53lbs. SALMON AT LISMORE. The fishermen at Lismore (Lismore Estates Co.) have caught in the nets in the Blackwater underneath Lismore Castle a salmon which weighed 53lbs., and is, we understand, a record in the district. In February, 1890, 52lbs. fish was caught in the nets here. The rod fishing at Lismore has been very good latterly, and four Englsh gentleme Lismore, are having good sport, and have not a blank day since their arrival fish at least daily. DEATH OF THE VERY REV. T. A. MOCKLER, P.P. CLASHMORE

We regret to announce the death of the Very Rev Thomas A. Mockler, P.P., which occurred at the Parochial House, Clashmore, 5n Wednesday evening, Fr. Mockler had been unwell for some weeks, but being a young man in the early sixties, it was not anticipated by his friends and parishioners that his illness would become serious . A change for the worse set in towards the close of last week, and despite the most careful nursing and the best of medical skill, he passed peacefully away, and deep is the grief felt at his early demise by hi parishioners, who loved lim, sig wel as by this countless fixends in the diocese and outside it.

The late Fr. Mockler was born in Powerstown Parish, and belonged to a well-knowr family that gave many i lustrious sons to the Church. After pur suing his preliminary studies in his native place he proceeded to St. John's College and later to Maynooth, where he was ordained after a brilliant college career. He was as authority on Theology, and soon after his ordination he was appointed Professor at St. John's College, Waterford, where 'he quickly won fame. IHe was 13 prolific writer on sacred subjects, and wrote a book on Thurch Liturgy. He was also an enthusiast on our native sports, and he always took a great interest in hurling and other forms of manly display. man of splendid physique and command ing tappearance, the late Fr. Mockler vvas a personal favourite wherever he vvent After a long career as Professor at St. John's College he was appointed seven years ago to the pastoral charge of Clashmore and Kinsalebeg, and dur ing his pastorate he devoted himself exclusively to the spiritual and tempora welfare dl his flock by whom he was beloved. He is gone, and great is the grief of his late parishioners and friends. There will be Requiem Office and High Mass for the repose of his soul at 10 ci clock (co-day (Friday) in the Parish' Church, Clashmore R.LP.




