ILLEGAL NETS. Arising out of a discussion on a net which had been seized illegally fishing, Mr. Kent said all nets of the kind should be burnt. Capt. Dunne said he hoped they would never see the day that they would have a Kent in power to burn poor men's property...

EMPLOYMENT OF BAILIFFS. The Chairman handed in the following notice of motion—"That all bailiffs and other employees shall be selected by either of the two Inspectors or jointly. Provided, however, that the persons selected shall be deemed to be in the employment of the Board only until the next meeting, and it shall be the duty of the Inspectors to submit the selections at the usual meeting held after the selection. No appointment shall be made until the approval of the majority be given. Further, that any resolution of the board to the contrary be deemed null and void and hereby rescinded, this resolution applying to all selections made since 29/4/27."

INSPECTOR'S REPORT. In the course of his monthly report the Inspector stated that on May 6th he had 250 and 220 yards of drift net forfeited at Youghal. On the 7th Sgt. Acton, Clashmore, observed two men fixing a net near Pilsnark at 7.15 p.m. He pursued the men who escaped. At Youghal Bridge he met a water bailiff who seized 5 nets 125 yards long. On the 8th May (Sunday) two bailiffs on duty at the Barrow found a fixed engine 120 yards long. Not having a boat handy, they rendered the net useless by cutting it adrift. At Tallon on 17th Robert and John McGrath were fined £15 each and their brothers, William and George, £10 each for using a fixed engine on the river Barrow. Appeals have been lodged by Mr. A. Carroll, s.o., Fermoy. The Justice strongly commended the manner in which the bailiffs had discharged their duty, although they had been freed on. At Youghal on 26th four men were fined £5 each for using drift nets over the proscribed length. A number of cases lodged for hearing at Cappoquin on 26th were adjourned to next court after some evidence was given.

FUNERAL OF LATE MR. T. WALSH, YOUGHAL. Amid feeling of widespread regret the funeral of the late Mr. Tom Walsh took place from St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church. The esteem in which the deceased gentleman was held was testified to by the large cortege, which included representatives of all creeds and classes of the community. The late Mr. Walsh had for many years carried on an extensive drapery trade, and had retired from business about three years ago. A genial type, noted for his straightforward dealings in all matters with which he was connected, loved by all with whom he came in contact, particularly among his associates in the Young Men's Society, of which he acted as hon. treasurer for a number of years, his death came as a great shock to a wide circle of acquaintances, who will mourn his loss as that of a true friend. G. A. A. MUNSTER CHAMPIONSHIP. WATERFORD v. CLARE.

At Dungarvan Gaelic Grounds on Sunday, Waterford and Clare met in the first round of the Munster Championships in senior hurling and junior football. The day was beautiful and the attendance was of large proportions. The arrangements as usual were perfect. In the junior football the home team put up a wonderful fight and were in the height of hard luck to have a drawn game. In the senior hurling Waterford led by a big margin in the first half, but in the second half they seemed to rest on their oars, and full time found the Clare men leading by 2 points. Mr. Hogan, Waterford, was referee and gave every satisfaction.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL. Clare had the better of matters in the first half, playing with a good breeze, and at half time the score was—Clare, 2 goals 2 points; Waterford, 1 goal. On resuming Waterford had the wind in their favour and did better. They soon scored a minor, and this was quickly followed by another point. The defence of Waterford was good, and after some very exciting play the match was drawn, the score being—

WATERFORD—1 goal 6 points. CLARE—2 goals 3 points.

SENIOR HURLING. In this match the Banner County won a splendid game. For the first half Clare did not show up as well as was expected, and Waterford had much the better of matters. Clare attacked, but were driven back, when Waterford put on a minor. Fast play followed, but a clearance was effected. Waterford got a free and smart work was seen at the Clare goal, but the ball went over. In the midst of some splendid hurling Waterford, by a fine ruck, sent the ball through the net. Clare now attacked, but Waterford defended well, and a fine exhibition resulted. Clare's goalkeeper was kept busy, and Waterford rushed from midfield, and a tussle took place around the Clare goal posts, when Waterford shot a minor. Clare made a goal, and at half-time the score stood—

WATERFORD—4 goals 3 points. CLARE—1 goal.

Waterford supporters were confident on resuming, when within two minutes Waterford put up a point, and after some even play the home team put on a major. Clare then pressed and showed more mastery than in the previous half. Their spirits rose when they put on a goal. Some beautiful hurling was witnessed on both sides, Clare being chiefly the aggressor, and they scored another major. Very vigorous play followed. Waterford's goal was threatened, but the ball went wide. Clare put on a minor, and Waterford was kept generally on the defensive. Clare kept the ball almost continually in Waterford territory, and showed much better combination than in the earlier stages. Another attack missed by inches, and then Waterford got the ball well down, but missed by a narrow margin. Waterford now defended well, but Clare got another goal from a seventy. Towards the close scores were level, and vigorous play followed. Waterford pressed, but were driven back, and Clare passed their rivals by making a goal. Soon after the puck-out Clare added another goal to their score and were leading by two goals, when Waterford, with a desperate effort, found the net. Immediately after Waterford put on another point and added a minor, this leaving only two points between the teams, with two minutes to go. Fine play was seen for that two minutes, and when the whistle sounded, Clare were winners of a most exciting game, the score being—CLARE—3 goals 1 point. WATERFORD—6 goals 3 points.

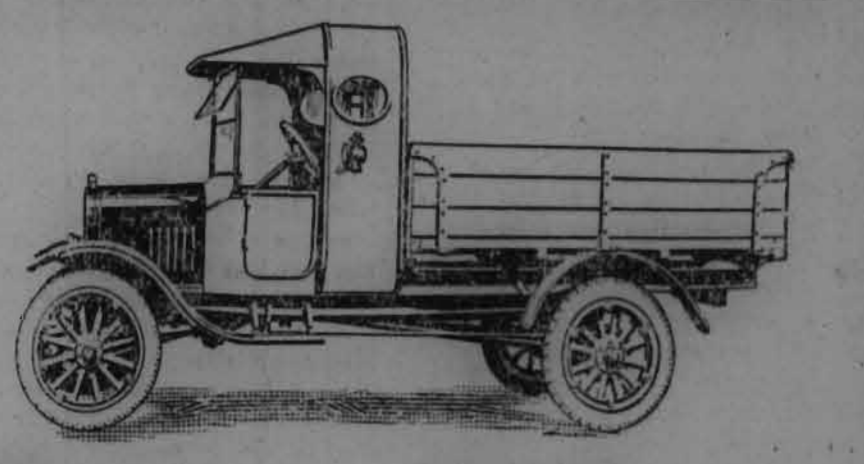
