

The following letter was read from the Department, which stated that some local athorities are in doubt as to their fanction in connection with the scavenging of main roads in urban districts :- "Where is the daty of a County Council to maintain and construct main roads in urban aret the County Council is under obliga tion to eleanse the roads so far as may be necessary for the proper maintenance of the roads for treffic. Where the road is a 'uneot,' Section 52 of the Public Health Act, 1878, empowers the Urban District Council as sanitary authority to undertake or contract for the proper cleaning of the street. The exercise of this power may be enforced by order of the Minister. The street requires more attention than a road. Sank extra work can and should be performed by the Urban District Council.
