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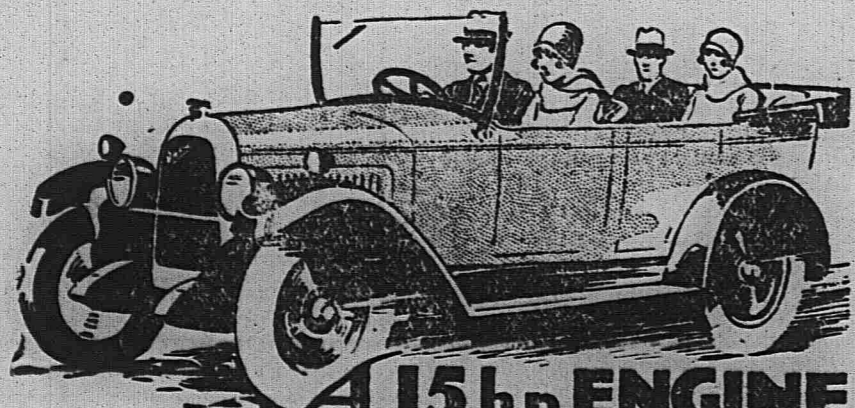

YOUGHAL MEDAL HURLING TOURNAMENT.

The draw for the above took place at Youghal on Monday. The tournament has been organised by Gaels with the praise-worthy object of assisting the good Brothers in their laudable efforts to provide a suitable playground for the boys attending their schools. Hitherto they were confined to the closed-in yard attached to the schools. Recognising its unsuitability for the purpose, the Brothers took on themselves the heavy burden of converting a field adjoining the Monastery, which they purchased some time ago, into a recreation ground. To accomplish this a swamp had to be drained, levelled and fenced around; a playshed erected, water laid on, and a dangerous wall levelled and rebuilt. An interesting history attaches to the site of the new playground, it being in former years a boat and ship-building yard. One of the last contracts completed there was the building and launching of a 150-ton schooner. In 1858 the ground was occupied by a salt house. The site is an ideal one for the purpose, overlooking the harbour and ocean, right up against the wall of the Brothers' residence, and with only the road-strand street separating it from the schools.

It is now over 70 years since the Brothers were brought to Youghal by the then parish priest. Their house on Marina Terrace was the residence of a well-known Youghal gentleman, Samuel Green, Esq., and in 1858 it was secured for the community by the Rev. Thomas England, C.C. The adjoining house on the terrace was originally intended as a residence for the local clergy, and it was finally let and the rent devoted to the benefit of the Brothers. Up to a few years ago an annual collection was made in their aid. That and other sources of revenue ceased, the project of the new playground was a very serious undertaking, involving a big outlay. This fact was brought to the notice of some local Gaels, with a suggestion that a hurling tournament would greatly help. Seeing that the playground would contribute to the development of our national pastimes locally, the idea was taken up by the local Gaels. Hence the present tournament.

Mr. Eamonn Fleming, Middleton, vice-chairman Cork County Board, presided at the draw. The members of the committee present were—Messrs. J. Hennessy, U.D.C.; Wm. L. O'Keeffe, D. J. Linehan, U.D.C.; hon. treas.: R. Swaine, Michael Geary, M. H. Walsh, P.C.; Town Clerk, D. Sliney, C. Terry, Jack Murphy, hon. secretary; and H. F. Bowen, assistant hon. secretary. Mr. M. O'Sullivan, G.A.A., Cork, was also present.

The result of the draw was as follows:—Fr. Matthew Hall v. Redmonds; Sarsfields v. Middleton; Blackrock v. Eire (Oge, Carrigrohilly v. St. Finbarr).

Mr. Murphy proposed a vote of congratulation to the Cork team on their victory at Dungan last Sunday. Having witnessed the match, he was pleased to be able to say that it was a really splendid game.

This was seconded by Mr. O'Keeffe and passed.

The Chairman said as representing the County Board, it afforded him very great pleasure to come amongst the Youghal Gaels to help them in their praiseworthy efforts to assist the good Brothers in providing a suitable playground for the rising young Gaels of Youghal. On behalf of the Board, he gratefully acknowledged their vote of congratulation to the footballers of Cork. For some time past football in Cork was at a very low ebb, but this year it had got a wonderful fillip, with the result that they had now annexed a double Munster final. This proved that the old game was now, once again, reclaiming the attention it deserved in the premier County. He confidentially looked forward to their fellow-countrymen achieving greater success in the future. He was pleased to see that old veteran Geel, Mr. O'Sullivan, amongst them there that day, helping them in the good work they had on hand, and he was sure they would have the heartiest co-operation of the many friends and their old teachers, the Christian Brothers, all over the county. It was an augury of success to have a Gael like Mr. O'Sullivan with them in their project, and his co-operation would be an incentive to them all to do everything in their power to make the tournament the huge success it deserved. DR. GRATTAN FLOOD DEAD.

DISTINGUISHED IRISH MUSICIAN AND WRITER

We regret to announce the death of Chevalier William Henry Grattan Flood, Mus. Doc., which occurred on Monday last at his residence, Rosemount, Ennisclorthy. The deceased was a distinguished figure in the Irish musical world, and his talent had earned for him renown beyond the confines of his country. For a long period he rendered invaluable service in the encouragement of native music talent, and in the preservation of folk songs, which would otherwise, in all probability, have been lost to future generations.

Born in 1850, he was a son of the late Mr. William Flood, of Cusmore, Co. Waterford. He received his early education at Lismore College, subsequently proceeding to Mount Mellary All Hallows (Dublin), and the Catholic University. Since the year 1885 he acted as organist of the Ennisclorthy Cathedral. He was a member of a number of societies and organisations and was Vice-President of the Irish Folk Song Society. During the Apostolic Procession which led to the beatification of Ven. John Oliver Plunkett in 1908 he gave evidence, and during the Celtic Congress of 1910, held at Brussels, he was appointed President of the music section.

His staunch Catholicity, coupled with his remarkable energy and talent evoked to an unusual degree the approbation of successive pontiffs, and he was rightly very proud of the fact that he was a knight of St. George, and that he received a jubilee medal from Pope Pius X. and a gold medal from Pope Benedict XV. and the special coveted honour of the Cross Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice, which was conferred on him in 1917. When the National Academy of Ireland was established in 1922, he was a foundation member.

He possessed a most facile pen and published from time to time a number of books, and contributed to periodicals at home and abroad. Of late years the "Cork Examiner" printed many interesting articles from his pen and since the establishment of the broadcasting service in the Free State he gave several brief talks over the microphone. His knowledge of the history of music in Ireland in particular, was unusually extensive, and he was ever ready to hear without to the brilliant Irishmen whose work did not always receive the recognition to which its merit entitled it.

His books included the following:—History of Ennisclorthy; History of Irish music; Story of the Harp; Story of the Bagpipe; John Field of Dublin; and history of the Diocese of Fermus; The Catholic Encyclopedia; Grove's Dictionary of Music; and the Dictionary of National Biography, numbered him among their contributors, while in 1909 he was co-editor of De Annis Hiberniae. In 1910 he was responsible for an edition of Moore's Irish melodies and in 1911 he edited the Spirit of the Nation.

His death removes a man who filled a very honourable position in Irish life, and all who have any idea of his work will realise what a loss he is to the country.
