Insurance Policy Dispute

NEIGHBOURS AT LAW.

At the Dungarvan Court on Wednesday, before Mr. J. S. Troy, D.J.

Mr. J. J. Larkin, Insurance Agent, sued Mrs. Mary Fahy, Ballymacmague, for 17/- insurance premiums, alleged to be paid on policy for her.

Mr. Farrell, solr., for the plaintiff; and Mr. E. A. Ryan, solr., for defendant.

Mr. Ryan said his client did not want to have anything to do with Larkin for very good reasons and repudiated any liability under the policy. She wanted it to lapse. If plaintiff paid the premiums, he did it at his own risk.

Mr. Larkin said in February, 1932, Mrs. Fahy came to him about an insurance policy. They debated the matter and later he brought a prospectus which she signed in his presence. The policy was on her mother's life. She requested him not to tell her mother that she had taken out the policy. She paid about four premiums on this policy. They had an arrangement about the premiums. She said she would come to the house with them, but she did not. When asked for the premiums she made excuses about her husband being out of work, and she asked not to leave the policy lapse, so he paid up the premiums, about 16/- or 17/-.

Mr. Ryan—We want to know the definite amount you paid.

Witness—There is only 4/- of the money entered that was paid by Mrs. Fahy. Witness sent letters to Mrs. Fahy asking her to pay the premiums, but she always said she had not the money and would see witness himself.

By Mr. Ryan—There is an action for slander pending on both sides. She alleged that I said she was a woman of bad character. She had not to complain to witness about the conduct of his children. There were summonses pending against him and his children. He did not suggest to her to take out the policy. It was not true that since June last Mrs. Fahy was persecuted by him and his children. Witness said he did not produce a gun on December 3rd, as he never had a gun, and he did not say to Mrs. Fahy that he never gave five months in jail for robbery. She ceased paying the premium in June. The payment on Feb. 22nd, was the only payment she made. Witness had no recollection of Mrs. Fahy complaining his children's conduct to him. There was no ill-feeling between them in June. Witness sent his children and his workman with the messages in view of the fact that she had asked him not to let her mother know. Witness's children never went down to the door shouting—“Where's the money you owe my daddy.” He wrote to her in August, pointing out that the arrears were 9/-. When he saw she was not going to pay he allowed the policy to lapse.

The Justice referring to two letters handed in asked if it after these letters you paid up the arrears.

Witness—I might have paid one or two after that.

Justice—It is quite obvious that the witness is keeping something back.

The witness said that he wrote other letters, but only these two are produced. He did not keep copies of the letters.

In reply to Mr. Ryan, witness said he never reported that she stole a hay knife from him. He reported that he missed a hay knife. He had since received it back. He did not know if the knife was found in her haggard in a sheaf of corn. He only reported the matter to the Garda, but the case was not brought on. He had his arm up for sale. He did not know the date of the next Circuit Court in Dungarvan. He would not answer if he was a policeman in Liverpool as it had no bearing on the case.

To the Justice—He did explain to Mrs. Fahy in other letters that in order to keep the policy alive he had paid premiums himself, but these letters are not produced.

Mr. Farrell referred to all the charges made by Mr. Ryan and said they embraced every form of crime, bringing a gun around, planting a hay knife in this woman's haggard and slandering her character.

Witness—I deny all these charges. Prior to June they were the best of neighbours. The policy was the start of the row. Witness had a slander action pending against Mrs. Fahy and her mother. That action is coming on in April.

A workman named Glavin, employed by Mr. Larkin, said he remembered going to Mrs. Fahy with a letter which he delivered. The reply he got was that she had no money now and that she would see himself during the week. Witness never annoyed Mrs. Fahy.

By Mr. Ryan—He was present at the row in December. Mr. Larkin was not very excited, and witness was not shocked at what he said. It is very hard to shock me (laughter). He heard nothing about a gun. He was sent with messages about four times altogether. I did not know that there was trouble between Mrs. Fahy and Mr. Larkin over his children. I know the knife was taken and that it was found in a sheaf of oats, but I do not know who put it there.

Mrs. M. Fahy, said that she lived a few yards away from Mr. Larkin. They were friendly up to June, 1932. Witness took out the insurance policy and she paid two four shillings and one five shillings on it which he received. Mr. Larkin had the book up to June. The children were throwing stones and her mother went to tell Mr. Larkin to stop them. She left the policy lapse in June as she did not

want to have anything further to do with that man. The children were always throwing stones and knocking the door. The letters were delivered by his eldest child. He produced a gun to her mother on December, 3rd, but witness did not see it. On last Sunday evening Glavin spilled a 40 gallon drum of water in the yard and the children damaged clothes (produced) with a knife.

By Mr. Farrell—She never gave a reply to Mr. Larkin's children when they came with the letters. Glavin never came with a letter. She denied giving any instructions to Larkin to keep the policy, as she was well able to pay the premium. Her husband was not working, but was in receipt of unemployment benefit. She admit making the request to Larkin not to tell her mother of the policy.

The Justice dismissed the case.
