A BRILLIANT IRISHMAN. Prior to that he had held appointments in the British Diplomatic Service at Cuba, Washington and Copenhagen, and but for his early death would have reached higher points in the Diplomatic world.

URBAN HOUSING.

The Dungarvan Urban Council have accepted the tender of Mr. O'Reilly, Clonmel, to erect 86 houses at the new site at Lougmore, adjoining the Co. Home. This scheme will fill a big want in the Urban area by supplying first-class houses to numbers of people who heretofore lived in dwellings that were time and again condemned by the Medical Officers as unfit for human habitation. They will be let at reasonable rents. The Urban Council have done their work carefully and well and deserve well of the public for their actions in the matter of Housing. In the past few years they have reformed the suburbs and made picturesque with charming houses areas that heretofore were eyesores and a reflection on the Municipality. Only one small matter has been left undone, and that is not the fault of the Urban Council as they did their best to set it right and failed. We refer to the unsightly, derelict spaces here and there on which houses could have been built and so make a harmonious whole, but a scheme to carry out that work would not be approved, but later on when the Lougmore site is completed it is quite possible that houses will be passed for erection on the sites referred to and so make the suburban area a perfect picture.

I. R. A. DEBATE IN DAIL. MINISTER OF JUSTICE REPLIES. The question of illegal arming and drilling in the Free State was discussed in the Dail last week during the Vote for the maintenance of the Civic Guards, and the Minister for Justice, took the opportunity of outlining the policy of the Free State Executive Council on the matter. Mr. Fitzgerald Kenny, K.C., remarking that the most serious matter which arose from the Estimates for the Civic Guards was that of illegal drilling, said:— "The way in which the Minister for Justice is discharging the duty which is imposed upon him of seeing that the law is obeyed in this country and of seeing that the law is not being openly flouted by anyone—and that is a duty which the Minister for Justice is shirking at the present time—can be discussed on this Vote."
