 £216,000 BUDGET.
 COUNTY SURVEYOR'S ESTIMATE REDUCED BY £25,000.

CAN THE RATEPAYERS SURVIVE?

A special meeting of the County Council was held in the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Tuesday, Mr. John Kiersey, chairman, presiding. The names of those present will be found in the division lists hereunder.

The principal business of the meeting was the consideration of the work to be done on the roads of the county in the year ending 31st March, 1928, in accordance with the Provisional Road Works Scheme prepared by the County Surveyor.

The Secretary said that following the resolution passed by the County Council at the last meeting postponing consideration of the County Surveyor's estimate to the February quarterly meeting, he received a letter from the L.G. Department that this estimate should be considered between the 8th January and the 1st February.

On receipt of that letter he communicated with the Chairman, who directed him to call the special meeting.

As to the suggestion of the council securing a loan rather than levy a rate to meet the council's overdraft with the treasurer, the Secretary said the Secretary L.G.D. wrote in reply requesting a fully detailed exposition of the present financial state of the county showing the amount of the loan they proposed to raise, the period for repayment, and the necessity for the course suggested, having special regard to the arrears of rates outstanding.

Mr. O'Gorman—How much is the overdraft at present?
 Secretary—The overdraft was £22,000 last evening.

The Chairman said until they had all the estimates before them and knew how they stood they could not very well proceed. They were not responsible to the L.G.B., who told them to do so and so. They were responsible to the ratepayers, and until they knew their position they could only strike a rate that will be in the capacity of the ratepayers to pay, and hence anything they would pass that day would be only provisional.

Secretary—Anything you do today must be final.
 Chairman—We are not going to be puppets in the hands of the L.G. Department.

Secretary—I would be very hard to prepare the estimates then.
 Chairman—Appoint a Commissioner!

The Secretary said the estimate of the Mental Hospital was down £1,094; the estimate of the Board of Public Health was down £1,100, and the estimate of the Board of Public Assistance was up £1,570.

Mr. Galgey—So far as I can see the Government are imposing rates and taxes on the poor people and the farmers and they are making laws of us to enforce them. If we have no authority to cut down the estimate, the best thing we can do is to take steps on our own, and if the Government are not satisfied with that the best thing for them to do would be to resign and leave the ratepayers to attack the Government and let the Government see what they are doing. New Money.

FINDINGS OF BANKING COMMISSION. NOTE ISSUE PROPOSALS.

The Banking Commission for the Free State has completed its duties and recommends new money for the people of this happy island—new notes, new silver and new pence, and legislation on the subject is to take place very soon.

A summary of the recommendations of the Commission is as follows—

(1) Future Circulation. (a) An issue of legal tender notes.

(b) An issue of bank notes, not legal tender.

(c) Character of Issue. (a) Legal tender notes to be backed by securities, and to be convertible into British legal tender (notes or gold) at a designated redemption (or conversion) agency in London.

(b) Bank notes to be backed by "liquid assets," and to be convertible into legal tender notes on demand at the (local) head office, in the Saorstat, of the issuing bank. It is desirable that supplies of legal tender notes be maintained at the principal offices of the banks.

(3) Method of Issue. (a) Legal tender notes shall be furnished £ for £ to banks, and to banks only, who may furnish:

(1) Gold or British legal tender currency.

(2) Existing bank notes (each bank its own notes) until a sum equal to the present secured issue of each bank shall have been retired.

(3) Payment of £ for £ of current funds in London.

(b) Bank notes shall be issued (of course to banks only, and only to such banks as are specified) to an amount equal in the case of each bank to a figure prescribed. Such notes may be obtained—

(1) By presenting the existing bank notes (each bank its own notes);

(2) By presenting liquid assets or the evidence of possession of such assets.

(4) Medium of Issue. (a) A Corporation to be called The Currency Commission shall be chartered; its members to be banks and the Government only.

(b) Its sole function shall be the issue of notes and the investment and management of the backing of such notes, and operations ancillary thereto.

All arrangements in connection with the printing and custody of legal tender notes and associated bank notes shall be in the hands of and under the direction of the Currency Commission.

(c) Its Board of Directors shall consist of three members to be chosen by the member banks and three members to be named by the Government, with one chosen by these six who shall be Chairman, seven in all.

Of the three Government nominees on the Commission two shall be representatives of or experienced in commerce, trade or industry, and shall not be Government officials.

In case of inability to select a chairman, the Minister for Finance shall nominate a seventh, who shall be chairman. The Chairman shall be learned in banking and finance. Directors shall hold office for three years, and one banking and one Government member shall retire each successive year.

(5) Mechanism of Issue. (a) The Currency Commission shall as funds come into its hands with request for legal tenders, issue such notes to those banks which have applied for them and the funds received in exchange shall be invested.

Such funds shall be held in trust by the Commission for the Government and the income therefrom shall accrue to the Government.

(b) The Commission shall receive from stockholding members liquid assets as follows (as protection for bank notes):

(1) Satisfactory bills or evidence of indebtedness growing out of Irish or English trade, domestic or foreign, with the endorsement of the depositing bank and satisfactory to the Commission.

(2) Due bills or direct obligations made by the bank itself (in favour of the Commission) and representing liquid sound advances to customers, on overdraft or otherwise, or approved securities. The Commission shall have a prior lien on all assets of the member bank receiving the notes up to the amount of such notes, and this lien shall extend to the liability of the shareholders. To assure itself of the character of these credits the Commission may examine the portfolio of the applying bank.

(3) Liability for Issue. (a) The Saorstat shall assume an unlimited liability for the ultimate payment of legal tender notes.

(b) The Commission shall assume liability for all bank notes furnished to banks up to the realised value of the assets of

the bank to which the notes have been supplied in each case.

(7) Form of Issue. (a) Legal tender notes shall bear at the top the words "Saorstat Eireann" and below that the words "The Currency Commission, Irish Free State," following with the legal tender clause. On the left-hand corner shall be the words "Issued through the Currency Commission." The signature shall be that of an official of the Department of Finance.

(b) Legal tender notes shall be issued in denominations of Ten Shillings, One Pound, Five Pounds, Ten Pounds, Twenty Pounds, Fifty Pounds and One Hundred Pounds.

(c) Bank notes shall bear the same words at the top, but in the second line "Consolidated Bank Note Issue," following with the usual promise to pay (in legal tender). The maker or signer of the note shall be the Chairman of the Currency Commission. On the left-hand corner shall be the title and date of the Act under which issued and the words, "Issued through the Currency Commission." On the right-hand corner shall be the words, "Convertible into legal tender at the bank at the Chief Office in Dublin (or Cork)."

(d) Bank notes shall be issued in denominations of One Pound, Five Pounds, Ten Pounds, Twenty Pounds, Fifty Pounds, and One Hundred Pounds.

(e) Limit of Issue. (a) Legal tender notes shall be issued without limit subject to conditions already set forth, but the Commission may at any time discontinue the issue of further notes when the total, not including 40s. notes, exceeds a figure which shall take into account the present secured issue plus British currency in circulation in the Saorstat. The Commission shall retire issues of legal tender notes at the request of any of the stock-holding banks.

(b) The maximum bank note issue shall be fixed at £6,000,000 for a period of two years: Provided that if at the end of any half-year the legal tender issue shall have fallen below £4,000,000, the Commission may reduce the bank note issue so that it shall not be more than £1,000,000 in excess of the legal tender issue.

At the end of two years and every three years thereafter the Currency Commission may, with the approval of the Minister for Finance, revise the maximum figure of bank note issue on a basis which shall have regard to the banking requirements of the country. The security stipulated for behind the issue shall, of course, be entirely satisfactory to the Currency Commission.

(c) Extraordinary issues up to an amount equal to the "rest" may be permitted to any bank by unanimous vote of the Commission subject to graded taxation. Provided that such tax shall be not less than 5 per cent, and that such extraordinary issue shall be retired within twelve months.

(d) Payment to Government. (a) The Government shall receive earnings from legal tender note investments as aforesaid.

(b) The Government shall also receive an annual sum equal to 30s. per £100, which shall be charged to and paid by each bank in proportion to average bank note circulation outstanding. Said sum shall be varied from time to time as the Commission may vote.

(c) From the net profits of the Government derived from the legal tender note fund, and from the proceeds of the tax as aforesaid, there shall be set aside a special reserve fund which shall accumulate until it shall equal 10 per cent. of the outstanding legal tender notes. Such fund shall be invested in the same way as the legal tender note fund itself, and shall be the property of the Government held in trust by the Commission. It shall be used to cover any losses due to shrinkages of investments and shall be the recipient of any profits thereon. All excess above such 10 per cent. shall be semi-annually paid to the Government in cash.

(4) Condition of Membership. Any bank registered in the Saorstat or now operating there shall be eligible for membership.

(1) Provided it shall maintain a local shareholders' register for holders domiciled or resident in the Saorstat.

(2) Provided it shall comply with such requirements governing banking as shall be fixed by law.

(3) Provided it shall accept the regulations to be fixed by the Commission, relating to bank management.

(4) A majority vote of the Commission shall admit to membership.

The Commission stresses the fact that the Saorstat has encountered no difficulties on the score of exchange inasmuch as its monetary basis has been identical with that of Great Britain.

Its inconveniences or inadequacies have been only those to which the monetary basis of

Great Britain was subject, and Great Britain has been since the close of the war by far the most sound and stable nation, speaking in a financial and monetary sense, in Europe. Thus the Saorstat has found itself automatically provided at the beginning of its existence with a trustworthy and steadily improving currency basis.

Since the Saorstat is now a separate State responsible for its own financial future and vested with the power to establish its own currency system, changes which may occur in British currency from this time forward will by no means automatically extend themselves to the Saorstat. An absolute necessity for action is indicated, and in view of such necessity it seems desirable to ensure the proper maintenance of a sound and reliable currency in the Saorstat, either through the provision of an entirely independent monetary system, or through the definite adoption of a fixed relationship to Great Britain, with such supporting arrangements as may seem needful.

The Commission, therefore, recommends the "definite acceptance and continuance of British sterling as a standard of value in Saorstat Eireann." This does not mean the actual maintenance of British currency in circulation, but quite the contrary.

The Commission recommends the installation of a new currency system. It is earnest in its recommendation, however, that this currency system shall be stated in terms of sterling, thus accepting the British standard of value, and that it shall be convertible at par into British sterling in order that there may be no interruption to the comparatively free interchange of money and notes between the two countries, and no shock to the present system of inter-communication between the two, upon a uniform currency basis or standard.

TECHNICAL TRAINING. EVIDENCE BY CHAIRMAN OF COUNTY WATERFORD TECHNICAL COMMITTEE.

At a sitting of the Technical Education Committee in Dublin on Friday last,

Mr. T. J. Power, Dungarvan, Chairman of the County Waterford Joint Technical Instruction Committee, in the course of his evidence in behalf of that body said that the school leaving age before which education was compulsory was now fixed at 14 years, but it would be a mistake to defer the provision of the new type of instruction until that age had been reached as practical instruction should be given earlier, and children should be started on the course which it was desired they should follow before they were set free to leave, and so drift beyond the reach of instruction. No later than the latter part of the 14th year children who had reached a fair standard of general education should be taught separately from younger children in classes or schools adapted for their requirements. Their curriculum should include drawing, manual instruction (boys) and domestic science (girls), which were occasional subjects in the elementary schools, and science, including rural science, for country children, and geometry should be included. Reading, composition and arithmetic should have special reference to the home life of the children and their future occupations. If training of that kind was given for at least a year before the age of 14 it might be expected that many children would stay on an extra year, and some a third year. To encourage this, the last three years' courses should be arranged for. The attraction should be held out that it was designed as far as possible to prepare for actual situations.

This might be arranged by omitting Irish except in Irish-speaking districts, and by offering the pupils the choice of a business or industrial training with some opportunity for independent work in each.

As regarded industrial training, although lessons in theory were useful, the best results could only be attained where young people were instructed in the use of tools and in the various branches of a handicraft by attendance at a workshop. For this reason the system of bonus grants to master craftsmen might well be encouraged.

Before Mr. G. P. Farrell, D.J.

The Late Mr. E. C. Ronayne, B.L.

The Justice said—Before commencing the business he had to refer with great personal sorrow to the death of his esteemed colleague, the late Mr. E. C. Ronayne, B.L., which took place since their last sitting. Although Mr. Ronayne was his senior at the Bar, he had made his acquaintance only since coming to Youghal 4 years ago. During that time he had had the pleasure of meeting him professionally and in private life, and he had entertained a very sincere admiration for his many great qualities as a sound lawyer and a brilliant advocate. He was from nature and training imbued with high and lofty principles of life and character. Of great courage, possessed of deep and abiding interest in all matters of public weal and concern, he devoted a great deal of his time to matters of local utility. Unsparring and unselfish in his charity, unostentatious and forgetful of self, by his death a great loss had fallen on his family, his native town, and on his friends, who were many.

Mr. J. L. In dismissing all three, the Justice said that they were proper cases for investigation.

Quiet, but Unfortunate. Sergt. O'Shaughnessy charged Wm. Meade, Copperally, with drunkenness. Complainant said that defendant had been fined 7s. 6d. at the last court, and there were two previous convictions.

Justice—What am I to do with this man? The Clerk said defendant was unfortunate, but quiet. Fined 7s. 6d.

Cycling Without Lights. A number of persons were charged with using unlighted bicycles. They were each fined 2s. 6d. and costs.

The Justice said there were too many bicycles without lights. In future he would impose a fine of 5s.

Unlicensed Dogs. A number of persons were charged with having unlicensed dogs. Some of the defendants said they didn't know that the law was changed. At his first appearance at the Dungarvan District Court on Wednesday Mr. Williams was heartily welcomed by Mr. Troy, D.J., who professed for him a future bright, prosperous and illustrious.

COUNTY BUDGET. The County Council spent all Tuesday afternoon trying to keep down the rates which are for ever going up, and wound up by reducing the roads estimate £25,000. That will be hard on the soft roads, but to try that was wiser than to have a wretchedly public, who are tired out of paying for everything real and fantastic. As the Dail is at present engaged passing a Bill to give pensions to all who fought in the past, and are also about to introduce a Bill to give us new money, it is to be hoped that as a consolation for the freedom we have secured they will make a free gift to every man and woman over 21 years of £200 new currency so as to give them a start to make ends meet.

SAD DROWNING FATALITY AT CAPPAGH. On Saturday last a boy of 9 years named Patrick Walsh, Knocknacoola, Cappagh, lost his life under very sad circumstances. He was sent by his mother for milk to a neighbour's house named Sheehan, who lives at the other side of the river Finisk, which at the time was much swollen and over which a small foot bridge is erected. When some time later the boy was not returning inquiries were made at Sheehan's, but as he had not called there at all that day, it was feared he had slipped off the bridge into the river. A search was at once organized and a party of Civic Guards from Cappagh Station assisted the volunteers in dragging the river up to a late hour on Saturday night without result. Early on Sunday morning operations were resumed, and after a long search the gallion which the poor chap carried for the milk was found, and later the body was found in the river about half a mile from the foot bridge. An inquest on Monday by Dr. M. F. Moloney, Coroner, a verdict of death by accidental drowning was returned. Supt. Murray, Dungarvan, represented the parents and relatives of the poor boy, and commented on the structure of the foot bridge.

DEATH OF MRS. E. MERRY. On Saturday last at her residence, Church Road, Upper Newwood, London, Mrs. Euphemia M. Merry, widow of the late Mr. R. A. Merry, Waterford, passed away in her 73rd year following a heavy attack of influenza. She was the second wife of the late Mr. Robert A. Merry, who established the well-known business of R. A. Merry and Co., Ltd., in 1868. She was a most estimable lady, kind and lovable in disposition, and her demise has occasioned much sorrow. To the bereaved relatives we tender our sincere sympathy.

SHIP IN DISTRESS OFF HELVICK. During Wednesday's storm the three-masted motor schooner "Elizabeth Ellen Fisher," of Dublin, owned by L. O'Toole, Arklow, and bound for Ballinacorra with a cargo of coal, got into difficulties and fog the fog of distress. The Helvick lifeboat crew were summoned, and at once they put out to sea, which was running very high at the time. After hard work they got to the schooner and the captain asked to have the crew of five put ashore as he feared the vessel was going to part her chains and anchors owing to stress of weather. The crew were then taken on board the lifeboat and landed at Ballinacorra Pier as the sea was too high to venture near Helvick Pier. When the sea became calmer in the afternoon 5 shore men named A. Whelan, P. Keane, J. Manahan and two Carrys, took out a boat to the vessel, which they boarded, and they at once took down the flag of distress. Afterwards the lifeboat put out to sea again and put 4 more men aboard. After a time the first 5 men who boarded the vessel and took down the flag of distress left her, and about 6 p.m. the lifeboat took out the original crew and placed them in charge of the boat. The "Elizabeth Ellen Fisher" developed engine trouble while off Helvick on Saturday evening, and dropping anchor in Helvick Roads had her engines righted, but owing to the bad weather she did not proceed further. Mr. C. Skuce and his staff had the life-saving apparatus ready if required.

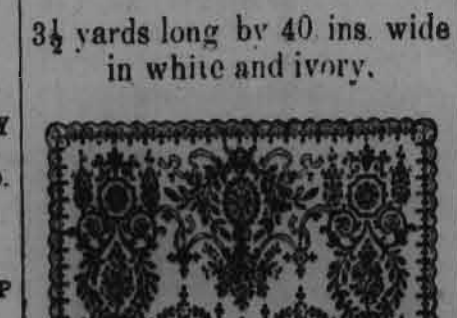

Lismore Notes.

A RUMOUR.

A rumour which gained currency to a considerable extent in the district led to the passing of a resolution by the Lismore Town Commissioners. The rumour was that our local sergeant in charge of the Civic Guards—Sergt. Daly—was to be transferred from our midst. Whether the lying jade—rumour—was to be believed or not, Mr. Andrew Hickey, P.C., was the proposer, and Mr. E. A. Murphy, P.C., the seconder. A resolution which was unanimously passed by Lismore Town Commissioners asking the authorities to cancel the transfer (if true) and at the same time placing on record a tribute to the efficiency and courtesy of Sergt. Daly since his advent to Lismore.

ROLLED OR TARRED.

We cannot at the moment state whether our streets will be either rolled or tarred although both words are very much in our ears for days past. Finance is the whole crux, and the ordinary man in the street is aware of that. One suggestion, however, we may be allowed to respectfully make is that the water tables about town would not be neglected. Residents contemplating improved water or gas services would be well advised to have the work placed in hands before the streets are rolled.

AN ACCIDENT.

An employee of the Lismore Estates Company (forestry section) named Thomas Ryan, New street, Lismore, fell from a tree he was engaged cutting with other workmen at West street, Tallow, and received injuries. He was medically attended and removed to Dungarvan Hospital, where, we understand at the time of writing, he is progressing favourably.

AN HOSPITAL.

After many months of agitation, and it must be said that our local County Council members did not spare themselves either, Lismore is to have an hospital with ten beds. We need not go into the history which deprived Lismore for the past few years of an institution wherein the poor of the union area could receive medical treatment and comfort, and must now console ourselves with the old proverb of the half loaf, etc. Mr. D. Stokes, contractor, Dungarvan, has started the work at the Lismore Workhouse with Mr. John J. McKenna as his foreman, and we are safe to predict that under the latter the work will be promptly and skillfully carried out, and in keeping with the many works in the locality with which he has been identified. We understand that the hospital will be at the women's portion of the workhouse taking in the nuns' apartments formerly, and the number of beds will be divided equally between women and men. Indeed, the residents of the union area were grateful for the restoration of the hospital, which was missed for the last six years or so.

COUNTY COMMITTEE OF TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

The monthly meeting of the above was held on Tuesday. Mr. Thomas Power, chairman, presided. Also present were—Messrs. D. Fraher, B. G. Usher, M. J. Keane, T. Fraher, M. Griffin and L. O'Brien.

Woodwork Classes.

Applications were received from Ballymacarbery and Clashmore Woodwork Classes asking for extensions of the classes.

The Secretary explained that a class was to open at Cappaquin about the middle of February.

After a discussion, on the proposition of Mr. Usher, seconded by Mr. Keane, the committee decided to grant an extension of one month to Ballymacarbery, who had not had a class for some years, and an extension of one week to the Clashmore Class.

Kelly and Co. wrote returning the paying order sent by the committee for £4 0s. 8d. (the amount of hire), and pointed out that their claim was for £14 9s. 8d., which included £10 damages.

After a discussion Mr. Keane proposed, and Mr. Griffin seconded, that Messrs. Kelly and Co. be given the option of accepting the paying order again for hire of marquee, £4 0s. 8d., and failing acceptance, that they be informed that this committee will not be further responsible.

The proposition was passed unanimously.

THE LATE DR. PATRICK STEPHENSON, CARRICK-ONSUIR.

The Most Rev. Dr. Hackett, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, presided at the Office and High Mass on Monday for the repose of the soul of the late Dr. Patrick Stephenson, Carrick-on-Suir. The celebrant of the Mass was Venerable Archdeacon Sheehy, P.P., O.D. V.F., Carrick-on-Suir; deacon, Rev. J. Kenneally, C.C., Grangemockler; sub-deacon, Rev. N. Walsh, C.C., Carrickbeg; master of ceremonies, Rev. Martin Dowley, A.M., St. John's, Waterford; deacons at the Throne, Very Rev. Canon Prendergast, P.P., V.F., Ballybricken, Waterford.

A very large and representative congregation attended the High Mass and the funeral to Carrickbeg was the largest seen in the town for many years. Very Rev. Archdeacon Sheehy, Carrick-on-Suir, conducted the service at the graveside.

The chief mourners were—Dr. Stephenson (brother); Frank and Henry Stephenson (sons); Dr. A. B. Stephenson, Kilkenny, and Mr. Raymond Stephenson, solr., Dublin (cousins).

There was a very large attendance of the medical and legal professions from Waterford, Clonmel and Kilkenny.

The late Dr. Stephenson was born in Carrick-on-Suir 63 years ago. He had been dispensary and workhouse hospital medical officer in the town for 30 years. He served as dispensary doctor at Kilmacow, Co. Kilkenny, for a short time when a young man. He was one of the best known medical men in Ireland. He was very popular and was a noted sportsman. He was a brother of the late Mr. T. A. Stephenson, solicitor (Kenny and Stephenson, Solicitors) and father of Mr. Henry Stephenson, National Bank, Carrickmacross; Mr. Frank Stephenson and Rev. P. Stephenson, S.J. (now in France). Deceased succumbed to an attack of septic pneumonia after some days' illness. His death is deeply regretted in Carrick-on-Suir and the adjoining districts where he had a large practice.
