**SENT FOR TRIAL FOR HAVING ARMS.**  
At Carrick-on-Suir District Court, Wm. Sinnott and Richard Sinnott, of Ballinlone, three miles from Carrick-on-Suir, were sent for trial to Clonmel Circuit Court on a charge of having arms and ammunition in their houses without authority.  
Detective Officers gave evidence of having found in Richard Sinnott's house 114 rounds of .38 rifle ammunition, a rifle barrel, a rifle pull through and a military haversack. At Wm. Sinnott's they found a service rifle under the stairs. It was oiled and greased. Wm. Sinnott said his brother Richard put the rifle there without his knowledge or permission. Richard Sinnott said his brother's statement was quite true. Bail was allowed in the case of Wm. Sinnott, but it was refused in the case of Richard Sinnott.

**A BAD CASE.**  
At the Dungarvan District Court on Wednesday week, before Mr. Troy, D.J., a girl named Kathleen Flynn, who gave her address as Castleborough, Co. Cork, was charged by Sup. Murray with being drunk and incapable.  
The Superintendent, in stating the case said the girl was brought to the barracks by civilians, who found her on the quay. Guard Nevin deposed he was barracked on the 27th April. About 10.15 p.m. the girl was brought into the barracks by three or four civilians, who said they found her on the quay.  
Patrick Lyons deposed that he saw the girl coming down the Main street. She was drunk. She turned down towards the quay. He asked her who she was and where she was going, but she made no answer as she was incapable. He took her to the barracks for her own safety.  
Defendant, in reply to the Justice, said she did not want to ask any questions.  
Justice—I think we met before. Weren't you sent to jail from Clonmel for being drunk? Defendant—Yes, sir.  
To the Justice—She was coming from New Ross where she had a place and was going home to Castleborough. She was six weeks in New Ross. Before that she was at Mary McSwiney's for 2 years and 11 months.  
To the Superintendent—She was in Kilmainham Jail. She did not know how long she was there. She was in Waterford Jail also.  
To the Justice—It was after going to Kilmainham Jail she was with Mary McSwiney.  
In reply to the Justice, Guard Kelly said the defendant was arrested in Waterford on an old warrant about two months ago. After that she went to New Ross. Superintendent—For her own safety I thought it better to bring up the case to-day.  
Justice—If I thought the girl was going home I would deal lightly with her.  
Defendant—I will, sir. I have a bicycle which I came from New Ross on.  
Justice—I will impose a penalty of 15s. and costs or 14 days without hard labour, payment to be made forthwith. The Superintendent in the meantime would make inquiries if the girl had employment so that he could know all about her if she was before him again. He paid a warm tribute to the men who took the girl to the barracks for the girls spirit displayed by them, and in the case of one of them named Kieley, who was fined 10s. at the court in another case, he would remit the fine.  
The Superintendent said he was very glad the Justice referred to the civic spirit shown. This was the third case where witnesses came to give evidence without being summoned, and there were several other cases where assistance was given, but no evidence required.

Youghal Water Supply

OFFICIAL TEST OF PRESSURE.

A special meeting of the Youghal Urban Council was held on Wednesday afternoon in connection with the official test and opening of the new waterworks scheme.

Mr. James Bannell, vice-chairman, presided, and the other councillors present were—Messrs. P. J. O'Gorman, P.C.; J. R. Smyth, P.C.; P. J. McMahon, P.C.; P. Kenneally, S. A. Little, Merrick, J. Forrest, R. G. Farrell, A. W. D. Murphy, A. J. Fowkes, T. Harrington, M. D. Broderick, J. Troy, W. Coughlan, M. J. Fleming.

The officials present were—Dr. D. J. Murphy, M.O.H.; M. H. Walsh, P.C., Town Clerk; H. T. Survevor, J. Troy, Town Superintendent; Mr. V. Watson, Manager Provincial Bank; treasurer, W. Sweeney, assistant clerk, and W. J. Treacy, water curator.

The contractors, Messrs. J. and M. Murray, were also present. A letter was read from Mr. B. O'Flynn, B.E., Cork, engineer to the scheme, apologising for his inability to attend.

The assembly proceeded first to Moll Goggin's Corner, where satisfactory tests were made with the smaller mains supplying the Strand on low pressure—one-eighth from the head works at Boula, the hydrants and hoses being manipulated by the members of the municipal Fire Brigade.

At the conclusion of the tests, the Vice-Chairman said they had met to formally test and open the improved waterworks, so badly needed, especially during the summer months when the supply had been so inadequate for many years. The late council had done their best to improve matters, sending Messrs. O'Gorman, Smyth and the Town Clerk as a deputation to the Government Department in Dublin on two occasions, with the satisfactory result that 12 months ago they succeeded in obtaining a grant of £7,000.

The council raised a similar amount by way of loan. The contract for the work was given to the well-known local firm, Messrs. Murray and Sons, and now they had a water supply second to none in the country in both quality and quantity. That was something to boast of justly, and he might add that they were determined to do everything in their power to make the old town by the sea up-to-date in all necessary respects (hear, hear).

Mr. O'Gorman said that was an occasion on which they, as representatives of the people of Youghal, had reason to be happy—the successful finish of the improved waterworks scheme. They all knew to what a state the inadequacy of the water supply had brought the town, especially in its character of a seaside resort. For many years that had been a thorny topic with their public men. Four years ago the then council, recognising the absolute necessity of improving the water supply if the place was to continue a seaside resort, decided to make a last desperate effort and sent a deputation to Dublin. The people of Youghal had reason to be grateful to the Government, who ultimately gave them a big grant as stated by the vice-chairman, with the present happy result. The Town Clerk had informed him that two years ago the average height in the town reservoir was 10ft. 4ins. They then installed a boosted pump at considerable cost, which improved matters for the time, but at a cost of £1,300. Indeed, only for that pump the name of Youghal was ruined as a seaside resort, for the average went up to 14ft. Since the installation of the new 8-inch main they had a regular height of 18ft. with as much overflow down Cork Hill as would keep another town going. As was well known the Strand, with its residents and visitors, was the principal sufferer in the past. Since the new installation the pressure in that locality had gone up from 30 or 40lbs. to 100lbs. Under the old regime the in-flow during the night to the reservoir was 13ins.; now it is 7ft. There were other things to be done, and the council were prepared to do all they could to meet all the reasonable requirements of both townspeople and visitors. It spoke well for the financial stability of Youghal that when they approached the Provincial Bank with the object of raising £7,000 for the waterworks scheme they were well received and the amount advanced in due course. The present council were imbued with the idea of doing everything in their power to make Youghal, as a seaside resort, second to none in the country. He could not conclude without paying a warm tribute of praise to Messrs. M. Murray and Sons, the contractors for the waterworks scheme, for the highly successful manner in which they had carried out the work. With eight miles of main to lay through difficult

country, rock and busy thoroughfare, it was no easy task, but they finished it with credit to themselves and deep satisfaction to the community.

Dr. D. J. Murphy said as medical officer of health for the district he was very pleased to be in a position to state for the benefit of their intending summer visitors that Youghal had now a splendid water supply, copious in quantity and excellent in quality, and most satisfactory domestic sanitary arrangements. There was now no fear of a deficiency as regards the water supply, and that was only what they might expect from the fact that the work had been done by the well-known local firm of Messrs. Murray and Sons. They had a variety of amusements, including golf links, tennis courts, recreation halls, etc. The next thing they should do was to try and induce the Railway Company to bring the people down at lower rates (hear, hear). The council had shown they had the interests of the town at heart by doing great and most essential work, and it was up to them all to help in making Youghal foremost among the watering places of the South (hear, hear).

Mr. Broderick said the previous speaker left him very little to say. It was known far and wide that nature had done a great deal for Youghal. Hitherto they had laboured under one important limitation—an inadequate water supply. Now, thanks to the grant given by the Government and the loan raised by the council, they had a supply equalled by no other in Ireland. As one who had much experience of travelling both in Ireland and England, he could bear testimony to the fact that their local hotel accommodation was second to none. Now that they could give their visitors an ample water supply there was no reason why their town would not be the foremost Irish seaside resort. The successful completion of the water scheme was a credit to the engineer, Mr. B. O'Flynn, Cork, and to the contractors, Messrs. Murray and Sons, Youghal. With the new motor boat on the Ferry there would be ample provision for carrying people across to the Co. Waterford, where they would also find hotel accommodation up-to-date in every respect. Henceforth tourists and visitors to Youghal would have nothing to complain of.

Mr. V. Watson, Manager Provincial Bank, said it was an extreme pleasure to him to be present at that very interesting ceremony. He thanked Mr. O'Gorman for his felicitous remarks regarding the connection between the council and the Provincial Bank, a connection extending back 40 years. From his experience he said unhesitatingly that the Youghal Urban Council was one of the most capably managed concerns in the country. They owed a deep debt of gratitude to the council for bringing that important scheme to a successful issue. It was up to the community at large to give the council every possible support in making that gem of Irish scenery one of the most attractive seaside resorts in the whole of Ireland (hear, hear).

The councillors and staff then proceeded to the Market Square. Here with the same low pressure (one-seventh) water was easily driven 12ft. over the "cock" of the Clockgate, which is 90ft. high. The exhibition at both points were witnessed by a large number of interested spectators.

Lynch, a clerk at Carrick-on-Suir Post Office, but he did not pay it noticing the way in which the figures were written. Mr. Lynch consulted the advice note and found that the amount was £2 0s. 10d. An order for £2 18s. 10d. presented by her to Mr. Power, post office clerk, was found by him on referring to the advice note to be really for £2 1s. 8d. He did not pay it.

Mr. Joyce, Manager Provincial Bank, Carrick-on-Suir, stated that defendant paid back £17 18s., the difference between the real amount of the order and the altered figures. Miss Walsh, Clerk Carrick-on-Suir Post Office; Mr. Cooper, Postmaster, Waterford, and Mr. J. B. Justice, of the Post Office Investigation Department, also gave evidence. Mr. Justice said defendant admitted to him that she altered the figures in the orders.

Dungarvan Urban Council

Mr. M. Brennan, P.C., chairman, presided. Also present—Messrs. John Carran, M. J. Keane, P. J. McGrath, J. Moore, J. Hackett, Mrs. Griffin, T. Power, Wm. O'Donnell.

**Expenditure.**  
The expenditure for the week was as follows:—Waterworks account, £106 10s. 6d.; general account, £15 10s. 5d.

**Chairman—**How does the water grant account stand? Clerk—It is overdrawn.

**To Mr. Power,** the Clerk said the money was to come from the Department.

**Chairman—**What is to come? Clerk—About £227.

The Borough Surveyor said he wanted other connections, but he did not know the cost.

**Mr. McGrath—**Where will we get the money when that is spent?

**Borough Surveyor—**I hope we won't want any, as I think we can finish with the money. Roughly about £20 will be the cost of the connection required.

**Clerk—**You have already decided to close down when the money is expended.

**Mr. McGrath—**And leave the street open.

**Clerk—**We can look ahead a bit.

**Chairman—**We will have roughly £200 for wages.

**Borough Surveyor—**We will be able to finish with that.

The Chairman called attention to a leak in the main in O'Connell street, and Mr. Hackett said that a lorry got stuck in Mary street on Thursday.

The Borough Surveyor explained that the weather was wet when that place was being touched and it had not time to dry off.

**Chairman—**I met Rev. Mr. Going, Abbeyside, and he complained to me of the state of the Skibacrine road owing to the street being removed from the water tables and left on the side of the road. Two cars could not pass. The staff could as easily have been put over the fence.

**Mr. Griffin—**I thought that was unnecessary work.

**Chairman—**And so it was. It is worse now than when they went there when it was not finished.

**Mr. McGrath—**Finish the water scheme and then we can do the small jobs.

**Mr. Griffin—**The Abbeyside pond opposite the school is in an awful state and the children cannot play there.

**Mr. McGrath—**Does the wall at Tierney's need pointing?

**Mr. Griffin—**I met attended to soon it will be a big job.

**Chairman—**In future when any job is taken on it must be finished and not be going from one job to another.

**Mr. McGrath—**When the water scheme is finished there are a lot of jobs to be done.

**Tenders for Cement.**  
Two tenders were received for cement in connection with the new footpath in Thomas street, viz.—Reps. Moe, Flynn, 6 tons at £2 12s. 3d. per ton; Mr. John Croft, 6 tons at £3 12s. 3d. per ton.

After a discussion the names were put into a hat and Mr. Croft's tender being drawn was accepted.

**Tenders for Footpath.**  
Only one tender was received for the making of a new footpath in Thomas St., viz.—John Woods for the sum of £26.

**Mr. Griffin—**Did you advertise for tenders or post up notice?

**Clerk—**The Borough Surveyor gave a list of tradesmen who were notified.

**Borough Surveyor—**My estimate for the work, the contractor to supply the material, is £47.

**Chairman—**This tender is very vague. We should ask Mr. Woods what exactly he means in his tender.

**Mr. McGrath—**Could it be done cheaper by direct labour?

**Borough Surveyor—**I would not care to touch direct labour.

**Chairman—**I think you are right.

**Mr. Griffin—**What I want is to get the notice for contractors posted and then we will have plenty of tenders.

**Mr. McGrath—**I suggest we invite tenders again.

**Chairman—**Very well.

**Mr. Keane—**It is unfair to turn down the man who came here and tendered. He suggested sending for the contractor and hear what he has to say.

**Chairman—**The order to re-advertise is now made.

**Harbour Dues.**  
The Manager Munster and Leinster Bank wrote applying for £88 7s. 6d., second instalment of the harbour mortgage dues.

**Chairman—**How do we stand with that? Clerk—There is no money to pay.

**Mr. McGrath—**What will the council do in the matter?

**Clerk—**Mr. Butler raised the question of the increased due in the Dail and sent the answer he got.

The following letter was read on the subject:—"There has been no delay on the part of my Department in dealing with this matter. The question of increasing the Dungarvan Harbour dues was first raised in a letter from the solicitor to the Urban District Council dated November 4th, 1925. That letter was replied to on the 9th detailing the necessary procedure. Since then the solicitor states that the clerk of the council and the harbour master have been engaged collecting the requisite particulars. The formal application for a temporary order under the Harbour, Docks and Piers (Temporary Increase of Charges) Act, 1920, was forwarded by letter from the solicitor dated 20th inst., and the particulars supplied with that letter are being examined preparatory to the application being forwarded to the Rates Advisory Committee for a report in accordance with the provision of the Act."

**Mr. O'Donnell—**We should expedite the thing.

**Dance.**  
The Band Committee were granted the use of the Hall for a dance on Wednesday.

**May 8th.**  
The G.A.A. Amusements Committee met on the application of Mr. J. Keenan, granted the Hall for Monday, May 8th.

**Urban Main Road.**  
The following letter was read from the Department, which stated that some local authorities are in doubt as to their function in connection with the scavenging of main roads in urban districts:—"Where it is the duty of a County Council to maintain and construct main roads in urban areas the County Council is under obligation to cleanse the roads so far as may be necessary for the proper maintenance of the roads for traffic. Where the road is a 'main road' Section 22 of the Public Health Act, 1913, empowers the Urban District Council as sanitary authority to undertake or contract for the proper cleaning of the street. The exercise of this power may be enforced by order of the Minister. The street requires more attention than a road. Such extra work can and should be performed by the Urban District Council. There is no legal objection to the two councils agreeing that one council shall perform the other's duties and receive a reasonable payment for doing so."

**Mr. O'Donnell—**They are leaving the dirty job to the council—the scavenging?

**Mr. McGrath—**I propose we do the cleaning and scavenging of the streets.

**Chairman—**If the clerk write to the Secretary of the County Council and ask him to bring the matter before his council.

**Mr. Keane—**We will have to come to terms with them.

After further discussion the Clerk was asked to communicate with the Secretary of the County Council on the matter.

**Division of Suburban Roads.**  
Mr. Bowen, county surveyor, wrote stating that the division in the suburban roads would take effect now. They, the County Council, would do the outside portion and the Urban Council the inside portion.

**Borough Surveyor—**That arrangement will suit all right. Our portion will be nearer the quarry, etc.

**Opening Up the Streets.**  
A letter was read from Mr. Bowen, county surveyor, stating that after this date no further opening will be allowed on the main roads of the town without asking permission from the County Council.

**Cinema License.**  
A letter was read from the Secretary of the County Council stating that the County Council refused to refund the money received from Mr. D. Croft in respect of cinema license.

**Mr. McGrath—**Are we entitled to it?

**Mr. Keane—**Mr. McCoy says we are not.

The matter then ended.

**Tourist Development Association.**  
The Clerk stated that a meeting of the above was held the previous day, and they asked that a deputation from the council meet them on next Monday evening with a view to inquire into and see what improvements could be effected, and also to make arrangements with the Railway Company re excursion trains on Sunday evenings.

**Chairman—**There are special cheap fares provided by the Railway Company one day each week to Waterford and we ought to ask for same.

It was decided that all the members who could attend meet the Tourist Committee on Monday.

**Statement of Accounts.**  
The Clerk submitted the following statement of accounts up to 23rd April, 1926:—

**Loans—**Waterworks—Amount borrowed—£14,000; outstanding, £2,000. 1s. 6d. Glending—Amount borrowed—£5,870; outstanding, £3,438 16s. 1d. Housing—No. 1 Scheme—Amount borrowed, £1,700; amount outstanding, £425. No. 2 Scheme—£1,200; amount outstanding, £708. No. 3 Scheme—£3,870; amount outstanding, £3,102 13s. 3d. No. 4 Scheme—£8,291; amount outstanding, £5,384 1s. 9d. Housing Scheme in Progress—£5,000; outstanding, £5,000. Town Hall Improvements—Amount borrowed, £10; outstanding, £24 10s. Steamrolling—Amount borrowed, £1,600; outstanding, £1,325 8s. 7d. Rebuilding quay wall—Amount borrowed, £1,500; outstanding, £1,450. Liabilities—Instalments due to the Board of Works, £1,338 3s. 8d.; sundry creditors, £219 17s. 8d.; assets, £1,380 18s.

**Mr. Keane—**It is close on £20,000 and it is a colossal figure for this town. It is time to cry halt to loans.

**Chairman—**The new scheme of £5,000 is included in that and that money is not got yet.

**Clerk—**Will I eliminate that item?

**Chairman—**Yes. How many houses have the council? Clerk—62.

**Chairman—**Fifty-two houses the property of the council and two waterworks schemes in perfect order and your total liabilities only £13,000.

**Borough Surveyor—**Take the average value of the houses at present at £200. That would be £10,000.

**Chairman—**That is a small average.

**Mr. O'Donnell—**There is no need to worry over the financial position of the council.

**Mr. Power—**Would it be possible to sell any of the schemes of houses?

**Chairman—**Personally I would be in favour of selling the houses.

**Borough Surveyor—**Yes, but a whole scheme together, it would not do to sell one or two.

**Mr. McGrath—**I consider the financial statement very satisfactory.

**Notice of Motion.**  
Mr. Griffin moved his notice of motion:—"That the council negotiate with the agent of the Duke of Devonshire with a view to becoming the owners of the Meat and Fish Markets in toto."

After a short discussion, and there being no seconder, Mr. Griffin withdrew the motion.

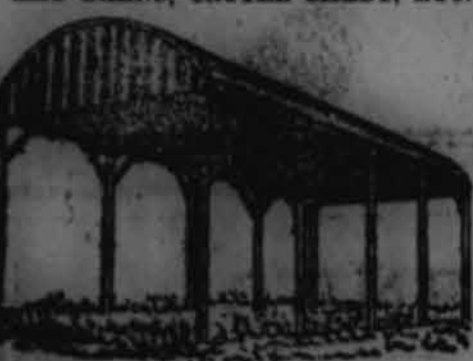

Drowning of Child Remains.

Before Mr. Troy, D.J., the body of a child was found in the sea near the shore of the town of Dungarvan, on Sunday, March 7th, 1926. The child was identified as the daughter of Mr. J. J. Croft, of the town of Dungarvan.
