Tender For Bread.

The Board received a deputation from the Waterford Bakers and Confectioners Union regarding the contract for breal which was considered at the meeting of the committee of the Waterford County and city Infirmary. The Committee recommended the ac ceptance of the tender of Mr. Lodge, Tramore, at 5d. provided that the bakers were paid wages in accordance with the Fair Wages Clause.

The spokesman, who put before the meeting documentary proof that Mr Lodge's bread was made by cheap non-union labour asked the Board to accept the next lowest tender Messrs. O'Neill's at 5 1-16d. He stated that the wages paid in Waterford is £4 15s. at 12 sacks per man, while in Tramore the wages paid (for which he had the signed statements of ex-employees of Mr. Lodge) was £2 5s. to £2 10s. per 7 sacks per man.

The Secretary said he had received a letter from Mr. Haughton, Clerk which Mr. Lodge send him and he states that his wages compare favourably with other small towns in the

MACHINE FOR SOWING TURNIPS.

The official statistics for August, 1931, issued by the Industrial and Commercial Property Registration Office, show that in the patents branch the number of new applications received was 73-70 foreign and 3 from the Irish Free State. Complete specifications accepted 45, patents granted 67, patents renewed 223, patents lapsed 177, patents expired 1, applications to register British natents 13. In the trade marks and designs branch the number of applications for registration of new marks received was 79-73 foreign and 6 Irish Free State. Applications accepted and invested 100, trade marks registered 120, applications for registration of new designs received was 10, 8 foreign and 2 Irish Free State, designs registered.

Mr. John Roche, of Tallow, Co. Waterford, described in specification No. 11,084, a machine for sowing turnip and other seeds so that the seeds are spaced at proper distance along the drill and not sown in a thick stream as usually done. The machine is of the chain dredger type and is so arranged that single seeds, say of turnip, may be sown at any suitable interval along the drill. The feature of the machine is the construction of the dredger chain and cups so as to ensure that only one seed at a time passes to the sowing tube.
