Kilmacthomas News
Crops.—The climatic conditions of April and May were pretty favourably disposed towards all branches of field-work in this neighbourhood. During these months, however, the temperature remained rather low, and occasional night frosts occurred which caused a set-back—happily of a non-toxic nature—to potatoes and early blossoms. At the close of last month heavy showers were of frequent occurrence and meadows and growing crops appeared to have most appreciably benefited by them. All main crop potato varieties promise a substantial yield in places where they have been well sprayed. The oats crop, which shot up somewhat slowly at the outset, is progressing vigorously at present. Turnips and mangolds are showing up strong and healthy. Judging by the "looks" of some of the best plots we have seen hereabouts, the Carlow Sugar Factory Proprietors can cheerfully anticipate a tip-top return from their local plantations. Thinning operations are now completed by the vast majority of our growers. Meadows are nicely fresh and fertile, but in some parts last week's incessant rains wrought serious damage in the way of causing hay grasses to become lodged. Unusually as the weather undoubtedly is to date, things on the whole, are not—well, badly bad!

COUNTY WATERFORD COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE.
SHEEP BREEDING SCHEME, 1926.

For the purpose of improving the breeds of Mountain Sheep in Co. Waterford, the Waterford County Committee of Agriculture are prepared subject to the approval of the Department of Agriculture Black-faced Rams on the commonage areas of the Comeragh Mountains and the Waterford area of the Knockmealdown Mountains on the following conditions:—

1.—The Committee shall grant to each selected Applicant a Premium of £5 towards the purchase price, the Ram to be maintained in good and healthy breeding condition for two breeding seasons.
2.—Purchasers of Rams shall be required to insure the animals against death for one year for the proportion of the price payable by them.
3.—In the allocation of Rams preference will be given to Applicants who apply on behalf of Sheep Owners who are prepared to mate the Rams to selected Ewes.
4.—The Committee will endeavour to secure that only rams of a high standard of quality will be supplied, but they cannot undertake responsibility in case any animal should subsequently prove unfruitful or otherwise unsuitable for breeding purposes.
5.—In all cases of dispute in matters connected with this Scheme, the decision of the Department shall be final.

CHILD WELFARE SOCIETY. Dr. D. J. Murphy, M.O.H., wrote stating that the Youghal Child Welfare Society, was formed there some years ago had for its object the supplying of good wholesome milk to (1) Expectant mothers and (2) to young infants, who were not able to procure it themselves. He was pleased to say that up to the present the scheme, small that it was, had proved highly successful and had been the means of reducing somewhat our infantile mortality rate, and he knew personally of more than one infant whose life it had saved. It was originally worked by a committee of ladies and himself as M.O.H. Many members of the committee dropped out by degrees, so that, for some years past the work devolved on Mrs. H. Watson, Miss K. Guinan, with his assistance he could give. He felt he couldn't speak too highly of the care, attention and sympathy of both those good ladies, who did everything in their power to advance the scheme. He would strongly urge the council, in the interests of the poor of the town, to continue that Child Welfare Society, for anything of the matter that tended to diminish our infant death rate was not only of local but even of National importance. Perhaps it might add to the further success of the scheme if some members of the council might have time at their disposal to take up the work. Mrs. Watson, Miss Guinan and he would be pleased to give them all particulars as to the working of the scheme, which he had no doubt they could easily improve on. Though, indeed, it was a good many inquiries have been made and as the matter was rather a delicate one from its very nature, one naturally felt that ladies were the proper people to work it. He might add that a great factor in their success had been that they felt they could always rely on the assistance and entire sympathy of their worthy Town Clerk. After a short discussion a resolution was passed that Mr. Ken's infant death rate be referred to and the M.O.H. for their praiseworthy efforts and expressing confidence in their administration. Mr. McMahon said there was no objection on the part of anyone to the manner in which the scheme had been worked. Mr. M. Broderick, seconding Mr. Kennelly's proposition, said they all had perfect confidence in the ladies who administered the scheme with the assistance of the M.O.H. The council would leave the matter in their hands until they asked for assistance. The proposition was passed unanimously. PRICE OF GAS. On the proposition of Mr. McMahon, seconded by Mr. M. Broderick, it was unanimously decided to reduce the price of gas by 6d. per 1,000. The Clerk said that in consequence of the increased demand for the Cork County Council, the poor rate would be 6/9 in the £ as compared with 6/3 last year. There were 10 urban districts in the county, and it was remarkable that the demand for 8 had been increased, there being a decrease in Malloy and Fernoy only. The demand for Youghal was up by £88 6s. 6d. It would appear that the cause of the increase was the new system of road administration put forward by the Minister for L.G. some time ago. The estimate for the local roads was £697 16s. 1d. Chairman—We were led to believe that there would be a reduction of 1s. in the £. Instead of that relief we are called on for 7d. in the £ extra. We have already made provision for the maintenance of our roads. Mr. V. Broderick said that the 1s. reduction referred to the Rural Council. They had to meet an increase for the road services. Mr. McMahon—Considering the class of roads we are getting it is very cheap (laughter). Mr. M. Broderick said they were billed for £667 for the roads. The question was when would there be anything spent on them. Mr. Kennelly said the urban roads committee favourably with any in the Free State. The Chairman suggested the adjournment of striking the rate to enable the clerk communicate with the County Council on the matter. £667 for road maintenance and an increased rate of 6/9. ALL-IRELAND TOWN TENANTS' LEAGUE. DUNGARVAN BRANCH. RENTS BILL CONDEMNED. At a special meeting of the committee Mr. Wm. Stack, Co.C., presiding, the following resolutions proposed by Mr. John Flynn, seconded by Mr. James Daly, were passed unanimously, and ordered to be forwarded to the members of the Government, the local T.D.'s and the Press:— (1) 'That we view with alarm the awful consequences that may result from the action of the Oireachtas in promoting legislation that will help in no small measure to crush out of existence that large section of the community that is already overburdened and rack-rented, and we call on the Government to do their duty impartially in this matter, and point out to them that the tenants in the cities and towns are seeking for nothing more than legislation that formed the foundation stone for the greatest industry in the State to-day, namely, agriculture.' (2) 'That we call on all rate-payers in the country to raise their voices in protest against the infamous proposals contained in the Rents Bill, and to pledge their support to the Town Tenants' Bill that is being promoted by the All-Ireland Town Tenants' League.' Mr. John Flynn, in proposing the resolution, said if town tenants got the same concessions that the farmers got thirty years ago, their homes and business places, instead of presenting the untidy and dilapidated appearance that they do to-day under the present system of landlordism, would be a credit to the country and an incentive to visitors to come and spend their money amongst them. In going through any town it would be easy to pick out those houses that are owned by the occupying tenants, and if he was the owner of his house he would spend all his spare time in improving and beautifying them. Mr. Daly, in seconding, said the Rents Bill was a hardship in the cities and towns, and he didn't see how present conditions how the tenants were to carry on with the amount of trade depression and unemployment in the midst. The Chairman said that the Government seemed to have no conception of the conditions existing in the towns. He did not see how the tenants were going to meet their rents as they stood, and any attempt to carry out the proposals contained in the Rents Act would lead to endless confusion and serious trouble. If their representatives in the Dail had the interests of the town tenants at heart they would not let a rent-raising measure go through without making a more serious protest, and he hoped that they would make up for their neglect by giving the new Bill that is being promoted their fullest co-operation and support. Mr. Fowles, hon. sec., said the new Rents Bill was a challenge thrown out by the Government to the town tenants, and he was glad to say that the challenge was already accepted, and it was plainly evident from the large numbers that were seeking admission from every town that the tenants were preparing for the fight, and they were going to see that the fight would be carried to a successful issue. At the moment the town tenants of Ireland were having a Bill prepared that would make provision for security of tenure, etc. The present insecurity of tenure is an impediment in the progress of the town, and leads in many cases to dilapidation and loss of money. Security of tenure was given to the farmers by an alien Government as a matter of bare justice, and there was no reason why their own Government should refuse it to the town tenants now. In a short time the Town Tenants' Bill would be before the Dail, and he hoped that all cities and towns would rise up and see to it that their representatives would do their duty without fear, favour or party influences, and overthrow a measure that is autocratic in character and tyrannical in its application, and place in its stead that democratic measure that will weigh the scales evenly between landlord and tenant.

WHAT GOVERNS SIZE OF LITTERS. What influences the number of pigs a sow will farrow? The factors that are commonly thought of by hog-men, to influence the number of pigs per litter are: (1) age, (2) feeding and condition at breeding time, (3) cross-breeding, (4) the boar used, (5) type, (6) breed, and (7) individuality of the sow. Whether all these do actually influence the size of litters is a debatable question. The age of the sow has some influence on number of pigs per litter. In studies made by Rommel covering 6,148 Poland China sows, it has shown that 2,019 of these farrowing first litters averaged 6.24 pigs were litter, whereas 326 sows five years of age averaged 8.4 pigs per litter. The records of 1,163 litters and 10,555 pigs from experiment station herds indicate that the number of pigs per litter may be expected to increase up to and including the fourth, and from here on there is a decrease in numbers. Inasmuch as the number of pigs in the litter is limited to their voices in procreation, anything that tends to stimulate this secretion would seem to influence the number of pigs to be born. Practical hog-men and experimental evidence testify to the benefits of a practice known as "flushing" as an influence to increase the size of litters. The practice of "flushing" means very liberal feeding for two weeks before sows are bred and until they are safely conceived. This applies especially to sows that approach the breeding season in this condition. They should be made to gain rapidly in weight during the time stated above. Overfed sows should be made to exercise. Cross-breeding is thought by some men to increase the number of pigs per litter. If the cross-breeding is done from two breeds within a type (two last type breeds), there is no conclusive evidence that the litters will be larger. It is generally conceded that the bacon type breeds are more prolific than the lard type breeds. If, in the cross-breeding, a lard type boar is mated to bacon type sows, the litters should average as many pigs as if a bacon type boar had been used. Many men believe that the boar used has some influence on the number of pigs in a litter. In view of the known fact that the sow limits the number of pigs in a litter, it is difficult to establish conclusively that one type is any more prolific than another within the same breed. Bacon breeds are more prolific than lard breeds, although there is as great variation among individuals within a breed as among individuals in a lard breed. The individuality of the sow through her inheritance has more influence on the number of pigs per litter than any other factor. If one breed is more prolific than another it means that a higher percentage of the sows selected in that breed are more prolific animals. A herd of sows or a type within a breed are prolific or not according to their selection for or against prolific performance.—'Irish Farmer.'
