

DASTARDLY BURGLARY.

MAYO REFUSES TO APPONT IBRARIAN RECOMMENDED BY-THE COMMISSONERS.

THE COMMISSONERS.

For some weeks past a serious dispute has been going on between the Mayo County Council and the Appointments Commissioners. For the position of County Librarian the Comsioners recommended to the County Council the appointment of a Miss Dunbar, a Graduate of Trinity College, a Protestant, and a lady who had not a thorough knowledge of Irish. The Library Committee and the Co. Council refused to appoint the lady though called upon by the Minister of Local Government to do so. Then the Minister ordered a sworn inquiry into the failure of the Mayo County Council to do their work, and this being done, he gave the County Council a last chance before abolishing them by calling on them to hold a special meeting of the council and appoint the lady.

Last Saturday the special meeting morning he rang the bell for Mass.

She had passed oral and written examinations in Irish, had spent her holidays in the Gaeltacht for the past five years, and had done prac-

catholic. She had passed oral and written examinations in Irish, had spent her holidays in the Gaeltacht for the past five years, and had done practical work at the Central Catholic Librry. She was aged 25 years last April. He thought it most unfair that a statement should have been made that only four candidates qualified and only two had sufficient Irish.

Mr. M. H. Beet Notes.

This year's beet crop has turned out unexpectedly well, and it is probable that the total tonnage will exceed that of last year. While this is all to the good, as far as the grower is concerned, it means that the Carlow Factors ill have to work at full capacity. tory will have to work at full capacity until the end of January in order to deal with the crop.

A demonstration of mechanical de-

A demonstration of mechanical devices for harvesting and cultivating the beet crop was held recently at Sprowston, near Norwich, in England. According to the accounts we have seen the combined lifters and toppers were not very satisfactory. What did apparently impress all observers was the work of the small motor horse hoe. This implement will cultivate between much narrower drills and by cross-cultivation do away drills and by cross-cultivation do away with the expensive practice of gap-ping and hand-hoeing. The opinion was expressed that on a 20-acre break the cost of the machine would be saved in one season. Another aid which has been developed to a satisfactory standard is the mechanical loader. "Poultry farmers have received about £1,750,000 more for their produce this year than they did in the last twelve months before the introduction of the National Mark scheme," said an official of the Ministry of

The quantity of home-killed beef de-livered at Smithfield Market in 1930

livered at Smithfield Market in 1930 is estimated at more than 38,000 tons compared with 36,200 tons for the year prior to the introduction of the National Mark.

Practically the whole of this meat is accepted for grading, and so fetches 4d. per lb. more than non-graded beef. This represents a gain to the farmers of about £350,000.

UBLIC LAND MEETING IN CAHIR CALLS ON THE COUNTESS OF MUNSTER TO AGITATE FOR DISRIBUTION OF RANCHES.

Local Government and Public Health it is recorded that in the Free State the number of persons in receipt of home assistance on March 31, 1929, was 50,352, or 19.0 per 1,000 of the population. This represents an increase of 2,514 on the previous year. The largest increases occurred in Dublin, Kerry, Waterford, Wexford and Limerick County Borough The principal decreases took place in South Cork, Mayo, Rathdown Union and Kildare.

Loans amounting to £51,467 for the purpse of improvement works were sanctioned during the year, bringing the total since April, 1922, to £335,072. There were altogether 6,973 widows on Home Assistance, including 3,167 without dependent children. The cost of Home Assistance to widows was £118,603.

The number of chilren in County Homes (including Children's Homes) was 1,812, and the number of children boarded out was 1,920. It is now generally agreed that insane and mentally defective persons and also unmarried mothers should not be retained in the County Homes. At the beginning of 1929 there were 778 prsons classed as insane and 785 idiots and imbeciles in the County Homes. Poor Law Authorities were maintaining 970 unmarried mothers with 933 children. 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
