The pavilion at the east end, next the chcir chapel, has an entrance doorway enclosed by a porch construc-ted of pitch pine, with the upper panels glazed with leaded lights corresponding with the surrounding glass day. The cloister connecting the two payrlions Mr. Keane did not cross-examine. is formed of seven bays, divided by He asked to have accused let out on piers with clustered columns carrying moulded plaster arches, and the ceiling of each bay is groined, vaulted in arches formed in the existing wall of the public chapel, giving complete connection between the public chapel and the present cloister. The cloister is lighted by two-light tracery windows, set in wrought limestone and glazed with leaded lights, the whole produc-ing a most artistic effect and diffusing a soft and subdued light throughout the pretty cloister. The floor of the cloister is laid with wood blocks as far as the portion intended for service with the public chapel, the remaining portion being laid with pitch pine flooring, and the woodwork throughout is also constructed with pitch pine. beautifully moulded and finished in accordance with the architect's designs. Externally over the cornice of the cloister are six pinnacles crowning the buttresses, all beautifully, panelled and carved in limestone. The gables and the parapet ceilings are in chiselled limestone, finished with moulded and carved limestone crosses which set off the entire work in a most graceful and attractive manner.

The architects of the work were Messrs. Jones and Kelly, South Frederick street, Dublin, while the entire contract has been executed by Messrs. 


SERIOUS ACCIDENT..

Our beautifully finished main road, which has been taken over by the county, and which appeared and promised to be such a boon, has proved to be a bit too perfect from some points of view. In wet weather the surface is so glassy and slippery that it has turned out to be a bit awkward for or-dinary horse and cattle traffic. In fact it has been categorically stated at several meetings of the Urban Council that many country people are afraid to come into town and risk their animals, which find it difficult to negotiate the too smooth surface. "LET THERE BE LIGHT." During the present week mechanics of the Electricity Supply Board have been busy in erecting poles to carry the overhead cables for the supply of electric light to the town from the Shannon Scheme, and it is expected that the lighting scheme will be in full working order before next winter. The poles, which resemble telegraph poles, are being erected along the north side of Barrack street, and the south side of the Main street, so as not to interfere with the telephone wires which run along the north side of this street from the post office. A number of local labourers are employed in the work of excavation for the poles at a wage of 36s. per week, which has proved a great boon at a time when employment in other branches is very scarce indeed. The lighting of our town by electricity will prove a great boon, when it becomes an accomplished fact, and will be a welcome improvement on the sickly oil lamps which at present "illumine" our streets, but which only tend to intensify the darkness between them, despite all the ingenious efforts of Paddy Dineen, our local lamplighter, to make them shed a more brilliant light into the more shady corners of the town.

LANDMARK REMOVED.

On Friday last the interesting ceremony of removing the chimney stack at the Gas Works Yard, Dungarvan, was witnessed by a big number of citizens. The spacious yard of the Gas Works is now in the occupation of the County Council and is to be used as safe storage for the council's machinery and plant, and in order to have it properly laid out all the old buildings. gas tanks, etc., are being removed and sheds erected in their place. For many years a substantial chimney stack over 60 feet high has conveyed to the upper elements the waste gases of the concern, but as it was in the way it was considered expedient to remove it, and on Friday most orthodox style banished it for ever in a shorter time than it takes to tell it. It was a substantial well-built shaft of brick fortified with granite slabs. Mr. Bowen had five holes bored in the pillars of the shaft, and into these he put 4lbs, gelignite. The fuses were then connected with a small infernal machine quite convehient, and from that machine a long cable was laid. All being in readiness, the ground cleared, and our worthy citizen, Mr. Keohan, having taken a last "snap" of the doomed landmark, the man at the end of the cable pressed a button, an explosion was heard and simultaneously the chimney stack bent over, and by a graceful gliding movement lay prone on the ground-a mass of brick and mortar-on the very spot which Mr. Bowen had marked out as its due destination and to the grief of the jackdaws, whose home it was. It was a bit of work neatly executed and was quite a masterpiece of destruction. It would be a great boon to the country if some such engine of construction existed, so that houses, bridges, chimneys, etc., could be nicely erected on the ground and then holibed into position. But we will come to that some day.


