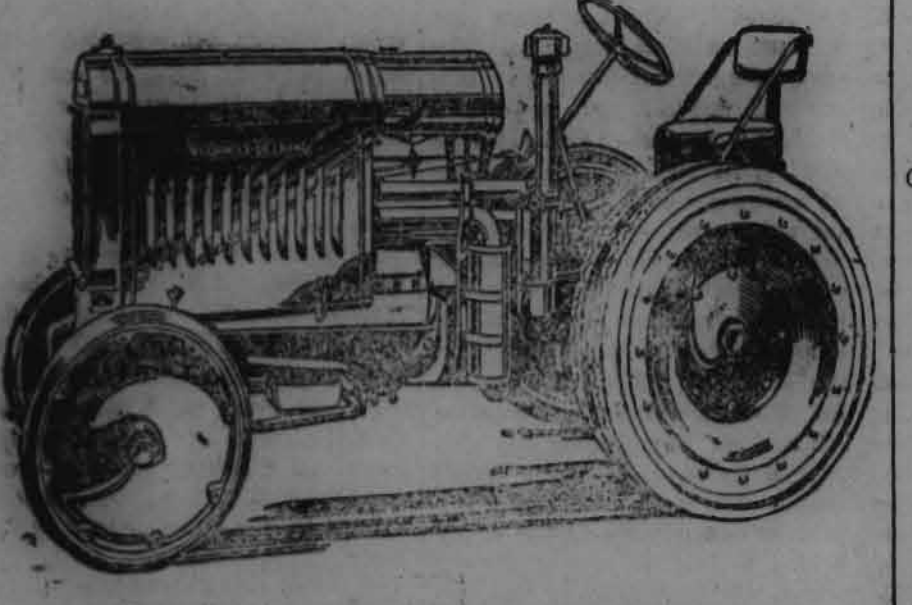

CAPPOQUIN NOTES.
NEW CIRCULATING LIBRARY OPENED.
 Thanks to the great enterprise of Miss Mansfield, Main street a new Circulating Library has just been opened at her stationery premises and bookstall (opposite the entrance to the Protestant Church) which will supply a long-felt want in Cappoquin. The people of this town, more especially the ladies, have always displayed rare literary tastes, and are voracious readers of good works of fiction by reputable authors, but the heavy expense of having to purchase such books outright has proved a rather serious deterrent to many in the past. Under the new system the best books of modern fiction can now be borrowed, either for a small annual subscription or the nominal cost of 3d. per book, which should prove welcome news to all our literary friends, and we have no doubt that Miss Mansfield's enterprise in the matter will be rewarded by a large and generous measure of support and patronage from the start. IMPROVING THE STREETS.
 The people of Cappoquin have good reason to be thankful to their esteemed fellow-townsmen, Mr. M. Brennan, Dungarvan, for his able advocacy in favour of improving the streets of this town at the last meeting of the County Council a fortnight ago. Many of the more prominent townsmen have for a long time been complaining of the rather neglected condition of the streets, and urging the necessity for their improvement, yet they failed to carry out their primary duty in the matter by sending a deputation to the meeting of the County Council asking for a redress of their grievances, as the people of Lisnaw did, and it would almost have served them right if matters were allowed remain as they are. But although now a leading public man in Dungarvan, Mr. Brennan has never lost interest in the "Old Cornerstone," which gave him birth, and any improvements which may be carried out on the streets will be entirely due to his thoughtful action in the matter and not to the inaction of the grumblers above referred to.

"JUNO AND THE PAYCOCK."
 The greatest interest is being displayed in the forthcoming production of Mr. Sean O'Casey's famous play, "Juno and the Paycock," which will be staged for the first time in Cappoquin in the large Book-house Hall on next Tuesday night, 22nd inst., by the members of the Rowing Club Dramatic Class. The scene of the play being laid in Dublin, and faithfully depicting various episodes of slum life, with all its pathos and sordid misery, with plenty of comedy and highly-dramatic situations thrown in, should provide an intensely Irish atmosphere which will appeal to all classes, and as an exceptionally good example of the talents of Juno and gentlemen has been selected for the production, the play is certain to be as faultlessly produced as it can be by any company of amateur players. As the proceeds of the play are to go to the funds of the Rowing Club, this should be a further reason for securing the heartiest support of the public on the occasion.
NEED FOR FIRE APPLIANCES.
 Without in the least wishing to be taken as alarmists or getting "the wind up," we think it not inappropriate to draw attention to the complete absence of not only a Fire Brigade, but even the most primitive form of fire appliances to cope with a big fire, should such an unwelcome thing happen in the town at any time. When the present town water supply was being laid down years ago several hydrants were also laid down at great expense in various parts of the Main street, but as far as we know these have never been tested to find out how effective they would be in supplying the necessary volume of water "in case of fire." Even assuming that the aforesaid hydrants are quite capable of fulfilling their mission, there is no proper hose available to attach to them in case of emergency, so that in the event of a serious fire breaking out, say, in any part of the Main street away from the vicinity of the mill stream, where there is usually a copious supply of water, the entire centre of the town would be completely at the mercy of the flames and all the valuable houses in our principal "boulevard" would be "gone to blazes" in a very short time. As this is a matter vitally affecting the lives and property of the townspeople, we think a public meeting should be called to take the necessary steps to remedy such a sad state of neglect, for, as the old proverb says: "It is too late to sharpen one's sword when the drum beats 'To Battle.'"

LAW COSTS. CO. COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S APPEAL TO JUDGE. At Tipperary Circuit Court, before Judge Sealy, Mr. P. L. Ryan, Chairman of the South Riding County Council, addressing Judge Sealy, said he represented the County Council and County Committee of Agriculture, who dealt with matters he had to put before him. It was no great pleasure to him to take up his Lordship's time, but when he heard the facts he thought his Lordship would agree he was justified in doing so. From time to time recently the County Council and County Committee of Agriculture have had before them the manner in which the Land Commission and Board of Works decrees had been collected, and passed a strong resolution on the matter. They had succeeded to a certain extent, inasmuch as the Land Commission had reverted to the practice of giving six days' notice before instituting proceedings for the recovery of annuities; but they had not succeeded in the matter of costs, and had asked him to assist them in righting it in some way, as it affected thousands throughout the Free State. In one case there was a decree for £1 9s. 3d. and when it came to be paid there were £2 10s. 8d. costs. At the last Sessions his Lordship gave decrees for £5 10s. 6d. and £1 6s., the last instalment due by a poor fellow to the Board of Works for a hayshed. He (Mr. Ryan) was called on by the man, and had to pay, in addition to the amount of the decrees, £3 3s. 4d. costs. They could not tolerate that as representatives of the people, and he assured his Lordship it was with pain and sorrow he called attention to this sad state of affairs which had cost this unfortunate country thousands of pounds already. They must put a stop to it, and he hoped his Lordship would assist them to do so. The people who had to pay this money were people who could not afford to pay it. It was outrageous—that was the way the County Council described it. Next Friday the matter would be before the County Council's General Council, and they asked his Lordship not to tolerate such a harsh practice. Judge Sealy said Mr. Ryan had no locus standi there at all, but as Chairman of the County Council

he thought it right to hear him. There was no doubt in these small cases the costs were abnormally high—a great deal too high—but as far as he was concerned he was only sitting there and carrying out certain rules of court and certain specific scales of fees. He had at present no power to increase the costs or cut them down. That would be remedied, he thought, shortly, when the Circuit Rules were published, because any case that came inside the District Court jurisdiction and the plaintiff went in to the Circuit Court, he would only get the District Court costs, which would be on a lower scale than Circuit Court costs. He thought they could expect shortly that things would be ameliorated in that respect. He quite understood it was the poor people who had felt the grievance; but at the same time they had the remedy in their own hands by paying their debts before proceedings were taken, and thus avoid this heavy burden. Mr. Ryan said it was the Sheriff's costs they disputed. Judge Sealy—in that case you would require a new statute; you would want to get the Dail to pass a new statute to remedy that. Mr. Ryan said on behalf of the County Council and on behalf of the poor people concerned he thanked his Lordship for having listened to him.

TWO WOMEN ARRESTED. SEQUEL TO ALLEGED RAID. There was a sequel to the recent alleged raid and robbery of the post office at Hollywood, when Mrs. Margaret Cody, sub-postmistress, and her assistant, Miss Mary K. Brady, were charged at Hollywood Cross, before Mr. J. Mooney, P.C., with having, on 2nd inst., conspired to defraud the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs of about £100. Previously four young men had been arrested on suspicion in connection with the alleged raid, but were liberated. Accused were charged on the information of Capt. Moyrhan, Chief of the Investigation Department of the Post Office, and statements alleged to have been made by them were submitted. Accused were remanded to the District Court at Dunlavin.
