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Dungarvan District Court.

DROWNING OF CHILD—ACCUSED REMANDED.

Before Mr. Troy, D.J.
Guard Navin prosecuted Daniel Croxly with using a committal writ for hatching purposes. Mr. Croxly, aged 27, was charged with the drowning of a child in the sea on the occasion of a demonstration recently held there.
Mr. Croxly said very few people were aware of this section of the Act. Mr. Croxly did not know of the section. He admitted it was a case that would come under the Protection of Offences Act. Mr. Croxly having given evidence, the Justice said he thought Mr. Croxly knew the difference between the licenses. He was liable to a fine of £50, which he imposed, but he would remit it to £5.

Licensing Case.

Supt. Murray charged Ed. Hally, O'Connell street, with a breach of the Licensing Act on Sunday, March 7th. A man named Curran was summoned for being found outside the premises with a bottle of spirit.
Mr. Hally said he was on special duty on that day at 12.30. He was coming down Western Terrace and he saw a man going in at the back of Hally's. He followed him in and found him with a large bottle of stout at Hally's door. Curran told him he had the bottle since Saturday night, and after a while he said he would sell the stout—that he got it from Mr. Hally. He knocked at Hally's back door. Mr. Hally opened it and witness asked him to account for the bottle of stout. Mr. Hally gave no explanation.
By Mr. Hally—The place was quite open, but he did not know who owned it. Where he found Curran was outside Hally's back door. The place was a cotterage. It was quite possible to bring in the bottle there.
Mr. Hally said on that day he was out in the stable and Curran came along. They were great friends. Curran told him he came from Ballyvane. He left the Guard in and told him he supplied Mery's stout.
Mr. Hally said he came to court to admit this offence. Curran was a traveller, and after 10 minutes more would be entitled to go on the premises. He submitted it was a case under the Protection of Offences Act. There was no case against the defendant.

Alleged Murder Charge.

The Attorney-General charged Mary O'Brien, Canby, with the murder of John O'Brien, Canby, aged 9 months. Mr. E. A. Ryan, State Solr., prosecuted, and Mr. Spears represented accused.
Dr. Hackett deposed in answer to Mr. Ryan, that he was in charge of the hospital at Dungarvan. On April 27th John O'Brien was brought to his house. He examined the child. He was partly conscious and suffering from shock. He ordered the child to hospital, where it died next morning. Shock and asphyxia were in his opinion the cause of death in consequence of immersion in water.
Mrs. O'Brien deposed she lived at Canby. She was the mother of the boy, John O'Brien. She lived with her husband, Mr. O'Brien, farmer. She remembered 27th April. She left the house to take tea to her husband at 4.15 p.m. She left a little girl Kathleen, 2 years, and John O'Brien in the house; also Mary O'Brien, defendant. She is my husband's sister. She has lived with us for years. When she left the two children were asleep in separate cots. Defendant was blowing the fire. When she returned to the house shortly after the child John was missing. Defendant was also missing. She called Mary O'Brien by name and she answered. I asked her where the child was gone and she said he was drowned. There is an old pond in the vicinity of the house and she looked towards the pond and saw a garment. She took the child out of the pond with a pole. She called her husband and he came. Mary O'Brien was standing by while I was taking out the child. Witness didn't notice any change in her. The child was alive and her husband took her to Dungarvan. The child was 9 months old. She always lived on good terms with defendant, who appeared very fond of the child.

Co. Board of Public Health.

APPOINTMENT OF ENGINEERS.

A meeting of the above was held in the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Tuesday, Mr. P. O'Gorman, chairman presided. Also present—Messrs. J. Butler, T.D.; Wm. Stack, D. Conway, Rd. Delaney, J. G. Duke, J. P. McAluffe, J. Kiersey, J. O'Donnell and Fr. Mulcahy.
The Secretary's report on the collection of the above in Collector Doyle's area has been read.
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Tallow District.

The Secretary stated that during the last half-year the arrears of rents in the Tallow district under Collector Cunningham increased from £70 to £115. There were over 30 tenants who paid nothing during the last half-year.
The board decided to inform Collector Cunningham that unless he showed an improvement in the collection his services would be dispensed with.
Ring Water Supply.
Mr. McCarthy, Ring, who had agreed with the old Rural District Council to allow them enter his land in connection with the above for the sum of £10, appeared before the board.
Secretary—This was brought up at last meeting. I looked the matter up since and I find it was in the estimate to put a concrete tank here.
Mr. Conway—What compensation was he to get? Secretary—£10.
Mr. McCarthy—£10 was the agreement and I was to be paid for any damage done.
There is a large tank on the site of a concrete tank and the land is opened up. They also cut through a field of corn for which there was necessity at the time as the pipes had not arrived.
Chairman—£200 was the estimate for the work, and the estimate provided for a concrete tank. The £200 was expended and no tank put there.
Mr. Conway said at that time things were a bit upset, but the fact is Mr. McCarthy was not compensated for the work. The £10 in the agreement would never compensate Mr. McCarthy.
Chairman—What do you suggest?
Mr. Conway—Put the tank there and have a right supply. The District Council would have attended to the matter, but they received no complaint from Mr. McCarthy.
Mr. McCarthy—I live away from this place and I must mind my cattle there. I also worked with my horses there and never got paid for it.
Mr. Mulcahy—The board should treat Mr. McCarthy fairly.
Chairman—What compensation do you want? Mr. McCarthy—I have handed in my claim.
Secretary—The amount is £34, including the £10 for the tank.
Mr. Delaney—Is this board or the County Council who is now responsible?
After further discussion Mr. Kiersey proposed, and Mr. Mulcahy seconded, that this board recommend to the County Council that Mr. McCarthy be paid the sum of £10, the sum agreed upon between Mr. McCarthy and the Dungarvan Rural District Council, and £15 to cover his further claim. This was passed.

No Pension.

Mr. Jas. Condon, clerk in Mr. Flynn's office, wrote stating that at the time his salary was fixed by the board he was to have a pension. Now that the pension was refused by the L.G.B., he asked that he get an increase.
The board decided to give Mr. Condon 4s per week subject to sanction.

Increased Pounds.

Mr. Power, rent collector in the Youghal No. 9 district, wrote asking the board to increase his poundage from 7s to 10 per cent.
Chairman—We are giving enough; we must keep down the rates.
Mr. Conway—We have two collectors and two sanitary officers in that district, which is one of the smallest in the county. It is ridiculous. No action was taken.

Appointment of Two Engineers.

In connection with the appointment of two engineers, the L.G.B. wrote stating one whole-time officer would be sufficient, and gave a draft copy of what his duties would be.

COUNTY WATERFORD FARMERS' ASSOCIATION.

MEETING IN DUNGARVAN.

A meeting of the Executive of the County Waterford Association of the Farmers' Union was held at Egan's Hotel, Dungarvan, on Saturday last. Mr. Nicholas Wall, T.D., presided in the unavoidable absence of Senator Sir John Keane, and there was a representative attendance of delegates from the different branches in the county.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, confirmed and signed.

Amongst the correspondence was a letter from Sir John Keane giving his views in connection with the different resolutions on the agenda.

A resolution of sympathy with the relatives of the late Mr. Gus Goff, Kilmessan, who died on his way to Australia, was proposed by Mr. N. Wall, T.D., seconded by Mr. John Connor, and passed in silence, the members standing.

Touching references were made to the services rendered by the late Mr. Goff to the Kilmessan branch and the Farmers' Union generally.

A resolution of sympathy was passed, on the motion of Mr. David Coghlan, seconded by Mr. Michel Shanahan, with the relatives of Mrs. Baldwin, Coughlansgarr, Portlaoise.

Copies of these resolutions were ordered to be forwarded to the relatives of the deceased.

Mr. N. Wall, T.D., and Mr. Ed. O'Kennedy, of the Passage East branch, delegates to the annual Congress of the Farmers' Union, Dublin, made interesting statements in connection with matters discussed at the Congress, including: Economy in National and Local Expenditure; Maintenance of the Milk and Fresh Roads and Motor Taxation; Primary Education; Agricultural Grants and Grants in aid of Mental Hospital Patients; Banking and Agricultural Credit, etc.

The next matter under discussion was a resolution from the Passage East branch that in future all Executive meetings should be reported in the Press.

Mr. O'Kennedy, of the Passage East branch, having spoken in connection with this matter, the Secretary pointed out that reports of meetings of the Executive were always reported in the Press.

The resolution was withdrawn.

A resolution was received from the Rathgorman branch asking the Executive to consider the propriety of admitting the Press to meetings of the County Executive.

Mr. Godfrey J. Greene proposed the adoption of the resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Declan Conway, Co. C., of Grange branch.

A long discussion ensued, and the resolution having been put to the meeting, it was declared lost by a large majority.

A resolution was received from the Rathgorman branch in connection with the recent steps taken by the County Council to effect economy. A further resolution was received from the Clashmore branch in similar terms. A resolution was also received from the Passage East branch asking that agendas for the County Council meetings should be discussed at Executive meetings of the Co. Waterford Farmers' Union prior to County Council meetings.

Mr. John Kiersey, Chairman of the County Council, made an important speech in reference to these resolutions, dealing with the position of the County Council and the steps that had been taken to effect economy. He referred to the legacy of debt left by the previous council. The County Council had reduced the cost of the upkeep of roads. They had no power over the Board of Health or the Mental Hospital, etc., but they had done what they could to get those bodies to reduce their estimates. He pointed out that it would not be practicable to have the agendas of the County Council meetings discussed at the Executive meetings of the Farmers' Union.

Other members of the County Council present endorsed what Mr. Kiersey had said, and no action was taken in regard to the resolutions.

Arising out of the resolution from the Passage East branch dealing with the payment of the quota from the County Associations to headquarters, and the advisability of appointing a few paid organisers to attend branches throughout the county, Mr. O'Kennedy pointed out that there was no laxity in regard to this matter in the Co. Waterford, but the same could not be said of other counties. He proposed the adoption of the resolution.

Mr. W. C. Coughlan seconded the motion.

The Chairman, Mr. M. O'Brien and others having spoken as to the lack of necessity in this county for such action, owing to the high efficiency of the organisation in Co. Waterford, the resolution was withdrawn.

A resolution from the Passage East branch in connection with the bonus granted to the County Secretary was withdrawn by Mr. O'Kennedy.

Other business having been transacted, the meeting terminated.

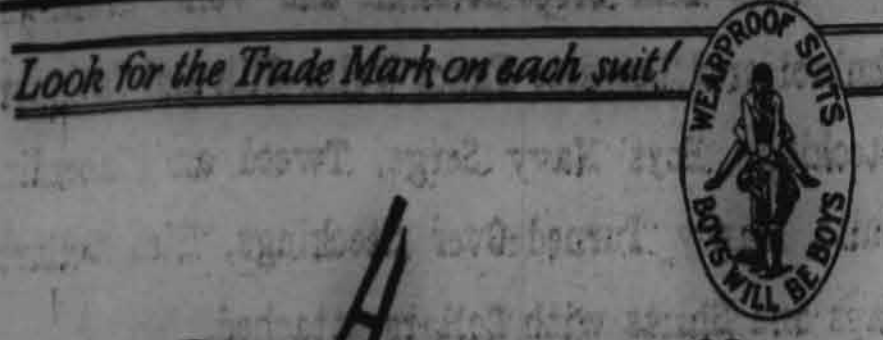

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Golden Jubilee of County Waterford.

We clip the following from the "Catholic News" of San Fernando, Port of Spain, West Indies, of March 27th, 1926.

As His Grace the Archbishop said on a former occasion, although God works in many ways, it is no reason that we have below should not show our appreciation of them, and our gratitude to those who, with no thought of earthly reward, spend their life in the service of their fellow-men.

With this object, a representative gathering of the parishioners of San Fernando assembled at the Convent of St. Joseph there to do honour to Rev. Mother Louise Quinn, Superior of the Convent. She that day celebrated the Golden Jubilee of her profession. Born at Ballinacorney, Waterford, Co. Waterford, Ireland, on the 26th October, 1830, she took the vows of a nun of St. Joseph of Clary at the age of 26. Immediately after her profession, she was sent to St. Lucia, but remained there only for a short time. She arrived in Trinidad on April 25th, 1856, and immediately joined the Staff of the Convent School at Arima. She has taught in the Convent Schools of Arica, Grenada, St. Joseph and San Fernando, where she eventually returned as Mother Superior.

The Mass was followed by Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

The following is the text of the address: San Fernando, 19th March, 1926. The Rev. Mother Louise, Superior of St. Joseph's Convent.

Dear Mother—it is with very great joy that we, the parishioners of San Fernando, beg to tender you our warmest congratulations on your having attained your fiftieth year of sacrificial service in the Master's Vineyard.

When we reflect upon the fact that of these fifty years of exclusive devotion to duty, no fewer than forty-eight were spent in the Archdiocese, and that you laboured in this parish on one previous occasion, our hearts are at once filled with the most grateful consideration towards you.

Combining in yourself great patience, mild firmness, stability of zeal, depth of sympathy and solicitude—in short—a rare motherly disposition, you have found happiness in working, even under conditions adverse to your health, in the interests of the sanctification of souls, and you made it abundantly evident that your motto was "To minister and not to be ministered unto."

So lovingly have you presided these in sin to make speedily reconciliatory with their Master; so touchingly have you cheered and consoled the poor and the afflicted; so evidently willing were you to help others with your prayers; so unreservedly disposed were you to all who sought your mature counsel that it is a little wonder that you enjoy the highest respect, yes, the abiding love of Catholic and non-Catholic alike in every sphere of your life's activities.

Such a life of unostentatious yet effective sacrifice in the moral and spiritual interests of others is, indeed, exemplary, and it is, no doubt, a source of great gratification to you to witness the fruits of the edifying influence which for half a century you have exerted on those committed to your care. Among young and old, rich and poor, in this parish, your kindness is proverbial.

We join with you, dear Mother, in thanksgiving to God for having thus prolonged your life of usefulness, and do fervently pray that you may be blessed with health and strength, to continue for many years to come, that good and noble work which you have hitherto so successfully performed.—We are, dear Mother, your gratefully—J. 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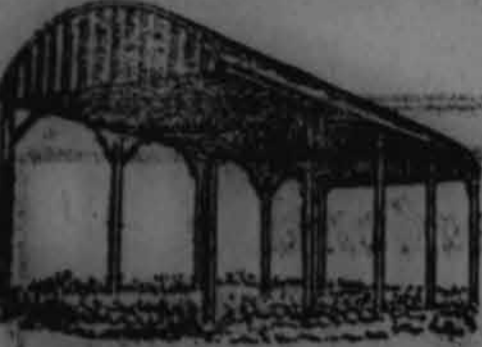
