over which you will have complete control was impressed upon me at each of those centres. The equipment consists of an old motor car, bench, vice, drilling machine, taps and dies, spanners, hammers, chisels, files, lathes, etc. In the county class a motor tractor is used instead of a motor car. A class-room or workshop at Dungarvan would be equipped at a cost of about £100, including cost of old motor car, a tractor for county classes would cost £150, and with a trailer to carry equipment it would run into £250. A second-hand tractor could be procured. You could secure a teacher who would be competent to teach mechanical drawing and calculation as well as having a good practical knowledge of motor mechanical engineering with an elementary knowledge of electrical work. It should be possible to secure suitable premises in the town which could be suitably fitted up. We should aim at having

### COUNTY COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

A meeting of the above was held in the Court-house, Dungarvan, on Saturday last. Mr. N. Fitzgerald, chairman, presided. Also present were Messrs. T. Flynn, G. J. Curran, T. Hart, M. Brennock, J. Green and J. Curran.

#### Bull Premiums.

The following letter was read—  
Sir—I have to state, for the information of your committee, that the Department have been in communication with the Department of Finance on the subject of the provision of additional funds for the purpose of supplementing the number of premium bulls in each county in view of the rejection of service bulls as unsuitable under the Live Stock Breeding Act, 1925. The proposals put forward in this connection have now been sanctioned, and I have, therefore, to inform you that it has been arranged to place at the disposal of your committee a sum of up to £250 for the purpose mentioned.

#### Scheme of Loans for the Purchase of Agricultural Implements.

Sir—The Department have decided to resume their scheme of loans for the purchase of agricultural implements which owing to lack of funds, had to be withdrawn last autumn. Copies of the scheme, together with forms of application may be obtained on application to E. and P. Division (B. 4). This scheme might be brought under the notice of farmers in your district, and you should give them such assistance as they may require in selecting a suitable type of machine, and in filling up the application forms. A copy of a notice which is being issued to traders who supplied implements under scheme 12 last year is enclosed for your information.

#### Applicants should be encouraged to obtain quotations from local agents possessing some knowledge of engineering.

This would be particularly advantageous in the case of expensive machinery, such as tractors, etc., as the applicant could thus get full instructions in regard to their working, and have repairs effected more easily than if they obtained the machines direct from the manufacturers.

#### Applicants should be specially warned that if they place orders with the merchants, or take delivery of the implements, etc., prior to the Department's notification to them that a loan has been approved, their applications will be immediately cancelled and their deposits refunded.

Such orders will be placed by the Department direct with the merchants and not by the applicants.—I am, sir, your obedient servant,

#### Horizontal Inspector's Report.

The following was read and considered satisfactory—I have to report that I visited Tallow on the 3rd inst. and met Mr. O'Shea, horticultural instructor, at Mr. D. Slattery's West street, where he was giving instruction on the care and management of gardens. The work included the planting of fifteen trained apples, pears and plums, on which suitable instruction was given. Mr. O'Shea remained here for some considerable time and was usefully employed demonstrating how the work should be done. The trees were of good quality and variety, and the owner and family appeared anxious to take full advantage of the instruction. During this visit to Tallow Mr. O'Shea called on several persons interested in horticulture, and I was present while he gave advice and instruction on the pruning and general management of fruit trees purchased under the County Committee's scheme. Judging from the number of trees planted in this district, fruit growing appears to have developed to a considerable extent, and in this connection there is at the present time an increasing demand for the instructor's services.

#### Potato Growing Competition.

The result of the potato growing competition in County Waterford was as follows—  
Class 1 (confined to crops not less than one acre of any of the following varieties—Kerr's Pink, Arras Victory and Irish Queen). The prizes were awarded as follows—Patrick Dunford, Bohadoun, 1st prize; Martin Kennedy, Stonehouse, Kilmacdonagh, 2nd; R. F. Phelan, Whitefield Farm, Waterford, 3rd; P. K. Buckley, Kilmacthomas, 4th; James Walsh, Remanagh, Dungarvan, 5th. Nicholas Fitzgerald, Ballinasela, Donmahon, and Mice Keane, Crushea, Arinmore, were second and third, respectively in this competition, but were not eligible, the former being a member of the County Committee and the latter being awarded 1st prize in Class 2.

#### Additional Funds for Premium Boars.

The following letter was read—  
Sir—I have to state, for the information of your committee, that the Department have been in communication with the Department of Finance on the subject of the provision of additional funds for the purpose of supplementing the number of premium boars in each county, and that the proposals put forward in this connection have now been sanctioned. I have, therefore, to inform you that it has been arranged to place at the disposal of your committee a sum up to £100 for the purpose mentioned.

#### It should be clearly understood that this special contribution will be granted only on condition that it is utilised for the location of additional premium boars in the county in the year 1926-27, and that the allocation already made by the committee in respect of boar premiums will not be reduced.

#### The Department hope to be able to provide funds for the award of second year premiums in 1927 in respect of any additional boars now placed, but it may be mentioned that the funds in question are included in the Department's annual estimates and have, of course, to be submitted to and sanctioned by the Dail.

#### I have to request that you will be good enough to place this communication before your committee at the earliest opportunity in order that steps may be taken with the least possible delay to select as many further applicants as the amount above-mentioned will permit to hold premium

#### The following remarks concerning the general treatment of the crops entered for competition may be of interest—

Manuring.—In most cases the crop received a fair dressing of farmyard manure, together with from six to twelve cwt. artificial per statute acre. In some cases the artificial was not applied in the proper proportions, with the result that only those who applied the complete mixture obtained large yields.

#### These competitors manured with artificial alone, and one of these, Mr. Dunford, heads the list in the competition.

He applied the complete mixture at the rate of 2½ cwt. sulphate of ammonia, 2½ cwt. muriate of potash and 10 cwt. superphosphate per statute acre.

Experience has proved that to produce heavy yields the proper quantity of artificial, together with a liberal dressing of farmyard manure is 1½ cwt. sulphate of ammonia, 1½ cwt. muriate of potash and 6 cwt. superphosphate per statute acre. Without farmyard 2½ cwt. sulphate of ammonia, 2½ cwt. muriate of potash and 10 cwt. superphosphate per statute acre, where a prolific variety is planted, largely cultivated and well sprayed.

Cultivation.—In some cases the soil was a black loam very easily laboured, and certainly ideal soil for potato growing, particularly potatoes for seed purposes. The remainder of the soil was a light loam suitable for potato growing for table use.

Most of the competitors had their drills of a more suitable width than in previous years. All the prize winners had the drills 26 inches wide with the exception of one grower, who had them 25 inches.

Every farmer should now be convinced that a drill for potatoes any wider than 26 inches is only waste of ground, hard to labour, and liable to serious injury from drought than the narrow drill.

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### Youghal Urban Council.

Present—Messrs. M. Whelan, chairman; P. Kennedy, J. Troy, T. Harrington, J. Bennett, V.G.; P. Curran; S. A. Little Merrick, R. O. Farrell, J. J. McMahon, P.G.; P. J. O'Gorman, P.C.; W. J. Broderick.

#### HARBOUR BOARD.

The Harbour-master reported that only two out of the 15 fishing net cribs were pushed back from the edge of the quay as required by notice.

Chairman—Where are we now?  
Mr. Farrell—What is the good of making an order if it is not carried out?  
The Chairman said it would appear that the fishermen were not inclined to comply with the order.

Mr. Harrington said the men using McDonald's Quay had since complied with the board's order.

Mr. Kennedy suggested that the fishermen get another week or two to carry out the order.

Mr. Bennett said the men intended to play fair in the matter, but at times it was difficult to do it. Again the weather was extremely bad recently.

The Chairman said the Harbour Board were inclined to be as lenient as possible with the fishermen.

Mr. Harrington—They understand that. Ultimately the fishermen were given an other fortnight to comply.

The meeting then took up the council business.

#### Mr. Edenborough's Railings.

Messrs. Holinet and Son, solicitors, wrote regarding the railing at Mr. Edenborough's house, stating they noted that the council had formed its own opinion and had come to the conclusion that the ground in question had for a long period formed part of the public roadway and that it had become public property. On that assumption the railings upon the council would appear to be: (a) an action at common law for trespass, or (b) proceedings under the Towns Improvement Clauses Act, 1847, on the ground that the railing was an "obstacle to safe and convenient passage" along the highway. As stated in their letter of the 18th, the court alone would be the arbiter on (inter alia) the questions—(a) Whether the ground in question was part of the public roadway, and whether it had become public property; (b) whether the railing is such an obstruction as the Act contemplates. They didn't think the council's bye-laws affected that case. The railing didn't come within the definitions of "buildings" given in the bye-laws.

Mr. Kennedy thought the matter had gone far enough. Their solicitor had told them that the railing had been erected on Mr. Edenborough's own ground, and it would be foolish to plunge into a lawsuit in the circumstances. He therefore proposed that they let it drop.

The Chairman said he didn't think they could dispute the matter in that way. Mr. Edenborough had put up that railing without the council's permission and therefore ought to apologise for his action. The clerk would write to that effect. As a public body they could not allow their rights to be treated in such a fashion.

Mr. Farrell—If Mr. Edenborough ignores the letter?

Chairman—If he does I'd be inclined to proceed.

Mr. Bennett—He is on his own ground.

Mr. Farrell—I think the thing is rather too trivial for law, which would cost too much. I second Mr. Kennedy.

Chairman—What is going to happen if others do likewise?

Mr. Merrick said in view of the unceremonious manner in which Mr. Edenborough had treated the council and their servants, the matter could be ended by an apology.

Chairman—It is the only way out of it.

Mr. Farrell—Suppose he says he won't be going to incur £100 or £150 law costs?

Mr. O'Gorman said that there was a lot of publicity given to the matter, and the more it was dragged out the more both sides became irritated. He suggested that the Town Clerk write to Mr. Edenborough stating that the council felt that they were ignored and that he had acted in contravention of their right without first getting their sanction. He thought that getting the matter out of their hands would be the best way.

The Chairman said they were all anxious to get rid of that thing 'out of the council's hands' in a nice position if they allowed Mr. Edenborough to go off scot free. As a public body they should hold their rights intact.

Mr. O'Gorman said Mr. Edenborough had acted unintentionally and didn't think he was trespassing on the council's grounds. Now that they had had legal opinions from both sides, let the clerk write and ask for an expression of apology.

Chairman—He was asked to cease the work by your Town Surveyor. Just he took no notice.

Mr. Kennedy—He was erecting the railing on his own ground.

Mr. McMahon proposed an amendment in accordance with Mr. O'Gorman's suggestion.

After further discussion Mr. Kennedy withdrew his proposition and Mr. O'Gorman's suggestion was adopted unanimously.

#### Coast Erosion.

A letter was read from the Farmers' Committee stating that Messrs. M. R. Flavin, P.C., and T. J. Ostry had been appointed to join the proposed deputations to Dublin on the coast erosion question.

Mr. Broderick said that the County Council had appointed five members to join the deputations.

The council unanimously appointed Mr. O'Gorman and the Town Clerk as their representatives.

#### Main Roads.

The Clerk read from the "Evening Echo" report of the meeting of the County Council, that portion dealing with Mr. Broderick's motion on the main roads question.

The Chairman said their colleague had acquitted himself in a manner that deserved more than gratitude, more than words could convey (hear, hear).

Mr. McMahon said that Mr. Broderick had brought them much "writter" than they had expected.

Mr. O'Gorman—It strengthens our hands to know that we have the premier public body in the county—the County Council—unanimously at our back.

### IMPORTANT POINT IN MILK CASE.

At Carrick-on-Suir District Court in a case in which Guard Bennett prosecuted Patrick Shea, Kate O'Mara, Jane Ryan and James Feely for having supplied milk containing less than the standard fat to Ballinara Creamery, Mr. Walsh and Mr. Verrington, solicitors for defendants, pointed out that the creamery pay suppliers of milk only for the fat extracted by their analysts, and that the defendants are not milk vendors in the ordinary sense.

Mr. McCabe, D.J., pointed out that Guard Bennett had sworn that he bought the milk from the defendants and paid them for it, and yet the summons charged them with selling the milk to the creamery. There was no evidence of a sale to the creamery, and he dismissed the case on the merits. He would state a case if the County Council so wished.

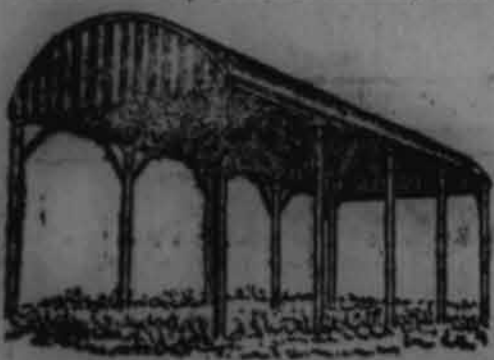

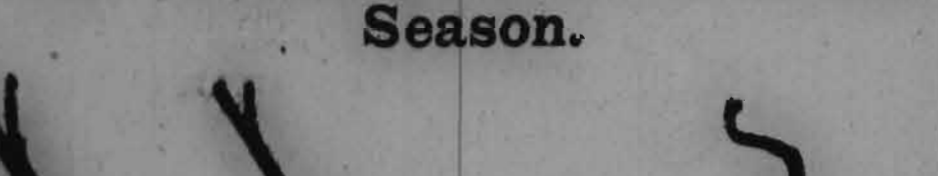
