


Dungarvan Cow-Testing Association.

The Annual General Meeting of the above was held in the Courthouse, Dungarvan. The following were present:—Messrs. Daniel Dempsey, (President), Rev. Bro. Gibson, Michael Fitzgerald, Patrick Morrissey, John Hickey, James Murphy, and T. Smyth, (Supervisor).

The minutes of the previous meeting having been read, and signed, it was proposed by Mr. Morrissey, seconded by Mr. Fitzgerald, and passed unanimously, that Mr. Daniel Dempsey, be re-elected as President for 1932.

The following members of the Association were elected as members of the Association's Committee.

Rev. Bro. Gibson, M. Fitzgerald, P. Hickey, J. Hennessy, Patk. Flynn, T. Phelan, and Jas. Power.

On the motion of Mr. Dempsey, seconded by Mr. Morrissey, Mr. T. Smyth was unanimously appointed as Supervisor for 12 months.

It was decided to collect the Entry Fees at the rate of 2/- per cow for the year 1932, in two instalments of 1/- each, the first instalment immediately on entry and the second instalment not later than 30th June, 1932.

It was proposed by Mr. Dempsey, and seconded by Rev. Bro. Gibson, and passed unanimously "That the Secretary be directed to convey to Mr. D. J. O'Sullivan, Cow-Testing Instructor, the sincere sympathy of the Association on the death of his mother."

The Supervisor submitted his Annual Report as follows:—

During the year 1931, 183 cows have been under test in your Association, and of this number, complete records are available for 159. The average yield per cow was 6,242 lbs. of milk, and 237.23 lbs. of Butter-fat, with an average Butter-fat Test of 3.82 per cent, an increase of 153 lbs. of milk and 10.49 lbs. of Butter-fat per cow over the 1930 season. Calculating Butter-fat at 4/- per lb. and separated milk at 1d. per gallon, the average earning capacity of each cow was £13 18s. 9d.

The average yield for the ten best cows in the Association was 40,526 lbs. of milk and 403.42 lbs. of Butter-fat, with an average Butter-fat test of 3.84 per cent.

The ten worst cows averaged 2,761 lbs. of milk, 100.20 lbs. of Butter-fat, with an average Butter-fat test of 3.67 per cent.

At the figures given above for Butter-fat and separated milk, the average earning capacity of the ten best cows was £23 13s. 6d., while the ten worst averaged £5 18s. 6d. A difference of £17 15s. 0d., between the earnings of the good and bad cow. From the average Butter-fat tests given, it can be seen that the poor milkers were deficient both in the quality as well as the quantity of milk given.

Taking a summary of all cows on test during the year—73 cows gave less than 6,000 lbs. of milk; 34 cows gave between 6,000 and 7,000 lbs., 19 between 7,000 and 8,000 lbs.; 5 between 8,000 and 9,000 lbs., 8 between 9,000 and 10,000 lbs., and 11 went over the 10,000 mark.

The best cow in the Association for the year was the 8-year-old Registered Dairy Shorthorn Cow "Power II" the property of Mr. Michael Ryan, The Buttery, Dungarvan. This cow yielded 10,850 lbs. of milk and 434.00 lbs. of Butter-fat, with an average Butter-fat test of 4.0 per cent. 4 other cows in Mr. Ryan's herd also yielded over 10,000 lbs., while a number of other cows in the same herd, who have not yet completed their lactation periods, have already passed over 10,000 lbs.

The Christian Brothers herd held the highest average yield in the Association being 9,740 lbs. of milk, with 386.77 lbs. of Butter-fat per cow.

The best heifer in the Association is "Rosie" the property of Mr. Thomas Phelan, Ballyneely, on her first milking, this heifer yielded 9,751 lbs. of milk and 339.33 lbs. of Butter-fat, with an average Butter-fat test of 3.48 per cent.

13 cows were submitted for inspection in 1931, and of these 10 were accepted and placed on the Department's Register of Dairy Cattle.

883 samples of milk were taken and tested during the year and 24 calves were tattooed.

While a fair number of cows have been sold as unprofitable, it is feared that some members are not carrying out the objects of the scheme in so far as the disposing of the poor milkers is concerned. The standard of their herds can never be raised while these unprofitable cows are retained.

Taking it on the whole—the Association has had a satisfactory year's working, and, notwithstanding a decline in the number of cows on test, is in a sound condition.

In conclusion, I would wish to thank the President, and members for the co-operation and courtesy extended to me in the course of my duties.

The Supervisor's Report was unanimously approved.

Mr. White—The Department are finding no fault with this county, but on the contrary, we are quite pleased.

Mr. Curran—The dipping is carried out fairly well for some considerable time.

Mr. Hynes V.S., said owing to scab in the Knockmealdowns last year he suggested making a mountain area of Mellery and unless the order was

compulsory they could not get rid of the scab. They leased a very good tank, and appointed a Mountain ranger.

Chairman—We are getting on all right as we are.

Mr. White, V.S., said they were working illegally.

Mr. Curran—If you want to carry the sheep dipping order out as in the past, you must adopt the order.

Mr. Hynes—The idea of the Department is that every dipping in the Co. should be under supervision.

Mr. Curran—That would mean you should appoint about 10 lay Inspectors.

Mr. Curran—If you have to appoint lay Inspectors to supervise the work it is a very serious matter.

Mr. Hynes V.S., suggested the appointment of Inspectors to issue the Dipping Certificates under the Vety. Officers' supervision.

Mr. Curran—Our arrangement with our Veterinary Surgeons was that all dipping should be under their supervision.

Mr. White—It is hardly fair to expect the Vety. Inspectors to go round and spend a whole day while men are dipping sheep.

Mr. Curran—We have adopted this order subject to certain modifications and it will come up before us at the next meeting.

The matter then ended.

FIANNA FAIL MEETING AT WATERFORD.

The message of peace and goodwill was the keynote struck by all speakers at a big Fianna Fail meeting in Waterford to celebrate the return of the two sitting members at the recent election.

The Mayor (Alderman Jones), who presided, stated that Fianna Fail had not only retained their two seats in Waterford, but had increased their poll by four thousand.

Mr. Sean Goulding, T.D. re-echoed the appeal made by the Mayor "There is no use in bitterness," he said "We have said hard things about Free masons, but they deserved it, though there are good men who are not of the Catholic Faith in Ireland."

Mr. P. J. Little, T.D., said they had not at their disposal the friends or money of their opponents; but they had done good work in Waterford.

The original route of the procession fixed included Barack street and Ballybricken, two Redmonte strong holds, but at the request of Venerable Archdeacon Byrne, P.P., Ballybricken this portion of the city was eliminated from the processional route.

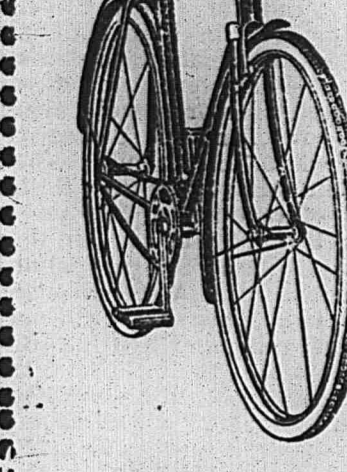
