Lismore Game Case.

WILL IT BE A TEST ONE?

IMPORTANT TO TENANTS PURCHASING.

At Lismore District Court, before Mr. G. P. Farrell, B.L., D.J.,

An interesting game prosecution was disposed of. It was at the suit of the Most Noble Victor Christian William, the 9th Duke of Devonshire, Chatsworth, Derbyshire, against Mr. Cyril P. Hayes, V.R., South Mall, Lismore; Mr. Edward Farmer, do., and Mr. Joseph Sullivan, do. All defendants were charged in two summonses in respect of the dates 4th and 6th November.

The summons was as follows:—That at Ballinacorney and Islands the said defendant did not being authorised by the Ballinacorney and Islands Act, 1923, the property of the said complainant, there to look for and shoot game, to wit duck, provided with gun and dogs, contrary to statutes on that behalf.

Mr. A. Carroll, solicitor, Fermoy, appeared for complainant, and Mr. M. J. Speers, solicitor, Dungarvan, represented the three defendants.

Mr. Speers said they had three defendants with two summonses against each and would they take all together.

Mr. Carroll—One decision will rule the lot.

Mr. Speers—Thank you.

Mr. Carroll, reading the summons, said he would ask to have the word "wild" inserted before "duck" as it was a mistake in the typewriting of the summons from his office. Wild duck was meant.

Mr. Speers had no objection.

Patrick Dooley said he was gamekeeper in the employment of the Duke, and on the 4th November was on the south side of the river. It was between 4 and 5 p.m., and he crossed the river in his boat on to the lands in question. He met Mr. Sullivan, Mr. Hayes and Mr. Farmer there; they were the three defendants. Each man had a gun and Joseph Sullivan had a wild drake and wild duck. Witness said "good evening" and asked had they a permit. Mr. Hayes said "yes," and witness asked if it were in writing that he would like to see it. Mr. Hayes said it was behind at his house. He lived in the South Mall in the town, which was about 1 1/2 miles distant. Witness was in the act of saying had he the permit when Mr. Hayes replied: "Tell Becher from me he can do his damn best, and if he could do it he would be referring to last year. Mr. Hayes then said, "Faddy Hayes caught me and another gentleman and he told Paddy Hayes he would take full responsibility." He also said Mr. Becher wrote to him and that he gave him the same damn answer as he gave witness, and that Mr. Becher was a gentleman.

Mr. Speers objected.

Continuing, witness stated defendant said duck aren't game, and he only wished that there were big game there. He also said he had invitations from several to shoot where there is big game, but the worst of it was he had no time to go. The three defendants shot after witness's interview.

Mr. Speers—How did you know they shot after that?

Witness—I saw them shoot after that. Mr. Edmund Waldo Becher stated he was spent to the Duke at Lismore and knew the lands of Ballinacorney and Islands. The Fair Rent Order dated 21st January, 1910, he now produced.

Mr. Speers—When is the statutory term commenced in that Order?

Mr. Carroll—The 29th September, 1909. Continuing, Mr. Carroll said—that is my case as regards that date, and the 4th November will regulate the 5th.

Mr. Speers said the prosecutions in the three cases contemplate a right to exercise the sporting rights over the lands, and his (Mr. Speers) submission was that since the passing of the Land Act, 1923, the relationship between tenant and landlord as regards sporting rights came to an end. As an instance, continued Mr. Speers, the landlord ceased to have rights paid him by the tenant, or arrears of rent, or interest in lieu of rent, and that he could not distrain or proceed to dispossess any tenant. He referred to Sections 18 to 20 inclusive to show how completely the rights of the landlord were wiped out. (3) That it was laid down in *Lynan v. Butler* (1925) L. R., page 92, 231, that as from the date of the passing of the Land Act, 1923, the tenant held not on the terms of his former tenancy, but under the provisions of the Act subject to the conditions therein, that one of the terms of his former tenancy was that

AN OLD ACCOUNT.

Messrs. K. Williams and Co., Ltd., wrote—We beg to enclose our account for coal supplied to the Urban District Council which is now overdue and for which we expect you will pass a cheque at this meeting. We may mention that this coal was supplied principally for the quay work and steamrolling for which you got a public grant and out of which public grant we venture to say this account should have been paid. The amount of the account was £82 2s. 1/2d.

Mr. Craig—Why was not this account paid by weekly payments?

Clerk—All the members know that there was not sufficient money.

Mr. Craig—Why was it not paid before the grant was expended?

The Clerk was directed to make a payment on account.

REPAIRS.

Mr. John Henly wrote re repairs to the lavatory of his house at Mitchell street. The matter was referred to the S.S.O.

A letter was read from Mrs. Burke, Thomas's Terrace, asking for repairs to her house. It was decided to carry out the repairs.

TENDERS FOR CART.

The following tenders were received for a cart for the scavenger—Lee, Grange, 47 10s.; James Clancy, 47; James Kieley, 45 18s. Kieley's tender was accepted.

ST. GARVAN'S TERRACE.

The Chairman asked the Borough Surveyor if he knew anything of complaints regarding some of the floors and ranges in the above terrace?

Borough Surveyor—Some of the floors which were floated instead of being strowed were coming up. Some of those are now done, and all will be done before the final certificate is given.

Chairman—I think it would be as well to have a look at the floors. I am informed that some of them won't hold three months with damp.

Borough Surveyor—I think that must be an exaggeration. Some of those floors are well over the ground.

Mr. O'Mahoney—This contractor had to go by the specification.

Chairman—You all know the difficulties we are having here on other schemes, and I would ask the Borough Surveyor to see that everything was all right before granting the final certificate in this scheme.

POLEY'S PLOT.

Mr. Griffin raised the question of having a sewer provided for the houses built on Poley's plot.

After some discussion the matter was adjourned for the production of specifications at next meeting.

PATRICK STREET CHANNEL.

The Chairman asked the Borough Surveyor if anything was yet done to the Channel at Patrick street.

Borough Surveyor—I was thinking of asking permission to run a pipe there and have no channel.

The matter was referred to the S.S.O. and Borough Surveyor.

LIGHT AT FRIARY STREET.

The Chairman called attention to the light at the top of Friary street, which was not showing sufficient light down there.

Borough Surveyor—I will ask the electric light manager to have the bracket shifted a little; that will settle it.

Mr. McGrath proposed, and Mr. Craig seconded, the following—That we request the shopkeepers of Dungarvan to close all business houses on Monday, December 27th, as St. Stephen's Day falls on Sunday.

PUBLIC MEMORIAL TO BE ERECTED IN CAPPOQUIN.

A public meeting was held in the Post-office Hall, Cappoquin, on Friday, 10th inst., to take the necessary steps to inaugurate the movement for the erection of a public memorial in the town to perpetuate the memory of the late Col. R. H. Keane, the first anniversary of whose death was so impressively celebrated in Cappoquin a fortnight ago.

Amongst those present were the Ven. Archdeacon Burkill, M.A.; Very Rev. P. Meskill, Adm.; Rev. J. Crotty, C.C.; S. J. Power, Afany; Wm. Baldwin, Camphire; J. V. Conway, Cappoquin; M. J. Sargent, do.; M. F. Walsh, Poley-Walsh, Feick, Cahill, esq.; Head Constable; P. G. Mansfield, Manager Bacon Factory; Jas. Lincoln, do.; T. E. Ehrill, B.A.; R. Bell, Manager Cappoquin Estate; James Russell, F. X. O'Leary, N.T.; John McCarthy, E. Casey, Droimne; G. P. Hely, chemist; John A. Walsh, J. J. Meade, Jas. Donovan, Rd. Mason, senr.; Jack Wall, Dungarvan; J. E. Crowe, Jas. Crotty, Pat. Geary, Ed. Glasse, J. F. Ryan, esq.

On the motion of the Rev. Fr. Meskill, seconded by Mr. M. F. Walsh, the Ven. Archdeacon Burkill was moved to the chair amidst applause.

The Rev. Chairman, having suitably returned thanks for the honour conferred on him by asking him to preside over this important meeting, said that everyone who knew anything about Cappoquin would agree that the people of this town would be wanting in their duty if they did not do something practical to perpetuate the memory of the late Col. R. H. Keane, who had done so much for the town during the all-too-short period he was spent amongst all of them in return. In his younger days he (Chairman) had always regarded the deceased more or less as a son, and he, in turn, regarded him as a father, and although in later years they drifted somewhat apart in respects, still the same warm bonds of love and affection continued to bind them together down to the moment of his sad and tragic death a year ago. The people of Cappoquin could never forget the many rare and sterling qualities of the deceased, as his generosity, his Christianity, his true-heartedness and his gentlemanly conduct towards all were outstanding traits of a character that was without compare amongst them. The warm-hearted, true, noble and generous Col. Keane had left behind him a memory which would be revered and respected for all time, and it was only fitting that his many dear friends in Cappoquin should come assembled to take the necessary steps to perpetuate his memory in the town which he had always loved so well.

The Chairman then suggested that the first thing to do would be to form a committee to carry out all the arrangements in connection with the project, and after a brief discussion all present were elected as a general committee on the motion of Father Meskill, seconded by Fr. Crotty.

Mr. Conway said that certain gentlemen who were interested in the project were unavoidably absent from the meeting, he begged to propose that the names of Messrs. John Villiers-Stuart, Droimne, and James Kent, Mogeely, be added to the general committee, and this was agreed to.

Mr. M. F. Walsh proposed that the names of Messrs. Jas. Hallahan, Aghish; Wm. O'Keefe, Tallow, and Michael O'Brien, Grallagh, be also added, and Mr. Pat. Walsh proposed that Messrs. Jas. Hayes, Dungarvan; Dick Fitzgerald, Piltown, and Michael Barrett, Youghal, be also included, and all those names were then added to the committee.

The Chairman then suggested that a small Executive Committee, comprising about seven members, should be elected to carry out all the details of the project, as he felt that a small committee of real working members would be more effective than a large, cumbersome committee.

This having been agreed to, the following were then elected on the Executive Committee:—Ven. Archdeacon Burkill, chairman; Messrs. E. J. Power, Afany; Wm. Baldwin, M. J. Sargent, James Russell, Pat. Walsh, T. E. Ehrill and R. Bell.

Messrs. P. Cahill and J. V. Conway were elected as Joint Hon. Sec. after several other gentlemen had refused to act owing to pressure of business.

The question of appointing a treasurer was next discussed, and Mr. Conway proposed that one of the local banks be made treasurer.

The Chairman said that was an admirable proposal, and he thought the National Bank, which was the oldest branch in Cappoquin, should be made treasurer.

STER AND LEINSTER BANK, AND AFTER A SHORT DISCUSSION, MR. POWER PROPOSED, AND MR. J. DONOVAN SECONDED, THAT THE MUNSTER AND LEINSTER BANK BE APPOINTED TREASURER, AND THIS WAS UNANIMOUSLY AGREED TO.

Various suggestions were then made as to the form the memorial should take, the question of a statue, a public fountain or a bandstand being suggested by various members.

Eventually the matter was left to the Executive Committee to decide, and it was also decided that a meeting of the Executive Committee should be held immediately after the general meeting to discuss all details as to the site and form of the proposed memorial, the best means of raising the necessary funds, and to deal with all the minor details in connection with the project.

Youghal Notes.

NEW TECHNICAL SCHOOL.

The report of the last meeting of the local Technical Committee, which appears elsewhere in our columns, is well worth carefully reading and studying by those of our readers who take an interest in the success of an invaluable local educational institution. From that report it will be seen that there are no less than 177 students on the registers of the various classes, and that the average attendance for the month reached the very satisfactory figure of 148, with 1,090 attendances all told. This is a big improvement on what prevailed in the old days, when the classes were held elsewhere in the town. And it would appear that the high figure of 177 would be easily capped if there were room for any more new-comers, for additional pupils are seeking entry night after night. Furthermore, it must be recognized that as the present classes have been at work for some time and having made a certain amount of progress in the various branches, it would be somewhat of a handicap on them, if beginners could join up when they pleased. To do them any benefit the teachers would be compelled to neglect those who have attended from the start and to go back ab initio for the new arrivals. This would be neither fair nor just. Of course new students would be welcome if they work themselves up at home or otherwise to the standard attained by those who have availed of the classes since the opening of the New School. The rooms are really comfortable, well-lit and heated, and much more preferable for a couple of hours than the streets these long dreary winter nights. The Head Master has been and is doing everything possible to make the project a huge success, and under his skilful guidance and untiring energy the Youghal Technical School bids fair to equal, if not excel, any similar institution in the country.

EAST CORK HURLING LEAGUE.

Castlemartyr met Killeagh at Killeagh on Sunday last. The teams being rivals on the field, the match excited much interest locally, but though the evening was a somewhat dull, the attendance was on the small side owing to the fact that matches came off also at Ballymacross and Mogeely. The prevailing anticipation in the neighbourhood was that for the first time the visitors would be the victors, but the result panned out contrary to expectation. The match was timed for 8 o'clock, but it was some time after 3.30 when the ball was thrown. Allowing for delays, etc., this means that the game could not finish until 6 o'clock, which is ridiculous from every point of view at this period of the year. No game of the kind can be properly played or seen in such circumstances, at least the second half, generally the most interesting. There being neither wind nor sun, the game started on the level, Killeagh taking possession, but Castlemartyr responded and rushed only to send over. Play of a neutral nature ensued till Killeagh forced the pace and finally drew first blood with a major. The visitors soon afterwards pressed and scored a point. To this they were neither long nor lary in adding a goal, thus taking the lead by a point. The home team retaliated and turned the tables with a major. Considerable delay was caused by a foul on the part of a Killeagh player. He was ordered off the field, but it took a time to get him to obey the referee's ruling. The score at half-time was: KILLEAGH—3 goals. CASTLEMARTYR—1 goal 1 point.

DE'N MHAITH E?

This is the kind of silly question that has kept us as a whole, so far back in the race of modern progress—what good is it? What's the use of learning such and such a science? That is the question that has been flung at our native tongue for years back, and that has been largely responsible for the present condition of ignorance in regard to the language. How many there are amongst us nowadays who have had too good reason to anathematise their short-sightedness in this respect? Oh, if we only had the chance to begin again in the light of the present-day studies of Irish, how very differently we would act? This ought furnish a useful and wholesome lesson of the rising generation, or, if they do not profit by it, then to those who are responsible for bringing them up and fitting them out for the battle of life, which is so fiercely fought these days. No one is in a position to assert positively that a knowledge of such a subject will be of no practical use to him or her. It has often occurred before and is likely to occur again that a good opportunity had been lost by an unavail of because the seeker was not sufficiently acquainted with a certain branch of knowledge, the acquisition of which was considered ridiculous in school days or immediately afterwards. He, or she, is a very short-sighted individual, who considers education finished on leaving school. Why, that is where it begins, or should begin. Book-learning is all very well in itself, but it is too often and too largely a matter of mere cram, and the brain is sometimes stuffed, if not congested to that degree, that the owner can't pick out and make use of all the details allowed. The great trouble with many of our youth after leaving school is that they spend willy-nilly a period of greater or less length of time during which they do little or nothing to improve themselves or their prospects by study. Very foolishly they beg the idea that they know enough, but they lose sight altogether of the fact that what knowledge they have acquired consists largely of theory and cram, which cannot be filled without some previous preparation into the ordinary routine of everyday business life. The worst of the mischief is that owing to non-use and idleness, the brain gets out of practice and it becomes a colossal task to get it into proper working order again. Therefore, the most dangerous period for the rising generation, from the point of view of success in life, is that intervening between the end of the school days and the taking up of a position in life. To meet this, boys or girls leaving school should be encouraged to continue their studies in some shape. Here it is that the great utility of the Technical School comes in.

At this stage play was largely confined to the sideline, where a squabble took place, which brought the match to an abrupt conclusion, everybody leaving the field. In any case darkness would soon have terminated it. At this point the scoring was: XILLEAGH—3 goals. CASTLEMARTYR—2 goals 1 point. Mr. Tom Gardie acted as referee.

A fine set of silver medals, which were on show in Mr. Murphy's shop window, were to be awarded to the winners. Great enthusiasm was displayed, and the League and the chances of the three teams were the talk of the town. Day after day the thud of the football could be heard in the Sportsfield at Coppershill, where the members of the teams practise. The League was organised with the main object of raising a first fifteen. The teams consisted of old as well as new blood, and "old-timers" were not far behind the younger men in their keenness and enthusiasm. Centre and South were the first to line out, and after a great match Centre won with a margin of a goal. South and North were the next, and the North on beating the South qualified to meet the Centre in the final. This was a rattling exhibition of the code in which both teams exerted themselves to their utmost, but in the end the North won by a goal. The large crowds which were in attendance at all the matches showed the great interest taken in the League. Mr. J. Murphy is indeed to be complimented on the great work he has done in the past and is doing at present for the G.A.A. in the town. There are great hopes of a rattling fifteen being picked from the three teams, and we wish them and their general manager (Mr. Murphy) the best of luck on the field in the coming year.

IRISH CONCERT AT HALFWAY.

Those who were present at the Irish Concert held recently at the Halfway Hall would find it hard to believe that Irish cannot be revived in the Deise. The concert, which was organized by the local Irish teacher, assisted by a committee from Knockmalina, was a great success. The hall, which is in the Sliahá Gna district, was crowded. An excellent programme was presented consisting of songs, dances, recitations, etc., and the interest with which the language items were followed, together with the hearty applause they received, showed that most of the audience understood them thoroughly.

During an interval in the programme An Fear Mor, Ring, and Sean O'Maolagáin, County Secretary Gaelic League, addressed the people at some length on the Irish language and Irish culture. The addresses were loudly applauded, and it is evident from this that the hearts of the people are sound on the question of reviving the language, and that, with a little more encouragement from public leaders and representatives, it would meet with the whole-hearted support of the population.

Another important feature in the concert was that most of the items on the programme were contributed by members of the local Irish Classes. This should be a sufficient answer to the arguments of those who say that the money spent on the teaching of Irish is wasted.

At the conclusion of the programme Fr. Meskill, P.P., Tuamona, moved a vote of thanks to the Organising Committee and artist for the excellent entertainment they had given, and appealed to the people to support Irish and Irish culture. Father Conway, C.C., seconded the vote of thanks and made a similar appeal. P. O'Milleadh returned thanks on behalf of the committee, after which the proceedings terminated.

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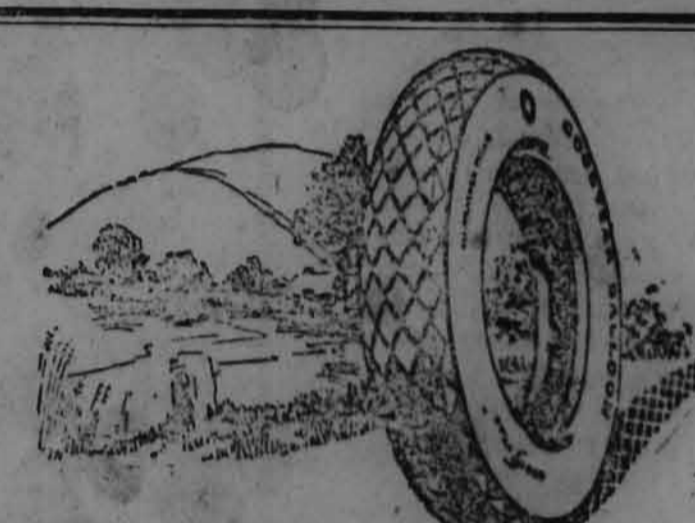
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
