YOUGHAL TRAGEDY.

Dr. Humphrey Kelleher, M.D., (34), was found dead in bed at the Avon-more Hotel, Youghal on Monday morning.

The announcement of the death of this young and promising medical man will be received with profound sorrow both in Cork city and county, where he was well known and respected. The tragic circumstances surrounding the demise of Dr. Kelleher will further add to the poignancy of his passing, and to his relatives, including his mother; Father Andrew Kelleher, Mallow; Mr. D. Kelleher, Crosshaven; Mrs. Cornelius D. Kelleher, Colea, Ballyvourney; Mr. W. Kelleher, Ballykerwick, Donoughmore (brothers), and Mr. T. The deceased was born in Bally-vourney, County Cork, in 1900, but he spent the majority of his young days in Donoughmore, where his father had purchased another farm. When he commenced his early studies at St. Colman's College, Fermoy, the charm of manner and good humour which were to win him universal popularity in the medical circles of the county in later years endeared him to class-

mates and professors alike.

In 1919 he graduated to University College, Cork, where he was a valued member of the Gaelic Football Club, and showed diligence and application to study, which won him deserved success at examinations. When the Anglo-Irish War increased in intensuccess at examinations. When the Anglo-Irish War increased in intensity Dr. Kelleher left his studies behind to join in the fight and as a member of the 6th Battalion of the 1st Cork Brigade, he took part in the famous Dripsey ambush, and on the outbreak of the civil war joined the irregular forces. Dr. Kelleher did not contest the next election and, in July, 1933, he resigned his position at the South Infirmary to take up duties at the Cottage Hospital, Youghal. 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



SAVAGE DOGS

ECOECTES OF PARLY TRAINING By "PHILOKUON."

A DOG that purported to be a bull mastiff recently turned on its owner, biting her severely. He was a formidable animal, described in one account of the incident as standing nearly 4 feet high. Have you ever tried to picture a dog of that height? A foot less would give us a canine giant. Very occasionally we find one that turns on its friends from sheer untrustwothiness, but that is not usual. A highly-nervous animal, too, is likely to bite in the belief that some harm is going to be done

that some harm is going to be done to him by anyone who approaches.

So long as dogs are treated sensibly, taught to obey from early puppyhood, and made to feel that their owners are to be respected, there is not much danger of any untoward happening. The least sign of any disposition to growl or snap should be reproved severely, and the dog made to understand the enormity of his offence.
