RATES ADVISORY COMMITTEE

THE EVIDENCE.

A sitting of the Rates Advisory Committee was held in the Town Hall, Dun garvan, on Friday last to consider the apation of the Urban Council to the Ministry of Trade and Commerce for an increase in the import and export dues at the port of Dungarvan and to hear the objections to same propounded by the local shipowners and merchants.

Mr. D. J. O'Brien, K.C., ex-County Court Judge, presided. The following members of the committee attended-Memrs. J. Mangan, John Kerr, L. J. Duffy, Senator Joseph O'Connor, with Mr. John O'Brien, secretary, and Mr. Baxter, representing the Ministry of Trade.

Hitherto the dues charged at Dungarvan port were 3d. per ton, but in some cases the rate is less. The proposed dues are-Coal, 4ld. per ton; flour, 7ld. per ton; manure, 74d. per ton; oats, 44d. per ton; Indian meal, 9d. per ton. EVIDENCE OF MR. McGRATH, B.S. In reply to Mr. Connolly, B.L., Mr. John McGrath, Borough Surveyor, produced a map of the port and harbour of Dungarvan showing its limits. He said about 200 feet of the quay wall. It was very essential work as the quay was falling in owing to a bad foundation of sand. A grant from the Department of £1,000 Harbour Board had to procure the money. It is necessary that further work is re-quired to be done amounting to 21,200. He handed in a statement showing the repairs required. There are other parts of the quay defective which required

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


