Lismore Library.

Chairman—I saw a letter in the Press that the Lismore Library is closed, and yet we have a number of payments to make to-day for supplying papers, etc.

Mr. O'Shea—The libraries at Lismore, Tallow, Ballyduff and Cappoquin are functioning, but the books are not being circulated from Lismore. No library is closed.

Mr. Heskin—We should ask the Appointments Commissioners to make a permanent appointment at Lismore.

Mr. McGrath said they were paying 1d. in the £ in Lismore area for the libraries and got no value.

Mr. O'Gorman—The only persons at fault are the Appointments Commissioners. Two names were suggested and the two men went to Dublin for examination. They were led to believe Mr. Mills got the appointment, but he had not got it yet. The Appointments Commissioners are doing the dog in the manger. They won't make the appointment or leave the Library Committee to do it. The library is open, but the books are not circulated. If the appointment was made things would go on as before.

PP. formulated a scheme that all books be catalogued and indexed. As to the appointment of Librarian, two men went to Dublin and one was sent for a medical and dental examination.

Mr. Heskin—Fearing he would eat anyone.

Mr. O'Gorman said the Library Committee had been increased by the committee, and he asked had they or the County Council the right to do so. The library is only used as a reading room at present.

Chairman—Why would not the temporary librarian issue books?

Mr. O'Shea—The Library Committee made an order that he was not to do so until a permanent appointment was made.

Mr. Stack—If they knew Irish it would be all right. The applicants had no Irish and were turned down. They have no Irish up there and that's the trouble.

A resolution was then passed asking that the acting librarian carry out the duties of his predecessor.

Chips for Cappoquin.

A petition was read from the residents of Mass Lane, Cappoquin, to have a concrete path made outside their houses.

Mr. Bowen—We have no money and can do nothing.

Mr. M. F. Walsh—Would there be any chance of striking a small rate to cover the expense?

Mr. Hallahan—If you do that I will want the same at my place.

Mr. O'Gorman—The County Surveyor said he would do it at 2s. 6d. a foot for the people, which is very

cheap.

Mr. Brennock—What is the good of asking people in tenement houses to pay it?

Mr. Bowen—You have no power to strike a local rate. It must be on the county at large.

It was decided to put chips on the place in question.

Mr. John Kiersey was appointed representative of the council on the Board of University College, Cork.

Local Appointments. In connection with a query from the County Councils General Council re above, Mr. Butler suggested that where a local man was qualified for position his name should be sent on.

Where a county man was qualified he should get the job.

Mr. Heskin agreed and said it was not right to appoint an outsider when they had qualified candidates at home.

Mr. Brennock said the idea of the Government in the matter originally was political. At present there was very little use for the Appointments Commission at all, as in every appointment they have to make a statement of allegiance to the State. When that is done the people on the spot are the proper judges of the person to be appointed to a position. They are as disinterested as anyone else, and only appoint the most worthy candidates, so there is no room for the Appointments Commissioners now. He then proposed the following resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Walsh, and passed:—"That we respectfully submit that the time has arrived when

we can dispense with the service of the Appointments Commission. The members of our council can be implicitly relied upon to appoint only on merit to any office in our gift, and that they will not be swayed by any consideration, political or otherwise, than merit alone."
