DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL.

The weekly meeting of the above was held on Friday, Mr. M. J. Curran presided. Also present—Messrs. J. Moloney, J. Butler, J. Hackett, D. Dee, T. McCarthy, M. Griffin, T. Power and J. Curran.

Finance.
Payments passed for the week were: General account, £10 2s. 5d.; grant account, £50 2s. 1d.

No Extra Lights.
Mr. Griffin raised the question of the light for King's street, Abbey-side. Mr. Curran—I am against taking a light from the Square.

Mr. Hackett—Who gets the benefit of the Square light?
Mr. Curran—The locality.
Mr. Hackett—It is the opinion of several members that the Square light is not necessary.

Mr. McCarthy—Why was the light put there at all?
Mr. Butler—I saw the Square light with other members and the unanimous decision was that the light was not needed. I propose that the light on the Square opposite Mr. Cooney's be discontinued, and that the same light be put up at King's street, Abbey-side. I would point out that when we were considering the estimate we decided that no new work or new lights should be considered, and to be consistent I would not agree that a new light should be put up at King's street.
Mr. Curran—The Chairman made it clear to us at the last meeting that the residents on the Square were against the taking away of this light. I think we should consider these people's wishes.

Chairman—It is the council who are to decide whether a light will be discontinued or not.
Mr. McCarthy—I do not live on the Square, but I think that the people who live there are the best judges, and they should have a say in the matter. I am against taking a light from the Square, but I am not opposed to a light at King's street, Abbey-side.
Chairman—I agree with Mr. Butler, the members of the council who saw

the Square light agreed it was not required.

Mr. Dee—I am also against taking a light from the Square, but I am in favour of one at Abbey-side.

Mr. Power—I am also against taking a light from the Square.
Mr. Griffin seconded Mr. Butler's resolution that the light opposite Mr. Cooney's on the Square be discontinued and the same light be put up at King's street.

Mr. Power proposed an amendment that a light be put up at King's street without interfering with any light on the Square or otherwise.

Mr. Butler—If a new light is put up we are departing from our decision when striking the rate.

For the amendment—Messrs. Dee, Power, McCarthy and Curran—4.
Against—Messrs. Butler, Moloney, Griffin, Hackett, Chairman—5.
Mr. Butler—The proposition—Messrs. Butler, Hackett, Griffin, Chairman—4.
Against—Messrs. Moloney, Power, McCarthy, Curran—4.
Mr. Dee did not vote.

The Chairman would not give a casting vote, so the matter fell through.

Mr. Griffin—Nothing will be done for Abbey-side. I propose that all orders in connection with Abbey-side be taken off the books.
Mr. Power—Not at all.
Mr. Griffin—We are like children in the desert here.

Mr. Butler—That is not so.
Mr. Griffin—There is more talk about spending £5 in Abbey-side than spending £100 in Dungarvan.

Town Hall.
The New Bohemian Dance Club were granted the use of the Town Hall for a dance on Friday next.

Thanks.
Mrs. A. Draper thanked the council for their resolution of sympathy on the death of her husband.

Grant Employment.
The L.G.D. wrote stating that the council had not abided by the regulations in connection with the employment of men on the grant work, and therefore they could not advance the grant to the board.
The Borough Surveyor gave a satisfactory explanation to the meeting. He was then instructed to put his ex-

planation in writing and further it to the L.G.D.

Expenditure on Grant.
The Clerk gave the amount of expenditure to date on the grant as £1,123.

The Borough Surveyor, in reply to Mr. Butler, stated that he would have enough money left to carry out the water improvements to the County Home.

Footpath.
The tender of Mr. Fitzgerald to make the new footpath at Abbey-side for a sum of £14 (labour only) was accepted.

Mud.
Mr. Power drew the attention of the council to the way the mud was collected on the quay and then left in heaps. He stated that it was a great hardship on those working on the quay to have to stand in these mud heaps. The matter is to be attended to.

Waterford Motor Tragedy.

MAN KNOCKED DOWN ON ROADSIDE.

Dr. Denis Kennedy, City Coroner, held an inquest at the County and City Infirmary, Waterford, touching the death of a farm labourer named James O'Keefe, who died on Sunday as a result of being knocked down by a motor car during the afternoon at The Sweep.
Supt. Keenan represented the Civic Guards, and Mr. H. D. Keane appeared for Mr. Madders, N.T., Ballyduff, the driver of the car.
Dr. J. J. Hogan, resident medical superintendent, County and City Infirmary, deposed that deceased was admitted about 2 p.m. on the previous day. There was a wound on the base of the skull and he was bleeding from the nose and right ear. He was very weak and unconscious and died at 7 p.m. without rallying and without recovering consciousness. The cause of death was haemorrhage of the brain due to fracture of the skull. The injury was such as would be caused by a hard blow or a severe fall.
Stephen Keeffe, Johnstown, Kil-

meaden, Co. Waterford, a farm labourer, identified the body as that of his brother. He lived at Whitfield, Kilmeaden, and was also a farm labourer. He was aged about 56 years and was single.

To Supt. Keenan—I do not think he suffered from deafness, at least he never complained of that to me, nor did I notice it. He was perfectly normal, always a strong man, and not peculiar in any way.
On behalf of his client, Mr. Keane expressed deep sympathy with the witness in the unfortunate death of his brother through the sad fatality.
Supt. Keenan also joined.

Mr. Andrew Madders deposed—At about 1.50 p.m. on Sunday I was on my way to Waterford driving a motor car, having also in the car Mr. Michel, J. Creagh and Mr. Stephen White, together with my own son. When coming round a bend below the Pike at Whitfield I was driving on the left-hand side of the road. I saw and recognised James Keeffe about 30 or 40 yards ahead of me on the road. He was walking on the left-hand side also between the centre of the road and the left-hand margin. I turned my car across to the right-hand side of the road in order to pass him by. When within about eight or ten yards of him he suddenly darted across the road to his right, in the direction of my car. I immediately swerved my car still further to the right, and straight for the ditch to avoid him. I struck the ditch, the car rebounded. I still held on to the wheel and steadied the car. It turned back into the road and I immediately stopped it. At that time I was absolutely certain I had not gone within feet of the deceased; that I had avoided him by a decent margin. We got out of the car, and when I went round the back of the car I saw James Keeffe lying on the road. We went over to him and raised him up. A lady came on the scene, Miss Power, of Powersknock, who is a trained nurse, and she attended to him as far as she could. We took the deceased straight to the infirmary, and drove the first Civic Guard Barrack on our way, where I reported the occurrence.
To Supt. Keenan—I knew the deceased all my life. I would agree with his brother, he was not suffering from deafness. I heard he was at times a
