Dungarvan Urban Council

A general meeting of the above was held on Friday night last. Mr. W. O'Donnell, vice-chairman, presided.

EXPENDITURE. The payment of £22 10s. 6d. on the general account for the week was passed.

MISSING DESK. Mr. Butler asked what decision had been come to as regard the desk missing from the lower office.

Mr. Clancy—There was no action taken at the last meeting.

Mr. Butler—Refer it to Mr. Walsh now. Mr. Curran—Mr. Walsh said some papers were missing.

Mr. Walsh—I did not. I mentioned that papers were kept in the press.

Mr. Clancy—Has Mr. Casey a right to use the office?

Mr. Butler—In view of the letter sent in by Mr. Casey, Mr. Walsh should get a chance of sending in a report.

Mr. Clancy—Is Mr. Casey responsible for the office?

Mr. Butler—Mr. Walsh reported that the office was broken into.

It was decided to again refer the matter to Mr. Walsh.

Mr. Clancy—Has anything been done as regards the speed of motors through the town.

Chairman—Nobody went to the Civic Guards.

Mr. Keane—Appoint a day next week. Thursday was then decided on for a deputation to visit the Guards.

Mr. McCarthy—What about the danger notices?

The Clerk read a letter from Mr. Bowen, county surveyor, stating that the notices were on order and that they would be put up as soon as possible.

The notice at Merry's corner was referred to the Borough Surveyor.

STREETS. Mr. Clancy—We pass resolutions here time after time and nothing is done.

Mr. Hackett—O'Connell street is very bad.

Chairman—We all agree they are bad, but what is the remedy?

Borough Surveyor—I stopped the pavlov last week.

Mr. McCarthy—Why was that done?

Borough Surveyor—Because of the notices of motion to have the streets done by contract.

Mr. McCarthy—There was no order made to have any man sacked.

Borough Surveyor—I understood that the work was to be stopped on Saturday.

Chairman—There is a lot of patch-work to be done as regards the paving.

Borough Surveyor—If there is a man available he will be put to work on Monday.

Chairman—There are some big holes in Davin street.

Borough Surveyor—I will see to them. Mr. Griffin—Include Sarsfield street at Abbesside.

Borough Surveyor—I will put a few stones there and roll them in.

NO MONEY FOR TOWN'S IMPROVEMENT. Mr. Keane proposed, and Mr. Clancy seconded, that tenders be invited for the construction of paved and concrete channels in the Main street.

Mr. Griffin—All that was withdrawn when we considered the estimate.

the footpath out. Mr. Keane—We are a stupid lot anyway.

Mr. McCarthy—Begin at something anyway.

Mr. Butler—I suggest that Lord George's lane be done by direct labour.

An order was made that Lord George's lane be attended to by the Borough Surveyor.

Mr. Griffin—All this is meant for a ruse. These things were turned down at the estimates. It is unfair to do the channels and leave the footpath at Abbesside.

Mr. McCarthy—That is all nonsense.

Mr. Clancy—I have no interest in the Main street and I am the recorder of the proposition. I do not see what the ruse is.

Mr. Griffin—It is a ruse.

Mr. Clancy—It is only inquiring into the cost of paved and concrete channels. If you spend £150 on repairs you will have nothing but both work done.

A vote was taken on Mr. Keane's proposition, and it was carried by 6 votes to 1.

Messrs. Power, Griffin and the Chairman did not vote.

WATER SUPPLY. The Borough Surveyor reported that the concrete floor at the Kildangan reservoir was defective and that it should be repaired before the supply could be sent in to town.

Mr. McCarthy—What is the cause of the shortage of water.

Borough Surveyor—Glendine is supplying everywhere at present; Kildangan is shut off.

Mr. Keane—What would it cost to put the Kildangan supply in order?

Borough Surveyor—About £6.

Mr. Clancy—That is a good deal of money to spend on a supply put right.

EXCURSIONS. The Waterford County Board G.A.A. wrote asking the council to co-operate with it in requesting the Railway Co. to run excursion trains on Sundays during the summer months.

The Clerk was instructed to write to the Railway Co.

ABBEYSIDE HOUSES. Mr. Foley appeared before the meeting and said that Mr. Stokes and he had signed an agreement by which his plot would have the necessary area for the building of the new houses.

After a discussion Mr. Butler proposed, and Mr. Keane seconded, that five houses in one block be agreed on Mr. Foley's plot if Mr. Williams consent that the transfer of Stokes' plot to Mr. Foley will be perfected in the next future.

The proposition was passed unanimously.

WEIGH-HOUSE. Ed. McGrath tendered for the weigh-house at £27 10s.

The tender was accepted.

Youghal District Court.

Before Mr. G. P. Farrell, B.L. Sergt. Corrigan charged Richard Ahern with cycling on the footpath in the neighbourhood of the town. Fined 5s. and costs.

Guard Downes charged Wm. Meade, Greenocloyne, with being drunk and disorderly on the Strand.

Evidence having been given to the effect that he entered Mr. Hure's premises and used filthy language.

Defendant said he didn't remember anything about it. He had a drop of drink taken.

The Justice said were it not that he would lose his employment he would send defendant to jail without the option of a fine. If he came before the court again he would certainly go to jail.

He was fined 40s. and costs.

Mr. Thos. Drohan, Inspector of Fisheries, charged D. Burke, M. Geary, J. Yelley and P. Humphrey, with a breach of the licensing laws.

There being no appearance, the case was marked "withdrawn."

MUNSTER CHAMPIONSHIPS—JUNIOR FOOTBALL.

Waterford met Cork in re-play at the Sports Field, Coppersal, on Sunday evening. This was the first inter-county Championship held locally, and the event proved an unqualified success although the clerk of the weather was in rather dull humour, the evening being a bit foggy and hazy.

The field was in splendid form and all the arrangements reflected great credit on the local committee, who evidently spared no pains to have everything in apple-pie order.

There was a big crowd of spectators and the proceedings were watched by the North Abbey and Pipers' Bands.

The match of the evening was prefaced by a challenge hurling match between Youghal Selected and Dungarvan, the chief towns of East Cork and West Waterford.

This was a fast and exciting game, which stirred up the interest of the spectators in preparation for the principal item, Youghal winning by a narrow margin.

DUNGARVAN v. YOUGHAL SELECTED.

The teams were played on to the pitch by the Youghal Pipers' Band. Youghal winning the toss elected to play with a slight incline in their favour.

Youghal broke away from the start, but play was returned to midfield. After some brisk hurling on both sides Youghal notched their first score—a goal.

There was a good deal of give and take play, the ball travelling from end to end of the field. Youghal began to press and Dungarvan had to concede a seventy, but the visitors cleared well up the field.

The ball was again returned to Dungarvan territory where the homesters secured a second goal. A Dungarvan man was injured at this stage and had to be replaced.

Both teams settled down to play, and Dungarvan forcing the pace, lowered the home net. Before the interval came each side added a point, the score then being:

YOUGHAL—3 goals 1 point. DUNGARVAN—1 goal 1 point.

On resumption of play the hurling on both sides became fast and clean and continued in a lively fashion all Youghal raised the green flag. Soon after they secured a minor. Dungarvan were now getting more of the play and kept Youghal on the defensive for some time.

Keeping the pressure on, Dungarvan raised the green flag. This encouraged the visitors, who continued to play with great gusto, but could not get through the Youghal defence. When the full whistle went the score stood:

YOUGHAL—3 goals 2 points. DUNGARVAN—3 goals 1 point.

COFK v. WATERFORD

The teams were played on to the pitch by the North Abbey Band at 4 p.m. to the minute, quite a record locally. Cork won the toss, playing with a slight incline, the light wind across the field being negligible.

Waterford took possession, but lost quickly, and play centred mainly round the Waterford posts, ending in a foul for Waterford.

Play was transferred to midfield for some time. A short shower here set in, but it soon cleared off again. A 60 for Waterford ended in their drawing first blood with a major. About this time fouls seemed to be the order of the day.

Waterford was having the best of the play so far, keeping up the pressure in good style. Ultimately Cork recovered somewhat, but Waterford replied, Cork saving a sure score by conceding a 50.

Cork put on the pace again, but Waterford saved well after a tough tussle. Here a Cork man was knocked out, having to leave the field. When his place was filled Cork cleared well up the field, but their opponents put on forced pressure till relief came with a foul. At half-time the score still stood:

WATERFORD—1 goal. COFK—NIL.

On the change over Waterford got away and scored a flying goal immediately, followed in a twinkling by another. Play was soon after interrupted by a Cork man getting injured and having to leave the field. Resuming Waterford got on the offensive again, but Cork replied and made a charge on the Waterford posts, but the Waterford custodian saved in style, getting hurt in his efforts and having to withdraw.

After a bout of neutral play, Cork made a determined effort to score, but were unlucky. They kept up the pressure and secured a free, which ended in their first score, a goal. Resuming, Cork kept up the attack and several overs resulted, ending in a free for them nothing coming of it.

Waterford now got hold and rushed down, Cork saving by conceding a 50. After some nice play a free close to Cork posts resulted in a point. Cork replied quickly with a similar score. In the ensuing play two Waterford men got hurt, but they soon recovered. A foul for Cork in midfield was followed by some fine play, Cork conceding a fifty, which went over. From the kick Cork transferred to Waterford territory, ending in an over.

After some tough play Cork scored a point. Play now waxed fast and furious, and a free for Cork was fruitless. Waterford rushed, but Cork defended well and replied and cleared up the field. Approaching the close both sides put forth their best, the one to increase their lead and the other to retrieve their position, but to no avail, the closing score being:

WATERFORD—3 goals 1 point. COFK—1 goal 2 points.

DUNGARVAN ELECTRIC LIGHT CO., LTD.

ANNUAL MEETING OF SHAREHOLDERS.

The annual meeting of the directors and shareholders of the Dungarvan Electric Light Co. was held at the Power House, Dungarvan, on Friday week last. There was a good attendance, and those present included—Messrs. Thos. Power, Chairman of the Company; Thos. Foley and M. Clancy, directors; and the shareholders were—Messrs. T. McCarthy, J. Dunphy, M. Cronin, John Crotty, John J. Crotty, M. Walsh, W. Miller, C. Martin, Percy Casey and John Phelan. Mr. Moloney, manager, was also present.

There was £294 appropriated from last year's account, leaving a balance of £55 18s. 8d. This was also appropriated. The dividend on debentures were fully paid, and the business showed an increased revenue from consumers.

Mr. Thos. Power, Chairman of the Company, presided. He moved the adoption of the report and statement of accounts, and said—As the statement of accounts and balance sheet submitted by your auditors for last year ending 30th September, 1925, have already been circulated, I assume we may take them as read, and I accordingly move their adoption. I assume you will regard them as fairly satisfactory, showing as they do an increase in consumers, and also a substantial reduction on the bank overdraft, which has been reduced from £1,000 to £600, and after making full allowance for depreciation on the plant and equipment, the profit at the board's disposal is £263 3s. 9d. From this a sum of £264 5s. 1d. has been appropriated in reduction of the formation charges standing in the balance sheet in accordance with the resolution passed unanimously at the general meeting held 29th June, 1925. He also referred to the fine suit shown by his co-directors at the time when they found the concern was not fully capitalised. They came forward and contributed £1,200, and this was in addition to £900 they had already invested in the company. This amount had been successful in tiding them over their financial difficulties. He then complimented his brother-directors for their attendance and loyal support during the year, and he also paid a tribute to the employees of the company. Weekly meetings were being held and these were well attended, and the directors had shown great interest in the concern. And this was most meritorious, considering that their services were freely given without fee or reward to the shareholders (hear, hear).

Mr. Cronin referred to the fact that the shareholders had not yet been paid a dividend, and said that he thought they all should have their meters free of rent.

Mr. Clancy said that that could not be done.

The Chairman ruled the matter out of order. He did not think it would be in keeping with the regulations, but the matter could be brought before the meeting of the directors and discussed by them.

The directors retiring by rotation were Mr. Thomas Foley and James Dunne.

Mr. T. Foley seconded the Chairman's motion regarding the adoption of the report, and the motion was unanimously carried.

Mr. Clancy moved the re-election of the retiring directors. Mr. T. Foley seconded, and the motion was adopted.

It was then proposed by Mr. Clancy, and seconded by Mr. Cronin, that an additional director be elected, and he proposed Mr. John Crotty.

The resolution was unanimously passed. Mr. Foley then proposed that the auditors, Messrs. McGuinness and Co., of Cork, be re-appointed for the year.

Mr. Cronin seconded the proposition, which was passed unanimously.
