SCENE AT FARM AUGTION.

Widespread interest was manifested in he sale of Dysert House and Claycastle Farm, which took place on Saturday afternoon, at Messre, John Condon and Sons Sales Mart, Youghal, there being a large attendance of farmers and business men. The farm is situated between Claycastle and the main road between Cork and foughal and contains some 62 acres, part reehold and part subject to an annuity of £18 15s. 2d. It was the subject of litigation recently in the High Courts and was

being sold for the Bank of Ireland. When the auctioneer began to read the onditions of sale, Mr. Thomas Fitzgerald, who was owner (having bought the place a few years ago for £2,800) and who still occupies the residence, interrupted and insisted on making a series of statements which Mr. Condon informed him he would not permit. This was ignored by Mr. Fitzgerald, who persisted in giving details of his dealings in connection with the farm. Mr. Condon said he would have Mr. Fitzgerald removed if he didn't allow the sale to go on. Ultimately Sergt. O'Sullivan was called in and with the assistance of other Guards removed Mr. Fitzgerald, who resisted strongly to the street outside. He entinued shouting in from the door. As he could not proceed in face of the interuptions, the auctioneer ordered the door

to be closed and the sale proceeded.

Having read the conditions of sale, Mr. Condon, addressing the audience in the salesroom, referred to the remarks made by Mr. Blythe when introducing the Budget on Wednesday last, and quoted the ollowing from a recent Lender in the "Examiner"-"Many people blame the banks for not lending money more freely on the security of land and for not providing better accommodation for farmers and others. But while there are people in the country who confuse evictions of past history for non-payment of rack rents to landlords with the perfectly legitimate 'sellings' out by banks at the present day it is hard to see how the matter of credit can be improved. If a bank enables a man to carry on by advancing him money on the security of his farm, and if subsequently he is unable to meet his obligations, public opinion must be distinctly on the side of the bank if the debtor forces it to sue him. If we are to establish ourselves on a business-like basis, sloppy senmentality and 'grousing' must cease once for all. On this question of credit, there is little doubt that if the farmers of an extensive locality, say, a whole parish, went to a bank and assured the Directors that money advanced on the security of land or cattle would be duly repaid, and that in the event of the failure of any borrower no sentimentality would be entertained, and the bank would be assured of full repayment, there would be less cause for complaint about the tightness of credit." Mr. Condon went on to say that every man in the audience was interested in putting down interference with the right of sale justly exercised by a bank or other creditor, and he appealed to intending buyers not to be deterred by a staged per-
