### YOUGHAL NOTES.

#### TECHNICAL CLASSES.

The local Technical Classes are now  
in full swing and promise to be a big  
success for the Session. The Voca-  
tional Day Classes are full to the limit.  
As a matter of fact, the pupils are a bit  
uncomfortably crusted in the space  
at disposal. At present Messrs. Mur-  
ray & Sons, Contractors are busily en-  
gaged erecting an additional room to  
the School Building. This, it is hoped,  
will relieve the congestion somewhat.  
The evening classes have attracted a  
goodly number of students, the Irish  
class and others having to be divided  
up to enable the teachers handle them  
satisfactorily. The very important  
branches of Cookery and Domestic  
Science are under the charge of a  
most competent instructor, who con-  
ducts both day and evening classes.  
This provision was made specially to  
enable all desirous of registering to  
avail of her tuition. It appears there is  
room for a small additional number  
in these classes, and those who wish  
to profit by this excellent opportunity  
should join up at once, as otherwise  
they will miss the lessons in the open-  
ing stages of the subjects.

#### NEW BUILDINGS.

Several new buildings on the Strand  
and elsewhere have been completed re-  
cently; others are at present in the  
course of construction and it is au-  
thoritatively stated, there are a num-  
ber of others in contemplation in the  
near future. The most important of  
these is, of course, in connection with  
the conversion of the present Cottage  
Hospital—the old Workhouse—into an  
annexe of St. Raphael Mental Hospi-  
tal, and the provision of a new Cot-  
tage Hospital. The ten new houses for  
the Housing Scheme on the Gas Works  
Site are approaching completion,  
being ready for roofing. A curious  
crux has arisen in this connection. The  
Contractor is required to use Irish  
slates in roofing the houses, but they  
allege it is impossible to get them. The  
Urban Council appear inclined, if not  
determined, to insist upon Irish slates,  
but where's the good of insisting upon  
what you can't get. If they stick to  
this policy, it will only mean consid-  
erable delay in the completion of the  
scheme and leaving the unroofed  
buildings to the tender mercies of the  
weather, which can't always be fine.

#### RECORD SEASON.

The season just ended has been one  
of the best on record. It brought to  
mind the seasons of the good old days  
of the past before the introduction of  
excursion trains, motor cars, and  
buses, when visitors began to come  
and stay for periods ranging from a  
week to a month, beginning in the  
merry month of May, and keeping on  
coming and going up to the end of  
September. This year visitors driven  
by the magnificent weather that has  
prevailed almost throughout, with  
very little break—and that only of very  
short duration, a day or so at a time,  
have spent a holiday at Youghal up to  
the end of last month. It only proves  
that grand fine weather, people will  
take a holiday, if at all possible, and a  
large crowd will patronise the old  
town by the Blackwater and the sea.  
The crowds that trooped in on excu-  
sion days were eloquent evidence as to  
the popularity of Youghal. The  
crush during the August Bank Holi-  
day week-end was a "stunner." The  
"Sea Breeze" trains, started for the  
first time towards the end of the pre-  
vious season proved a big success, in-  
duced by the closing down of the  
Coak, Blackrock and Passage line.  
Taking everything all round into con-  
sideration, the summer season of 1933  
will take quite a beating.

MARKETS AND PRICES

By AN EXPERT. CATTLE.

In the Free State yearlings made from £4 to £6; in Northern Ireland made from £8 to £10 and in England £10 to £12.

Year and a half old in the Free State £6 to £8; in Northern Ireland £10 to £12 and in England £12 to £15; two-year-olds in the Free State £7 to £9; in Northern Ireland £12 to £15 and in England £14 to £16.

Three-year-olds in the Free State £10 to £12; in Northern Ireland £14 to £17 and in England £16 to £19. Fat Cattle—Under the rationing system and with the cooler weather the price of beef is expected to improve in the near future.

The average price on the Free State markets ran from 20/- to 23/- per cwt. live weight; on the Northern markets from 35/- to 38/- and on the English from 43/- to 47/-.

Sheep and Lambs—Demand for sheep and lambs was not so active as last week, but prices were fairly well maintained. The market is expected to improve as the weather for some time past was against the trade.

Milk Cows.—Trade for milk cows was not so active as on previous markets. This was occasioned by the extra number of cows on offer and also by the increased supplies of milk owing to the rain.

Pigs.—The market for pigs suffered a severe set-back during the week and prices dropped considerably on many markets. The condition of the bacon market did not warrant this drop.

Butter.—Exports of butter from the Free State are now stopped except under licence. There was a lot of bungling over the handling of butter in this country for the past six months and a loss of at least a quarter of a million must be made; this of course has to be made good by the taxpayers.

There was no improvement in prices at the October fair, held at Ballybricken on Monday. Of medium dimensions, it was composed almost of Shorthorn types of cattle, with a few lots of blacks.

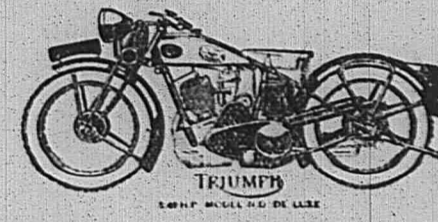

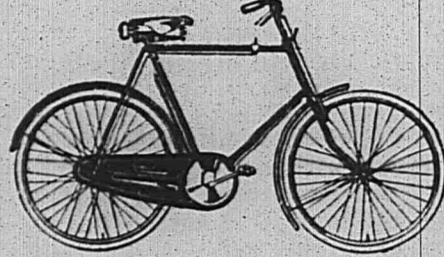

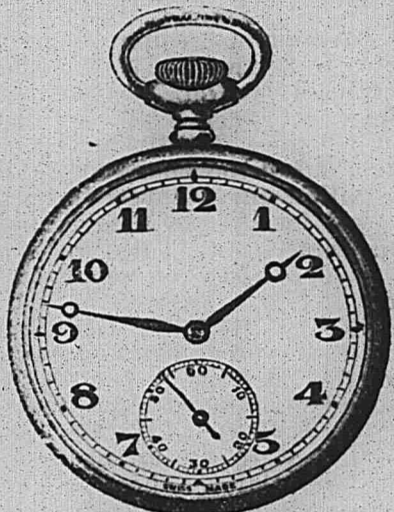
