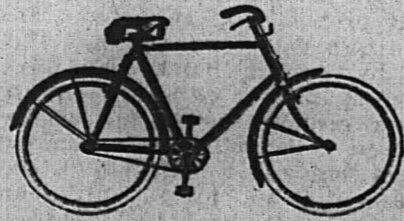
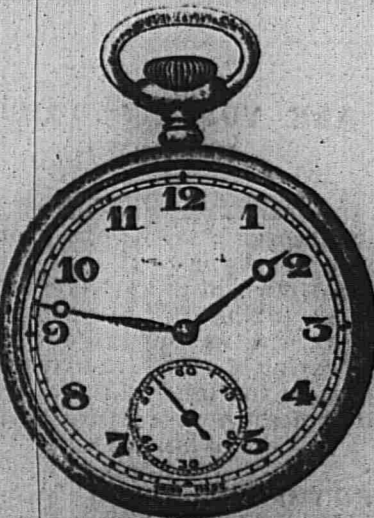

Local Happenings.

SERIOUS ASSAULT AT RING. On St. Patrick's morning a dispute arose between two men named Donovan and Patrick Walsh, employees of Mr. Thomas Hart, Gort-naidha Ring, and as a result Walsh was beaten and injured by Donovan in so serious a manner that he was rendered unconscious and had to be removed to the District Hospital, Dungarvan, where he still lies under the care of Dr. Hackett and in a precarious condition. He is still unconscious. Donovan was subsequently arrested in connection with the matter, and being brought before a Peace Commissioner, was remanded in custody.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY. The Feast of the National Apostle passed off quietly and peacefully. The day was gloriously fine and a warm sun shone out all the day. The Brass and Reed Band held a parade to the Parish Church at 11 o'clock at which High Mass was celebrated, Rev. L. Egan, C.C., being celebrant; Rev. M. F. Heurne, deacon, and Rev. P. F. McGrath, C.C., sub-deacon. After Mass the band played a selection of National airs on the Square and later the National Anthem. Later the Boys' Club Pipe and Drum Band paraded the town and Abbeyside and rendered a choice selection of appropriate music. The Ballinafad Pipe and Drum Band also visited the town and gave a nice selection of airs during their stay. On Sunday evening a special sermon on St. Patrick was preached by Rev. M. F. Heurne, C.C., and at St. Augustine's by Rev. P. Donegan, O.S.A. The churches on the occasion were thronged.

DEATH OF MRS. POWER (LATE OF DUNGARVAN). The death occurred in Dublin on Sunday last at Mrs. Power, formerly of Dungarvan, where she carried on a general business. Her remains arrived from Dublin by the 8.30 train on Monday evening, and were removed to the Parish Church. She was sister of Mrs. Cunningham and Miss Coghlan, Abbeyview. The interment took place in the Parish Graveyard on Tuesday. R.I.P.

WORRYING SHEEP.—A HEAVY FINE. At Kilmacthomas Court on Wednesday, before Mr. McCabe, D.J., Mrs. Claxton, Millertown, and David Galvin, do., were decreed for £4 in respect of a suit by Thos. Flynn, Stradbally, for £5 for two sheep, his property, alleged to be killed by defendants' dogs. Mr. Farrell, solr., for Flynn, and Mr. Ryan, solr., for Mrs. Claxton. Flynn said he had five sheep grazing at Millertown and Jas. Sheehan was looking after them and he told him it was Claxton's and Galvin's dogs did the damage. One sheep, value £4, was killed, and the second, value £3, was mutilated. Mrs. Claxton agreed if her dog was responsible to pay £3 15s. for the dead sheep. J. Sheehan said young Kiely told him he saw defendants' dog tearing the sheep. Paddy Kiely said he saw Flynn's sheep chased by Claxton's dog. The dog was about six months old. Guard Murray said Mrs. Claxton told him she destroyed the dog. It seemed about three months old. Robert Claxton said he keeps 300 sheep and the pup never interfered with them.
