YOUGHAL GAZEL IN NEW YORK

Technical Training

ADDRESS BY MINISTER OF EDUCATION

At the first sitting of the Commission recently set up to inquire into and advise upon the system of Technical Education in Saorstát Eireann in relation to the requirements of trade and industry, Professor O'Sullivan, Minister of Education, presided. The Commission was composed practically of experts from different points of view, and they would be able to shed light on the different problems from different angles. The various interests were represented from the technical point of view, and they would also have the advice and guidance of two of the foremost experts in Technical Education in Europe, namely, Mr. Nils Frederiksson and Dr. A. Rohm.

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Ardmore District Court

Before Mr. R. J. Neill, B.L. Serjt. Sexton charged Mrs. Elizabeth Downing, Fair View, Waterford, with motor car on a road.

Complainant deposed that the defendant covered a measured furlong in 13 1/2 seconds, equal to 33 1/2 miles an hour.

Defendant said she was going up a hill and she put on the accelerator.

Replying to the Court complainant said the offence occurred on the road near the Young's Bridge.

Defendant was fined 1s. and 6s. costs. The same complainant charged J. Brennan, Ballinacorney road, Cork, with a like offence.

He deposed that defendant covered the measured furlong in 14 seconds, equal to 32 1/2 miles per hour.

Defendant admitted the offence. A similar fine was imposed.

Serjt. Aston, Clashmore, charged John Barron, Ballysheeny with using an unlighted bicycle at 9.30 p.m. on the 3rd inst.

Complainant deposed that he called on the defendant to halt, but he only put on more speed and rode away. Witness went to his house, but he had evidently been told that witness was after him, for he was not there, and he subsequently returned by another route.

The offence was not serious as regards the light, but the defendant didn't want to repeat any law or order. He was inclined to dare the Guards more than anything else.

Defendant, who did not appear, was fined 12s. costs.

In a series of rather serious assault and cross-cases between two brothers named Conway from the adjoining neighbourhood regarding the possession of a farm, the Clerk of the Court said that letters had been received from Messrs. W. R. Hodson, solicitor, Youghal, and E. E. Ryan, solicitor, Dungarvan, who were engaged in the case.

One of the brothers, who was in court, advised that the case was transferred to the Circuit Court in Dungarvan.

Justice—Your solicitor is asking for an adjournment.

Conway said his brother was put out of the place and that court could not settle the case.

Both cases were adjourned to next court day.

A number of civil bills and other cases were adjourned in the absence of the solicitors engaged.

DEATH OF MR. M. F. LYNCH, M.C.Y.B., DUNGARVAN.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Maurice F. Lynch, V.S., which occurred at his residence, Abbeyview, Dungarvan, on Saturday last.

He had been in rather poor health for some time past, and his end came calmly and peacefully, fortified by the rites of Holy Church.

The late Mr. Lynch belonged to a most respected local family and was son of the late Mr. J. Lynch, proprietor of the Devishine Arms Hotel. After a brilliant college career at the Royal Veterinary College, Edinburgh, he was admitted a member of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, and from that start by his professional skill and close application to duty, built up a large and lucrative practice.

By the County Council he was appointed Veterinary Inspector under the Diseases of Animals Act for Dungarvan and Youghal No. 3 Rural District, and in the discharge of the onerous duties of his office he gave perfect satisfaction to everybody. A sound, practical man with a varied experience in his profession, he was immensely popular with the farming community, to whom his services were given in a truly generous manner.

By his professional brethren he was highly esteemed as well as by everybody with whom he came in contact.

In his younger days he was a well-known sportsman, while as a recollect of merit his services were cheerfully given for all charitable purposes. His death at the age of 37 years is much deplored, and his family and relatives have sincere sympathy in their loss. R.I.P.

On Monday the funeral took place to the Parish Church, Dungarvan, where the last prayers having been recited, the interment took place in the family burial ground. The attendance at the funeral was large and fully representative of the professional, business and farming community, who came to pay their last tribute of respect to the memory of a worthy citizen.

DEATH OF MRS. CATHERINE HALE, LISMORE.

On Saturday morning last at her late residence, Commercial Hotel, South Mall, Lismore, the death took place fully fortified by the rites of Holy Church of Mrs. Catherine Hale, much to the regret of her relatives and friends.

She was the wife of the late Mr. Patrick Hale, butter buyer, and came from a family closely identified with the business interests of the town for 40 years or so.

She was sister of Misses E. and A. O'Donnell, Main Street, and was a charming personality, who had made many friends throughout Munster. Like her deceased husband, she was most popular, and after his demise attended the various better markets in Cork and Waterford, where her courteous and affable disposition, besides being the possessor of a generous heart, won for her the esteem and goodwill of all sections. For the past few years, however, deceased concentrated all her attention to the hotel which she established in the South Mall, and she gave attention to business made the Commercial Hotel second to none in Munster.

She had great business sense, hospitable and open-hearted, and any cause found her with purse strings open ready to support, and she was a good living and upright Christian, besides being the possessor of a generous heart, won for her the esteem and goodwill of all sections.

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CAPPOQUIN TOWN PARK AND ATHLETIC CLUB.

Our Cappoquin Correspondent writes:—At the special meeting of the Guardians of the above held in Cappoquin about six weeks ago the Chairman, Mr. T. E. Ehrill, referred to the disgraceful propaganda being carried on in order to injure the successful working of the Sportsfield and also with the view of holding the Directors up to public odium and contempt for simply carrying out the duties for which they had been appointed, viz. the holding of as many hurling and football matches as they could organize for the benefit of the town.

It was well known at the time, and publicly stated at that meeting by Mr. James Downey, that the Directors had been carried to the extent of having blocked the hurling and football matches fixed for the Sportsfield on Sunday, September 5th. Had as this was, however, what can be thought of the attempt to block the football match held for last Sunday between Dungarvan and Cappoquin, and the hurling match between the Dungarvan and Cappoquin Seniors and Aghis, Seniors for the valuable set of medals offered by Mr. Sean Downey, Gaelic League teacher. The Directors of the Town Park and Athletic Club had nothing whatever to do with this match beyond giving Mr. Downey all the assistance in their power to make the event a success and thereby give a much-needed impetus to the business of the town, yet an anonymous letter was sent to the Dungarvan team on last Friday attempting to prevent them from carrying out their promise to Mr. Downey by warning them that the Aghis' men were determined to actually "do for them" if they dared to travel to Cappoquin on last Sunday. The Gaelic League of Dungarvan treated such a production with the contempt which it deserved, and travelled like genuine sportsmen to fulfil their engagement. The letter was further a foul libel on the Aghis footballers, who are amongst the best and most sporting Gaelic in the county. No doubt it was considered a very ingenious piece of business on the part of the anonymous writer to disguise his hand and have the letter posted in Youghal on last Thursday, 28th September, so that it would reach Dungarvan on Friday.

The following is a copy of the letter:—"Hon. Sec. Dungarvan Football Club, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford. Dear Sir:—With regard to your match with Aghis on Sunday next you would want to be very careful as they want to be at you at any cost and will get a chance to do so on the field so if you have a good advice from a friend who do not wish to have a name come out in the matter you would not give them the chance and if you are not well prepared let this old match drop as they will not give you the chance to beat them as they want to knock out the Co. champions.

Be sure and put this letter before your Club and if you think over the matter you will say to yourself that there is a danger in it—I remain, yours truly—A friend. I am giving the tip straight."

The above should act as a warning to all other Clubs not to take any notice in future of any communications received, signed or unsigned, unless they bear the genuine stamp and signature of "Mr. M. Walsh, Hon. Sec., Cappoquin, Town Park and Athletic Club," all the Directors of which are deeply grateful to the Dungarvan Gaelic for their plucky action in the matter, as well as for the programme in hand over the original letter to them for the purpose of publication.

YOUGHAL SPRAT FISHING.

At a meeting of the local branch of the Irish Fishermen's Association held in the Town Hall on Wednesday night, Capt. P. Donaghy, B.L., stated that the sprat fishing continued very satisfactory, 3,000 barrels of cured fish having been dispatched during the month, and 800 men and 80 women at work in the stores. The river and bay were plentifully stocked with fish.

The following letter was received from the Department of Fisheries—"A Chair:—With reference to your communication of the 14th inst. addressed to Mr. J. P. Burke, Fisheries Superintendent, and by him forwarded to this Department, I am directed by the Minister for Fisheries to state that he regrets it would not be possible for this Department to undertake the removal of the wreckage which is stated to constitute an obstruction to some net fishing at the spot known as the "Green Hole" Youghal. If, however, the Youghal Harbour Commissioners could arrange a satisfactory contract for the clearance of the said obstruction, the Minister would be prepared to recommend a contribution from public funds of one moiety not exceeding £100 of the total cost of such work.—Miss Jones—J. C. Moriarty, Rensdale."

In a further letter on the same subject the Minister expressed his appreciation of the useful work done by your committee in connection with the promotion of sprat fishing and also the satisfaction at the results which have attended their efforts. He trusts that this success may lead the committee to extend their sphere of operations to other branches of the fishing industry at Youghal.

The Hon. Sec. was directed to suggest to the Harbour Board that the clearing of the obstruction complained of be left over till the summer, and that the Board in the meantime make provision to proceed with the work and await the assistance offered by the Ministry of Fisheries.

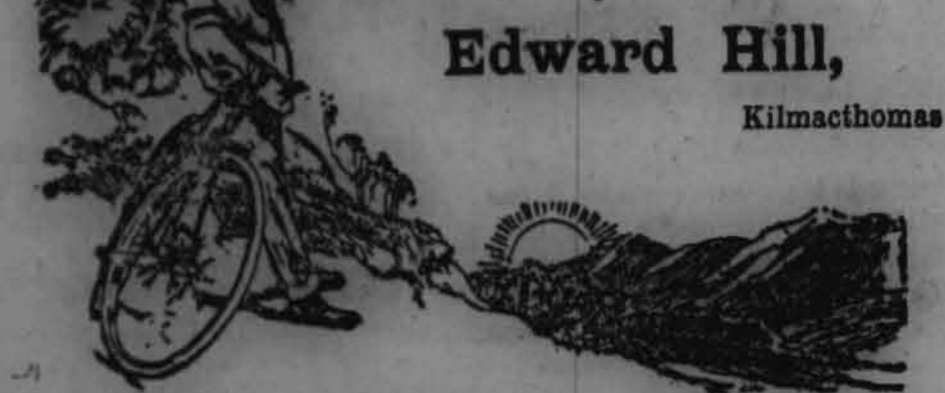

Both the football and hurling teams will consist every inch of the ground, and the finals of 1926 should not be missed. First match at 2.30 p.m.

Golf Ball.—The annual Golf Ball under the auspices of the Dungarvan Golf Club, was held in the Town Hall on Wednesday night and was highly successful. The hall, which has been newly painted and redecorated, looked extra gay when the decorations were completed all round, and the committee in charge left nothing undone to enter for the general enjoyment. A Ladies' Committee was in charge of the catering arrangements, which were most highly satisfactory. Mr. W. A. Mahan's famous band (personally conducted) supplied the music, and its sweet melodies and dancing was enjoyed by the large assembly until darkness faded into the grey dawn.

Sympathy.—At a meeting of the Finance Committee of the County Council on Tuesday, Mr. N. Fitzgerald presiding, a resolution of sympathy was passed with Mr. Denis Ward, Co. C., Kilgobbin, Clonsilla, on the death of his son, and with the family of the late Mr. M. F. Lynch, V.S., for long an official of the council, after which the meeting adjourned.

News for Baggins.—For some time past there has been dissatisfaction with the railway arrangements from Dungarvan, Cappagh and Cappoquin to Ballyvaughan, especially on the return journey. The special train leaving Malloy at 6.10 p.m. did not run beyond Lismore, which meant that those travelling farther down the line had to wait the Express to go home. Through the instrumentality of Mr. F. Walsh, Cappoquin, this grievance has now been remedied, and Col. McCabe, Managing Director of the Race Co., has arranged with the Railway Co. that for all future meetings, including that of Wednesday and Thursday next, the 6.10 p.m. train from Malloy to Lismore will be extended to Cappoquin and Dungarvan.

Lighting of Cappoquin.—As tenders will be taken by the County Board of Health on Tuesday next for the lighting of the town lamps in Cappoquin, and on the same day tenders will be considered for the position of caretaker of the Cappoquin waterworks for the coming year, and as neither the lamp-lighter nor the caretaker of the waterworks has a full time job, it would be a good idea to have both positions amalgamated, as the two contracts could easily be carried out by one man.

It is expected that every tenant will attend.

LISMORE TOWN COMMISSIONERS.

CONDITION OF THE STREETS.

Mr. Thos. Crotty, chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the above. Also present—Messrs. E. A. Murphy, P.C.; T. E. O'Shea, Co. C.; John C. Heelan, T. Dugan, David L. Noonan and John Keys.

THE ROSE.

The Town Clerk said he had the hose cleaned and suggested that the members should now have it brought out and tested and put on the hydrants. It would require still to be oiled and cleaned with warm water.

Mr. O'Shea said the hydrants about town also should be inspected.

Clerk—This hose may not be seaworthy, and it's better have a test, and the Commissioners can see where they are and what length or lengths they may require. One thing is that this hose is not long enough to reach half-way between two hydrants.

The Clerk read the reply received from the Ministry of Justice signed T. A. Finlay in reference to the resolution of the Commissioners passed calling attention to the necessity there existed for a courthouse in the district, and the latter stated it was a matter for the Waterford County Council.

Mr. O'Shea explained what the County Council had done in the matter, and the agent for the Duke offered them the site of the old courthouse for 4000 (laughter). A good many of the ratepayers were kicking about the rates, and what were they to do.

Mr. Heelan said the courthouse was a necessity and a great loss to the town, and even the District Justice himself wants a courthouse in the town.

Messrs. Heelan and Murphy suggested writing the County Council on the subject. The matter dropped eventually.

LISMORE RATE LOWEST IN IRELAND.

Mr. Heelan asked the Clerk how the Lismore rate compared with other towns of its size.

Town Clerk—You have no rate as small as yours—1s. 4d. in the £. The next is in Ireland is 1s. 6d.

Mr. Heelan—I am very glad to hear that, as dissatisfaction was expressed in some quarters at the extra 4d. in the £.

PETROL.

Correspondence received in connection with the storage of petroleum was again read and adjourned to next meeting.

THE STREETS.

Mr. Murphy complained of the manner in which the streets of Lismore were kept by the Waterford County Council.

Mr. O'Shea—The trouble is the Main street is not a main road.

Mr. Heelan—The streets and by-lanes in Dungarvan are tarred and our streets are neglected.

Mr. O'Shea—The Main street is not a main road, but up the hill outside it, and that is the trouble.

Mr. Heelan asked what about the street from the convent to the Christian Bros' Schools.

Clerk—If rolling will be done next year the streets are included for tarring.

Mr. Heelan—We have plenty of dust all the year in the Main street, and I understand that between the Convent and Christian Brothers' Schools, which embraced the Main street, would be rolled and tarred. At the moment a window cannot be opened with dust, and damage is caused to the extent of £100 to some business people. Then again it is not a healthy and was against all hygienic rules the swallowing of this dust, and the exclusion of air. One of their first duties to his mind was to look after the health of the people and protect the citizens, and it mattered very little the amount of dust that blew from Kibree to Cappoquin or elsewhere on main roads, but the road between the two schools, which was a main street, he understood was to be done.

Mr. Murphy asked was the Main street on the proposal list passed for next year's work.

Mr. O'Shea was understood to reply in the affirmative, stating macadam tar was to be used.

Mr. Murphy—Is there a proposal on the County Council minutes to that effect is what I want to know.

Mr. O'Shea—The roads around here are all very good, and if you saw the east of the county.

A large and practical farmer, the deceased was one of the most prominent gentlemen in the public and national life of South Tipperary for many years, and was father of our esteemed and popular curate, Rev. L. Egan, who in his bereavement has the deep sympathy of the parishioners of Dungarvan and his numerous friends throughout the diocese.

Another son of the deceased was the late James Egan, the well-known footballer of the Grangemockler team of a few years ago.

On Wednesday evening the remains were removed from his late residence to the Parish Church, Grangemockler, and were followed by a very imposing cortege drawn from all parts of the surrounding country. On Thursday morning there was a Solemn Requiem Office and High Mass at Grangemockler for the repose of his soul, after which the interment took place. The celebrant of the Mass was Rev. L. Egan, C.C. (son of deceased). There were 45 priests in attendance. A big representation from Dungarvan attended the funeral on Wednesday and also on Thursday. R.I.P.

EVICTED TENANTS' MEETING IN DUNGARVAN.

A general meeting of the evicted tenants County Waterford Branch was held in the Town Hall, Dungarvan, on Sunday, 26th September. The following members were in attendance—Messrs. W. Gamble, T. Hickey, W. Navin, P. Geary, J. Flynn, P. Moloney, E. Fitzgerald, J. Kelly, P. Conroy, M. Broderick, T. Morrissey, Piers Elliott, T. Power, etc. Mr. Wm. Gamble and subsequently Mr. Wm. Navin presided.

In the transaction of the private business of the branch, Mr. Thos. Hickey was appointed treasurer, and said he would be in punctual attendance at all meetings. Arising out of a visit of an Inspector from the I.L.O., a series of resolutions were drafted, passed and ordered to be typed and forwarded. The private transactions were ordered to be kept unpublished until requested to the contrary. Mr. Wm. Gamble said this meeting, which is most representative, was intended as a trumpet call to evicted tenants to organize at once in their own interests. Obviously the districts all around Dungarvan are already well organized, but on the 20 miles journey I have travelled here today there are numerous vast tracts of evicted farms. "Evicted after evicted, farm in prolonged array, where the poor wounded soldiers lie in peace full many a day." Until the advent of the great agricultural depression, when the obnoxious cloak of the evictions crowd brutally shattered their Godly peace and harmony, and cast thousands of families to the four winds of heaven. All this vast country is unorganized and presents an inviting hunting ground for those afflicted with grabbing tendencies. This branch is the County Waterford Branch, and its domain should extend from the bounds of Cork to the coast of the Suir, and we should cater to the best of our ability for evicted tenants so circumstanced as those. Mr. Wm. Navin having taken the chair said—Nothing gives me such pleasure, as to see the evicted tenants' flag flying independently. I beg to tender the grateful thanks of the branch to everybody who forwards the interests of the evicted tenants, and especially to one who has made sacrifices to do so. We must keep the flag flying and we must cater for those isolated evicted tenants referred to by Mr. Gamble as we have done recently with successful results. It was the interloping grabber that created the land war, and "like begets like," we must keep our entries posted with the watchword—ever ready. "Organize against the depredations of the worst form of land pestilence—the grabber" (hear, hear).

Mr. Thos. Hickey said—This meeting is a most satisfactory and representative one. The visit of an Inspector was evidence that we have made our existence felt by the Ministry. We should add to our reputation so as to win respect and thereby acquire benefits. We must spread our organization and demonstrate ourselves in a strong, fearless public manner, especially in the coming important future. In closing the meeting, the Chairman said he was instructed to announce that pending any undertaking or arrangements another meeting be held on October 24th. (Communicated).
