ASSAULT CASES.
The adjourned cases and cross-cases for assault between Maurice and John Conway, brothers, were called, Messrs. E. A. Ryan, State Solicitor, Dungarvan, and Wm. R. Hodnett, solicitor, Youghal, being engaged.
Mr. Hodnett said he had received a letter from Mr. Ryan stating that he had to attend the Circuit Court that day, and he suggested that all the cases might be mutually withdrawn. They were only side issues, the real point being which of the brothers was to get their father's farm.
The brothers having agreed, all the cases were marked "no appearance."

TRESPASS AND ASSAULT.
Pak, Walsh, Ardmore, charged John Fitzgerald and his mother, Bridget, with the trespass of a jemot on his meadow. He also charged John with assault.
Evidence having been given by complainant, defendants deposed that the place was no man's land, and John said he only caught Walsh by the coat.
Bridget Fitzgerald was fined 2s. and 6s. costs, and John 1s. for trespass. The latter was bound to the peace in his own recognisances for the assault.

MORE DISPUTES.
Ellen Foley, Ballyneane, charged Patrick Prendergast with abusive and threatening language and Molly Prendergast with assault.
Mr. Hodnett, for the complainant, said Mr. Ryan, for defendant, asked for an adjournment, he impressing on defendants that he should not interfere with complainant in the meantime. He (Mr. Hodnett) agreed to the adjournment on those terms.

VAGRANCY ACT.
In the adjourned case of Sgt. Acton, Clashmore, against Declan Geasley, under the Vagrancy Act, complainant said that defendant had conducted himself "filthy well" since he didn't wish to "pray" the case.
The case was further adjourned to next court.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE CASES.
Guard Croke charged Patrick Burns, Coolbagh, for the non-attendance of his child at school.
Mr. Hodnett—I will do my best to confine myself to the issue, though it is difficult. I believe you offered to pay a sum of money? No. Was there never any talk of money between them? Yes, there was. And you said he went to the priest about it? Yes, I was going to the priest. He was there some evening. And that is what he was referring to when he said "What are you going to do about this case?" Yes, you know what he was referring to?

After a detailed cross-examination regarding the incidents on the morning of the 11th May, witness said he didn't see Mary O'Brien putting the child in with anything in her arms and coming out at three o'clock. He didn't know who put it there, or to whom it was given, or what was an overcoat around it.
Replying to the Superintendent, witness said his mother was over 70 and not strong. There was no other woman in the house.
How long was the child on the table? About four or five minutes. Was it warmly wrapped up? No. The covering was of it. Had a sufficient covering if it was wrapped round? Yes. Sufficient to keep out the cold? Yes. It wasn't very warm morning, was it? Yes, it was. The mother wanted her to go to school? Yes, she did. Where did the child go? To the County Hospital. On account of its health or because you could not keep it? It was all right as regards its health? So far as I could see.

Mr. Hodnett—The child was about six inches from the brink of the table, and the child's little nose might have fallen off. Then you are trying to make this man as black as you can against Mary O'Brien—you are adding injury to injury and insult to insult? I am only telling the truth. As an expert in infants you say the child could have rolled off the table?
Superintendent—That is hardly fair. Thomas Foley, motor car owner, deposed that on the 11th May he drove John O'Brien, son, and his son's daughter, where they picked up Mary and John O'Brien, and they were driving past about 50 yards from Hennessy's and when they returned Mary had not the child with her. He then described what he saw of the "scrap" between the O'Brien's and the Hennessy's. The O'Brien's brought a lady's overcoat with them which was put around the infant.
Superintendent—It will be admitted that the child was reasonably protected by that.
Sgt. O'Shea gave evidence of the arrest of Mary O'Brien. She made no statement.
Mr. Hodnett submitted that neither in law nor fact had any case to meet. The evidence he had to meet was that he more or less a corroborator that he could not see how that would make that unfortunate girl amenable to the criminal law. She had suffered enough already. In those cases the person to get sent free was the man, but so far as the civil law could be brought to bear on that man he would not get sent free.
Justice—That is another matter.
Mr. Hodnett, continuing, respectfully submitted that it would be a travesty of justice if that poor girl and her family were further punished. He gathered from

the Superintendent's remarks that he was not pressing the case, and therefore, after having heard the evidence for the defence, he would ask his Worship to dismiss the case. It was only fair to the girl's brother to say that he was coming forward in a truly chivalrous spirit and taking the whole blame on himself, as she had acted under his directions, although under his compulsion.
Justice—Just call the brother.
John O'Brien, junior, then gave evidence of the occurrences on 11th May and concluded by saying: "I desire to take full responsibility. It was under my directions my sister left the child there."
Mr. Hodnett I don't like to call the girl.
Justice—You need not.

The guards acted very properly throughout, and their action was to be commended.

Mr. Kevin O'Higgins Shot Dead

BY ARMED MEN.

WHILE ON HIS WAY TO MASS.

COUNTRY HORRIFIED AT HIS MURDER.

On his way to 2 1/2 o'clock Mass at Rosestown on Sunday, Mr. Kevin O'Higgins, Vice-President of the Executive Council, Minister for Justice and Minister for External Affairs, was shot dead and mortally wounded by three armed young men.
Mr. O'Higgins sat on and alone, and was absolutely without means of defence. One of the three assailants, stopped him as he entered Rosestown Avenue on his way from his residence and, apparently with the object of detaining him all the other attackers came up, asked some questions.
Being the other man, approach, the Vice-President sensed danger, and ran across the road in an endeavour to gain the shelter of a gateway. The three men immediately poured a rain of bullets into him, and the Minister collapsed just as he reached the opposite path.
Into the prostrate form of the Minister the attackers fired several more rounds. In all, about 20 shots were discharged, and Mr. O'Higgins received no less than thirty wounds.
Then his slayers, with the muzzle of their guns still smoking, made a dash for a motor car which they had in waiting with engine running, and drove off at top speed.
A crowd was quickly attracted to the fatal spot. Among the first to arrive was Dr. Eoin MacNeill, formerly Minister for Education, who was almost overwhelmed with horror and grief to discover that the man on the ground was none other than his former Cabinet colleague.
The dauntless courage which was the outstanding characteristic of Mr. O'Higgins' life, but so wonderfully brilliant, never remained with him to the last. As he lay on the ground he gave directions regarding his will and also made the following statement—
"I have been shot. I do not know how I am. I am lying—feel that I am. I have always done the best I could for Ireland, and I forgive those who have done this to me."
After he had been conveyed back to his residence, Mr. O'Higgins lived for nearly five hours. During most of that period he was in a semi-conscious state. Those around his death-bed were filled with admiration for the superb fortitude which he played, and the resignation with which he calmly awaited his end. It was, however, evident that he was torturing with grief at the parting from his wife and two baby girls.

HARROWING SCENES DESCRIBED.
Alfred Burns, a Rosestown, Termon, Rosestown, a motor driver, employed by Messrs. Findlater and Co., Ltd., said that he lived about 40 yards from the scene of the shooting, and was preparing for 12 o'clock Mass when his wife heard shots. Wearing neither coat nor vest he rushed towards the wounded man, over whom Dr. MacNeill was kneeling on the footpath. Just immediately others arrived, and Mr. Burns asked them to rush for Canon Breen and also for doctors. "I placed Mr. O'Higgins' hands together and recited an Act of Contrition, but he was unable to repeat it after me," said Mr. Burns. He was kneeling frightfully from the head and appeared to be in great pain. "After a short time he rallied, and said, 'My enemies! My enemies!' Then he asked, 'Can the priest look into my eyes?'
"Mr. O'Higgins next said to me: 'Give the contents of my clothes to Prof. MacNeill, and make sure that he gives them to my wife, and also all the papers and the contents of a press in my house.'
"That was the last remark he made before I left. When Canon Breen arrived I raised Mr. O'Higgins' eye-lids, and Mr. O'Higgins recognised him. His head was constant, above all, in devotion to the Irish people, whose humble servant it

was his proud ambition to be. The same unflinching vision carried him through the dismal hours when he made a weary pilgrimage through the country, hunted, turned from many a door where he sought refuge, to return triumphant from his long and dangerous mission with an amazing contribution to the sinews of war at the height of the Anglo-Irish struggle, bore him again through the time of invaluable co-operation in capturing the then foreign stronghold of local government guided him through the disheartening days of the Treaty debates, and after enabled him to see through and beyond the agony of the civil war, an led him at last to the opportunity of constructive statesmanship, where he laid foundations which will endure while the State endures. As he stood out in fearless and inflexible determination in every step and measure which appeared necessary for the establishment of peace and ordered liberty, his clear purpose found expression in every branch of the administrative work which was his special charge as Minister for Justice. If it be true, as has been said, that the prestige and credit of a country depend more upon its administration of justice than upon any other single test, then what does not this country owe to the Minister for Justice, with its courts enjoying the confidence of all the citizens, its unarmed Gardaí respected throughout the land, the whole administration of the law functioning without reproach? With all that he had accomplished and for all the cold determination and iron will which seemed to the public to be his principal characteristics, Kevin O'Higgins was essentially modest, because essentially sincere. He had in a high degree that self-command which showed so wonderfully in those last terrible moments. But to those of us who were privileged to be admitted to a more intimate acquaintance with the man, there was revealed a softness, a charm, and a tenderness which made him the more dear to us, as we knew what he must have suffered in answering himself to give what was required of him by his lofty ideal of public duty.

The crime which has been committed is grievous beyond words. We are bereft of a valiant, loyal, steadfast, of rare ability; the nation is robbed of a statesman invaluable in counsel, of unswerving purpose, who knew not fear or weakness, a very exemplar of public virtue. This crime has not been committed by private individuals against Kevin O'Higgins. It is the political assassination of a pillar of the State. It is the fruit of the steady, persistent attack against the State and its fundamental institutions. On the heads of those who have devoted their energies to the direction of that attack lies the blood guilt. This crime will fall in its object. We will meet this form of terrorism as we meet other forms, and we shall not falter until every vestige of it is wiped out from the land.
What shall I say of the crime against the home, the wife, the infant children, and the mother and sisters and brothers of our murdered colleague? There are some things too sacred to debate in a public assembly, and I dare not intrude upon that sorrow and drag it into the public view. Indeed, it is not within the compass of ordinary speech. "I can only pray," he concluded, "that you, sir, will convey from this Dail a humble and reverent message of our heartfelt deep sympathy."
Messrs. Johnson, Reimond, Cooper, Vaughan, etc., joined in the vote of sympathy in pathetic speeches.
In the Senate eloquent tributes to the memory of the murdered Minister were also made.
From every district in the Free State as well as from every Government in the world, messages of sympathy have come to President Cosgrave which voice in a whole-hearted manner the feelings of sorrow which have been caused by the terrible outrage.
On Monday evening and Tuesday the remains were lying in State at the Mansion House and people came in thousands to have a last look at the dead Statesman.
On Wednesday there was Requiem Office and High Mass at St. Andrew's Church, Westland Row, for the repose of his soul at which Most Rev. Dr. Byrne, Archbishop of Dublin, presided. Subsequently his funeral took place to Glasnevin.

"There are, and will be, men, emboldened by the noble example of the late Vice-President, and, profiting by his hours, ready to step into his place, and to maintain his high tradition of devotion to the welfare and safety of the nation."

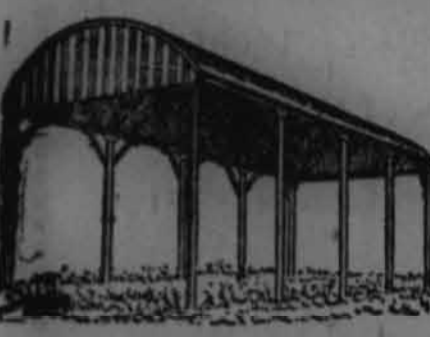
